London, Monday, May 23.-The Times correspondent on the dispatch boat Haimun, in a wireless message sent by way of Wei Hai Wei, says he is still not allowed to enter the real theater of war, but he claims to make a more accurate estimate of the conditions where he is than he has hitherto done.

According to his information Gen. Kuroki found it necessary to halt at Feng Wang Cheng to pull his force together for an advance over the heavy country lying between him and Liao Yang, and to await the landing of the third army, which will advance north towards the same objective until able to co-operate with him. Apparently Gen. Kuroki has suffered annovance by Cossacks menacing his communications. Accordingly the troops guarding the communications have been reinforced by reserve battalions from Japan. The Russians on Gen. Kuroki's front maintain observation groups,

which are in constant touch with the Japanese outposts. The fortunes of Gen. Oku's army show some success, but he is meeting with stubborn resistance. The division that landed in Kin Chau Bay, isolating Port Arthur, will have the duty of reducing the fortress. The untoward events of the past week will stimulate the Japanese to reduce the fortress by a coup de main. There is every indication that the

Czar Reaches Moscow to Review Troops-Alexieff Withdraws Resignation.

Eight-Year-Old Edward Fishbein Loses Log as Result of Accident.

Seated on the ground, with his left foot mangled, and his face smeared blood, little Edward Fishbein, Jewish boy of 8 years, son of Moses Fishbein, of 87 William street, was found by a colored youth in the yards of the Pere Marquette, between Hill and South streets, late Saturday af-

The little fellow was doing his best to remove the stocking on the injured leg, but he was so weak from the shock of the accident that he was un-able to do so. The ambulance was called, but before its arrival two of the railway men made a stretcher of their arms and carried the boy to Victoria Hospital, where the foot was amputated by Drs. H. A. and W. J. Stevenson.

How the accident happened is mystery. A train was made up in the yards, and the Fishbein boy was seen on the siding sometime before it started. The injured lad is deaf and dumb, and it is thought, he was climbing on the cars, and did not hear the whistle, which gave the warning that the train was about to move, and that in attempting to alight, he fell underneath the wheels. At all events he was not struck by the locomotive as he was near the middle of the train when it started.

Though terribly injured, the boy did not give way to an outburst of tears until he saw he was being taken to the hospital, instead of to his home. Then he struggled violently with his bearers and cried bitterly.
