





#### Politics in the Northwest.

The Alberta Conservatives have held a convention, adopted a platform, and decided to bring out party candidates. The Liberals, a short time ago, took the same action. Henceforth, then party lines will be as closely drawn in the new provinces as in the old.

Theoretically, this seems absurd. The questions that divide parties in Dominion affairs have no place in the government of a province. In the limited sphere of relations of these latter bedies the main concern is the honest, economical administration of local affairs. Grit or Tory could do that equally well-if equally honest and capable. And, in theory, there is no reason why both Grits and Tories should not unite in the government.

But theory is not always practicable. When the leading men of a province are opposing each other with all their strength in Dominion politics, it is no nony in provincial politics. There is a spirit of antagonism which naturally eeps them apart. Each becomes suspicious of the other; each prefers to work in local affairs with those who are his associates in national affairs. While we might prefer to see all parties united in the management of provincial concerns, we need not be surprised if it is found to be impractic-

The police and Dr. D. W. Spence, of the humane society arrested Professor Siedenberg, and the woman was given in charge of Mrs. Baldwin. She will be kept from the professor until she comes out from the hypnotic spell and can speak for herself.



# **LOSSES OF WAR** BY LAND AND SEA

Stupendous Slaughter of Human Life Should Halt the Conflict.

London, Aug. 22.—While it is possible that the list of casualties in the Russo-Japanese war may be greatly augmented before it is complete, yet in view of the growing feeling that peace will be shortly declared, a calculation of the losses on both sides is opportune. From material furnished by the Tokio correspondent of the London Times an accurate reckoning of the Japanese losses may be readily obtained. No such certainty is possible regarding the Russian casualties. the policy of the Czar being to conceai the worst. There are, of course, published accounts of losses in most of the engagements, but these must be considered as the minimum of Russian casualties. On the other hand, the peculiarly solemn religious rites of the Japanese make it imperative that not one lost man should remain unaccount-

ed for. Since June there has been practically no engagement, so that calculations made up till then will remain trustworthy. At the outside, therefore, the Japanese have lost 167,402 men, killed, wounded and prisoners, while the minimum of Russian losses may be put at 388,480; that is to say, two Russians for every Japanese. By far the bloodiest battle of the whole war has been that of Mukden, which continued from Feb. 19 to March 16. In this titanic conflict the Japanese losses were 52,500, while no fewer than 152,500 Russians were killed, wounded or made prisoners. The second most costly engagement was that of Shaho, on Sept. 14, 1904, where 69,201 Russians fell, and 15,879 Japanese. More than 17,000 Japs went down at Liao Yang ten days earlier, and at least 25,000 Since June there has been practically no STRATHROY VS. In the matter of prisoners the most exact figures are obtainable, and from these we gather that the control of the same of that here are 646 Japanese and 67,701 Russians in the hands of the enemy. Two to one is the average proportion of Russian

to Japanese casualties, though in many actions we come across figures like these: Russians 800, Japanese 75; Russians 240, Japanese 50; Russians 600. Japanese 70; Russians 1,000, Japanese 299; Russians 4,250, Japanese 800. Turning to the material of war, we find Japanese success in even greater proportion. Russia has lost 346,588 tons of fighting ships, while the Japanese navy emerges with a displacement 25.435 greater than when the war began. Russia has had 15 first-class battleships engaged, and of these 12 have been sunk, 2 captured and the remaining ship mutinied; while in armored cruisers, of 7 belligerents, 5 have been sunk and 2 remain. Of 24 destroyers, 19 have been sunk, 2 captured, 1 interned and 2 remain. Altogether, of the 83 Russian ships of all kinds in the struggle, 57 have been sunk, 7 captured, 19 interned, and only 10 remain. Two Japanese battleships have gone down, 4 cruisers, 2 destroyers and 4 ships otherwise destroyed, making a total of 10; but not one has been captured, not one interned. Of the original 76, no fewer than 64 remain ready to continue the war. To Japan's credit in this account must be placed the battleships and cruisers raised at Port Arthur.
