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## American Expedition Will Study Geology Of Our Southern Bays

Well Known Princeton Scientists Will Examine Coast Formation Round Placentia and Fortune Inlets. - Lead, Copper and Gold Discovered Last Summer .-- Make Collection of Mineral Specimens.

EW YORK, June 2.—Princeton's geological expedition to Newfoundland will sail from Philadelphia about the middle of June. The party consists of Prof. Van Ingen, A. F. Buddington, a post-gradu- Tells Them That Nothing But Trouble ate; B. F. Howell, 1913, and P. E Thomas, 1915. They will stay in the field all summer, examining the region around St. Mary's, Placentia and Fortune Bay, just south of the district where Princeton parties have spent the past two summers.

Third Expedition.

The work of the expedition will be Irish Parliament. a continuation of that carried on in Expeditions of this kind will be car- whether she wants women voters. ried on each summer if sufficient funds can be obtained. All collections of rocks, minerals, ores and fossils made by them will be added to the Princeton collection, and all scientific publications resulting from them are issued in the name of the university. Little is known of geology in the district which is to be the field of operations. Some lead and copper have been found in it, and gold was reported from Fortune Bay last year. The geologists will examine those prospeets, look for new fossils and study the geology of the country in general,

Previous Discoveries. The Newfoundland expedition bids fair to be the most important work undertaken by the Department of Geology since the famous Princeton expeditions to the Western States and South America in the eighties and nineties under the direction of Proffessors W. B. Scott and H. F. Osborne, which not only added many new and valuable specimens to the Princeton museum and study collections, but through the publications for such work.

Among the most important results of the last two expeditions to Newfoundland was the discovery by A. C. Hayes, a post graduate, of the true origin and mode of deposition of the famous Wabana iron ores of Conception Bay. These great beds of ore now being mined two miles out beneath the sea, had been a puzzle to geologists and miners ever since their

discovery. How Mine Originated.

Hayes' researches have shown that the ore originally accumulated as an incoherent mass of ferruginous mud, in which minute concretionary struc tures began to form, continuing until the bed hardened to rock to form the olitic heatite (or fish ore). The iron content is thought to have been derived by solution of the iron of preexistent beds which formed the land shore of the sea, and into which it was carried as soluble salts by the ordinary land drainage, such as the rivers and other streams.

Report From West Says That Bait Is Now Plentiful, But Codfish Is Very Scarce.

The following report dated May 30th was received yesterday by the Board of Trade from Mr. J. Cunnigham (Connore Bay to Red Island)-Sixty dories, skiffs and boats are fishing and the total catch of codfish is 4069 quintals with 180 for last week No schooners from the grounds or bankers have returned. Prospects are very poor at present though there is plenty herring for bait.

The lobster catch to date is very small. Westerly and Southerly winds with fog and heavy sea prevailed during the first part of the week, but it was finer the past few days. Codfish is getting scarcer. This week 1900 pounds of halibut and 394 of salmon were caught.



"Mr. Coaker has done a lot of good for his fellow-countrymen," says I, "and may he so continue to the end of his life is the sincere and heartfelt prayer of




