Sterling in the Bonded Warshouse, it is free from Crown Duty, Vegetable Oils at only free from Crown Duty when imported from the Bonded Warshouse.—Indies, Foreign, provided the 6d. of h. and 2 of cent. prior duty does not amount to the cent. Pays 15 of cent.—Tallow and Russ Hudes are free from Crown Duty, although Imported from a Foreign Port.

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
