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A TERRIBLE EXPERIENCE. A true story by one of Baltimore's Best Detectives. From the Baltimore American. It was just ten days before Christmas, a few years ago, that I was engaged to work up one of the most infamous robberies on record. When I plied him down with the facts in my possession and told him that I knew all about the large sum of money which had been taken from him when he was full of wine, he broke down, he confessed, and seemed to express genuine regret for what he had done. Here I left him to consult with the chief as to the terms, etc. "You'd better keep a sharp lookout for a young man," said that official; "he looks like a desperado's fellow."
