Head of Carnegie Trust Company Guilty.

New York, Nov. 20 .- Wm. J. Cummings, the former Tennessee promoter and recent directing head of the Carnegie Trust Co., was found guilty to-day of the theft of \$140,000 from the Nineteenth Ward Bank by the jury before whom he had been tried for the past five weeks. He was remanded to the Tombs Prison process is repeated with a board of until Friday, when his counsel will be given the privilege of making such motion as he may decide upon before sentence is pronounced.

The principal witness against Cummings was Bradley Martin, Jr., Vice-President of the Nineteenth Ward Bahk, who testified that the loans nut up by that institution and the Van Norden Trust Co. had been turned over to the Carnegie Trust Co. under a trust agreement by which the money was to be used to retire Van Norden Nineteenth Ward Bank and Twelfth Ward Bank stocks held as collateral in loans.

The State held that Cummines had \$140,000 of this fund credited to himself, and that he used it to bolster up the finances of his various industrial companies in the South, which the State Attorney referred to as "paper" companies.

The penalty for Cummings' offence is an indeterminate term of from five to ten years as the maximum sentence. Cummings is fifty years old and has a wife and married daughter.
