WEST LAND REGULATIONS.
THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and callivation of the land in each of three cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within sine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where creddence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a bomesteader in conditional may be a present a quarter-In certain districts a nonestead good standing may pre-empt a quarter-ection alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00
