Dr. Alfred Gatty sends the following to London Notes and Queries: "I have heard on good authority that there is an interesting relic preserved in Alnwick Casele, to which a romanic legend is attached. Phosphoric Acid in Tuberculosis.

Phosphoric Acid in Tuberculosis.

Dr. Grossie reports in the Gazetta Medica, Italiana a number of cases of tuberculosis, in which most successful cures have attended the external use of phosphorio acid. Dr. Grossie was first led to employ it from a consideration of the effects following Kollisoher's treatment of local tuberculosis by interstitial injections of a solution of calcium phosphate; he therefore tried local applications of the same solution in ulcers of the leg, and found the result very astisfactory; but, as there were no tubercles in these cases, the action of the remedy necessitated explanation otherwise than by calcification of the tubercles, and phosphoric acid was deemed the active agent. In pursuance of this conclusion he began to treat all of his cases of obstinate ulcer of the leg by local applications of a 19 per cent. solution of strong phosphoric acid in distilled water, the compresses being renewed three or four times a day. The very eastisfactory results thus obtained led to trials of the same substance in various tubercular affections, and with great success.

Dr. Lauder Brunton has employed strychnine in insomnia from "overtiredness" with very happy effects. He says that it occurred to him that as strychnine is one of the most powerful stimulants, if not the most powerful nervous stimulant, that we possess, a small dose of it might have the effect of bringing the depressed nervous system up from the condition of over-fafigue to that of simple fatigue, thus inducing sleep. He found that it acted exactly in the manner that he had expected, and induced comfortable, healthy sleep, without any disagreeable effects next day. The way in which he has used it has generally been either in the form of the time-ture of nux vomica in doses of five to ten minims or in the form of granules, containing 1-200 of a grain of sulphate of strychning each. One, two or more of these granules were given at bed-time, and the dose was repeated if the patient happened to awake within one or two hours afterward. Dr. Brunton thinks it very doubtful whether strychnine wold answer in other cases of sleeplessness than those arising from overwork.

Oxè of the grandest engineering achievements of recent years has just been signalized by the opening of the great railway bridge over the River Ganges at Benares, India. This work has been contemplated for twenty years, in order to complete the scheme of the Oudh & Rohilkund Railway between Calcutta and Lucknow, and seven years have been consumed in its construction. The length of the bridge from end to end of the girders is 3,523 feet; there are 16 spans, seven of 365 feet and nine of 114 feet. The piers of the larger spans are founded on elliptical wells, 65 feet by 28 feet; the piers vary in depth from 63 feet to 152 feet below ground level. The weight of the material used in one of the deep piers is about 16,000 tons; the total weight of the steel girders is 6,405 tons. Although the spans are of great length, they were constructed without the use of the cantilever principle, which has of late been adopted so generally for long span bridges in this country. The river bed consists of sand of an unknown depth, over which the water rises during the flood season to as much as 29 feet, with a tremendous velocity, and the construction of piers under these conditions was a work of the greatest difficulty. Some of the piers, which reach the extraordinary depth of 125 feet below the surface of the ground, are the deepest in the world, and altogether the structure is a triumph of engineering skill and unlimited money over extraordinary matural difficulties. 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

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
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
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
