What relief has the farmer got from the tariff? How much less has he to pay for his sugar, tes, tobacco, coal oil, binder twine and machinery than he had in 1896? Instead of having less to pay he has more to pay today, for everyone of these articles, and they are about the only articles in which the tariff affects him. The farmer is prosperous, it is true, but he has not to thank the present government for it The farmers of the United States, living under the most protective of tariffs are prosperous also. It is a case of general prosperity and it would be sad indeed if the Canadian farmer did not get his share. The Toronto Sun has figured out how the farmer stands today compared with where he stood in 1896, and the following is the result: 'It requires 50 per cent more wheat

to buy a stove than it did in 1896. 'It requires 20 bushels more corn to buy a wagon than it did in 1896. · It requires 100 per cent more corn

or wheat to buy a copper kettle than 'It requires twice as much corn to buy a coil of rope as in 1896.

#### FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE

DISABLED TANK STEAMER. The sch. Niagara arrived in Glouceste Mass. on Thursday, and Captain Carroll reports that while on the Banks he spoke to the sch. SEVERE EARTHQUAKE.

A severe earthquake visited Caracas, Venezuela, on Monday last. Fifteen per sons were killed and many others injured Great damage was done to buildings, includ ing the Pantheon and the churches. The United States legation was badly damaged but all the occupants escaped unhurt President Castro, who leaped from a bal oony on the second floor of the governmen house, had one of his legs broken. William Henry Deveton Haggart, the British Minister, had a miraculous escape, the ceiling of the first story of the British legation having fallen upon him and buried him in

FIGHTING IN THE PHILIPPINES. While scouting near Loce, Philippines, on Thursday last, a detachment of the 20th and 28th regiments, under Captain Belgier, were attacked by 400 insurgents, armed with rifles, under the command of a white man, whose pationality is not known to the Americans. The insurgents for the most part were entrenched. After an heroic fight, Captain Belgier drove off the enemy, killing more than 75. The fight lasted for two hours. Captain Belgier and three privates were slightly wounded, and two Americans were killed. General Hall's expedition with a force of 800 men, passing through the mountains in Binangonan, province of Infants, in pursuit of the insurgent, General Cailles, although it develope admot trace of the enemy, encountared great hardships on the march. Twenty Chinese porters died, and forty men were sent into the hospitals. After stationing a garrison of 250 men in Binangonan and visiting Poililo Island, off the coast of Infanta prevince, General Hall and the rest of his force embarked there on the transport Garonne. Reports from General Young's district show a daily increase of insurgents there, owing to the fact that recruits are going thither from the towns. The British buried over thirty Boers on the field. Several of these had been killed by bayonets, the fighting having been at close quarters.

Three Boers who raised a white flag and afterwards fired on the British, were captured and tried by courtmartial. They were found guilty and sentenced to death, and Lord Roberts shot on the following morning in the presence of the army. It is hoped that this will prove a salutary lesson to the Boers, who have been treacherously using the white flag.

### Information for Electors.

### The Qualification of Voters and How to Vote.

In the electoral districts of this Province the voting takes place by ballot There is no registration of voters here. Every male British subject of the age of 21 years and upwards who has for six nonths previous to the 9th day of October, A. D. 1900, been in possession either as wener, tenant or occupant of a house or piece of land of the yearly value of six dollars

IN ADDITION TO ABOVE. In country districts every male British subject of the age of 21 years, who being liable to perform Statute Lobor, has performed such Statute Labor or paid his commutation money for the year 1900, shall be entitled to vote, provided he has resided for twelve months in the electoral division.

IN THE CITY OF CHARLOTTETOWN. If a person cannot qualify as a tenant or owner, he may vote on his poll tax.

He has resided for twelve months previous to the 9th day of October, A. D. 1900, either east or west of Great George Street, and has paid his poll tax, or 75 cents of it, for the year 1899, OR HE CAN VOTE ON HIS POLL TAX RECEIPT FOR THE


Every resident voter must vote in the polling district where he is living on elec-We warn poll tax electors to be prepared with their poll tax receipts before they go into the polling booths. If you do not produce them your votes will not be taken, and you cannot again enter the booth. Tenants and owners do not require receipts.

Me No person who has voted at the election shall in any legal proceeding be required to state for whom he voted.—See Sec. 97 of the Election Act. The election law of the Dominion provides for perfect secrecy of the ballot, except in the case of a scrutiny before two judges of the Supreme Court. Before a scrutiny can be held, the person desiring one must deposit in Court one thousand dollars as security that he will be successful. No ballot can be examined uniti it has been proved.

that the voter has no vote, and no vote under any circumstances can be examined unless it has been marked objected to before the vote was given. No vote can be marked objected after the voter has received his ballot. The ballots after being counted are sealed by the Keturning Officer, who without opening the packets or breaking the seals, transmits them to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, and whilst in the custody of the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery no person is allowed to inspect them.

Besides the polling officers and the agents of the candidates, only one elector may enter the polling booth at a time; he MUST mark his ballot in secret, he MUST hand his ballot folded to the polling officer, who MUST place it in the box without opening, and there is a penalty for displaying the ballot in any way that would afford a clue as to how the elector is voting.
