



MEXICO CITY, Aug. 13. Two hundred dead were lying in the streets of Ixlapa, last night, after Detoa's band of Zappstas halted its march to Toluca, capital of the state in Mexico, 15 miles northward. The town was garrisoned by 100 rurales. Fighting occurred around Tenencino earlier in the day. Six hundred federals quartered there defeated the rebels. The latter then concentrated their efforts on the smaller garrison of rurales at Ixlapa. At the end of the fight, all the rurales were dead, the 200 including many of the townspeople. The rurales fought desperately Toluca is now garrisoned by more than 500 federal soldiers, but reports from there say that the residents ar panic-stricken, believing that a battle is imminent.






