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

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

In operations undertaken at sea the irgeon has help, unskilful though it ay be, and his task would in such oublous conditions be well-nigh imossible if he were deprived of that easure of aid. In some professionsituations, however, this degree assistance is not vouchsafed to the perator, for he is compelled to rely himself alone. He has to do what needs to be done without any form help whatever.

Single-Handed Operations.

Where the surgeon has not only to dminister the anaesthic, but to perorm the operation, and that singleanded, he is in a very arduous place. is probable that most major operrations, such as amputations, can be arried through successfully without ny assistance at all, but performences such as these must be regardd rather as tours de force than as ordinary efforts of surgical skill.

To almost every surgeon occasions will come when he will have to rely on his own unaided efforts, and he will probably obtain better results f he has taken thought beforehand is to what may be expected of him different junctures. Surgeons are so much in the habit now of relying on a good supply of instruments that nany of them are hardly aware with now little it is possible to do all that s necessary.



In the House of Commons yesterday, Premier Asquith consented to he insertion of words in clause two of the Veto Bill, ensuring that the wo years delay should be calculated rom the date of the passing of the second reading of any bill in the louse of Commons, thus practically adding three months to the power of delay of the House of Lords. Clause two of the Veto Bill relates to any oill other than money bills and provides if such a bill is passed by the louse in three successive sessions and is rejected by the House in each of the three sessions, it shall become an Act of Parliament on the royal ssent being given. The criginal clause, however, provided that this hould not take effect unless two years had elapsed between the date of the first introduction of the bill nto the House of Commons and the date on which it passed the House of commons the third time. The bulk of the remaining amendments to the econd clause have been eliminated the Kangaroo closure, while other mendments have been rejected. The cargoes of rifles and ammunition are shipped in swift-sailing dhows from the free port of Muscat to the east coast of the Gulf, whence they are carried overland by camel caravan to the fierce desert tribes of the Central Asian plains, and the warlike Pathans of the Hill Country.

The usual price for a modern rifle s its weight in gold coin placed in the opposite scale. Cartridges fetch from four to ten shillings apiece Some idea can be gathered from these figures as to what are the profits o a successful deal.
