

HARTLEPOOL, Eng., Dec. 16, via London, 12 Noon: The residents of Hartlepool were awakened this morning by heavy gun firing. A great crowd at once assembled on the beach to learn whence the sounds came.

Shells from German ships soon began dropping into the city, whereupon the crowd on the beach rapidly sought shelter. Nine persons were killed and a number injured.

Unfortified Towns Received Damage From Shell Fire-First Time English Coast Was Ever Bombarded-Admiralty Says That the Situation is Developing-Uncertain at Noon as to What the Outcome Would be-Life and Death Struggle is Now Being Fought.

Official Announcements

LONDON, Dec. 16th, 11.26 a.m.-The official announcement regarding this important development follows: "German movements of some importance are taking place this morning in the North Sea. Scarborough and Hartlepool have been shelled and our flotillas have at various points been engaged. The situation is developing."

LONDON, Dec. 16th, 1.46 p.m.-A statement given out by the official information bureau says that the German warships which have been bombarding the eastern coast of England have been driven off by the West Hartlepool fortress.

LONDON, Dec. 16, 1.44 p.m.-The official press bureau this afternoon made the following announcement with regard to the German attack on the North Sea coast of England:
