

NOW THEY MUST VOTE

FOR THE first time, in the recent general election in Australia the law making the casting of a ballot compulsory was enforced. In consequence a record vote was polled, the women being especially in evidence. The wisdom of universal suffrage is often questioned,

in evidence. The wisdom of universal suffrage is often questioned, but since it has been adopted in this country it is imperative that all should vote. The penalty for failing to do so in Australia is a fine of two pounds sterling, which evidently proved an effective ar-gument in getting electors to the polls. In Canada a common method of influencing an election is by bribing an opponent not to cast a vote, and in such a case the adop-tion of the Australian law here would operate in the direction of a better condition in our political life. That the present system of franchise in this country is very far from being satisfactory will be admitted by every person who makes anything like a careful study of the matter.

For our part we believe that the voter should be required to show that he or she is competent to the important duty, not by the old-fashioned property qualification but by an evidence of in-telligence as to the meaning of the ballot, and some knowledge of the requirements of the country whose destinies they by their vote assist to control assist to control.
