Derringham is nursed back to life by a rich widow, who becomes engaged to him, but who subsequently throws him over when she finds that he is going to be lame. Derringham hastens to Greece, catches Halcyone in the temple of her goddess, and after another beautiful scene all ends well.



The Agile Tiger.

He is "Shod With Silence" and is as Quick as Lightning.
 Most wild animals are specialists—that is to say, they are highly developed in one particular direction. The tiger is great as a stalker. His feet seem to be "shod with silence." R. H. He approached so gradually and noiselessly and his color against the brown leaves was so invisible that he was close upon the bullock before he was perceived. Then instantly the bullock charged. The tiger eluded him and in a moment more had his paws on the bullock's neck ready to drag him down. Then, like a flash, he caught sight of the rope by which the bullock was tied and turned and sprang into the forest all so quickly that the man in the tree had no opportunity to fire.

A Freeze Out.

When we made our remarks yesterday about the Picnic Chief's meeting at Channel we were relying solely on the campaign report in the Daily News. We dealt largely with the burning topics of the hour of which no mention appears to have been made by the reporter of the meeting, and it was therefore a fair inference that Sir Edward Morris avoided dealing with them. Proof of the accuracy of our surmise came to hand yesterday, but too late for publication. A perusal of the report of our correspondent at Channel will convince the impartial reader of this. Our correspondent reports that the meeting was well attended but very cold. In other words, the people put the Picnic Chief in the cold storage about which he talks so much and does so little. Our reporter states:—

"There was no enthusiasm displayed over the Premier's speech delivered in his customary ponderous style. His pet follies, the railway and agricultural policies were his chief themes, but he forgot to explain the Coaker Memorials, Morison forgetting the law, the \$40,000 in the St. George's Lumber Co.; why second class passengers only are vaccinated at Port aux Basques, and why he turned down the petitions of the P. P. U. for an election the coming fall and many other matters which would have been more interesting than two blades of grass, hills white with sheep, and linen factories orations of other years. Channel is now to have when convenient, a new public building, a main line connecting road to Rose Blanche, and numberless other local improvements."

The Premier is out campaigning. He is trying to turn the tide which is running high against him and his administration in the District of Burgeo and LaPoile just as it is in other districts. He is promising the moon. But the people have been bitten once and now they are shy of his promises, and will not be taken in again. He might as well save his breath to cool his porridge, for what good his talk will do him and his party.

NEARLY FINISHED.—The work of erecting the tower on St. Patrick's Church will be finished about three weeks hence. It will be a splendid piece of architecture.

Yet there was no glaring account, but in the case of this girl Wheeler the Herald knew she had respectable brothers and sisters, therefore they wanted to make them feel it. The same applies to the friends of the man Collins and Field. Perhaps they are right and perhaps both the friends of the young man Collins and the friends of the girl will keep a lookout for some of those reporters in time to come. A libel suit for ten thousand dollars will also be looked into for defamation of the character of the mother of the young girl, and also for slanderous abuse and dragging down the name of the dead young man Collins. "Many physicians have come to realize that caffeine, as daily consumed in coffee and tea, has much to do with the causation of many annoying ailments that formerly were obscurely diagnosed and vaguely treated. It stands to reason that this alkaloid, when taken in daily doses of six or more grains, must exert a harmful action on the nervous circulatory, and digestive systems. Its action must also modify the action of other drugs prescribed by the physicians."

"Postum," the well known cereal beverage, made of clean hard wheat and a small percentage of molasses, has been the means of effecting an easy change from coffee and its harmful stimulant—caffeine—to a wholesome, harmless, nourishing beverage."

Eminent analysts such as Prof. J. W. Mallet of the University of Virginia, have proven that a cup of coffee (only three-fifths coffee, and the rest milk) contains about 2½ grains of caffeine.

A Government report issued April 4th, this year, from the Bureau of Chemists shows that the deadly coffee drug, caffeine, administered in small doses, caused the death of cats, dogs, rabbits and guinea pigs in a few hours.

Suggestions From a Mining Engineer

St. John's, N. F.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir:—Having just returned from Newfoundland, where I have been engaged in examining some mining properties, it occurred to me that a few words or suggestions from an outsider might be of material assistance for furthering the advancement and development of the mining resources of your Island, and it is this reason I take the liberty of publishing these few remarks in your valued paper.

From my personal observations, I am thoroughly convinced that Newfoundland possesses deposits of economic minerals, both from a standpoint of quality as well as quantity. But, such resources will not be developed for years to come unless the Department of Mines takes the matter up in a conscientious and scientific manner.

It is a well-known fact that a prospector does not enter a country until he is able to obtain sufficient data and statistics dealing upon various sections of the said country. Therefore, it rests with the Department of Mines to inaugurate a geological survey, which, in turn will out expedition under the guidance of fully qualified technical men to thoroughly explore the country, both from a geological and mineralogical standpoint during the summer months. Various members of the aforementioned expeditions would then compile their respective reports and compile all geological maps, charts, etc., for publication.

With data of such a nature, a prospector has something tangible work upon, and would very soon discover mineral deposits of value. Furthermore, upon discovery of same, a capitalist would then enter the field.

At the present time the Department of Mines does neither possess an up-to-date report upon the mineral resources of Newfoundland, or a geological map of the same country.

I had occasion to write to the Department of Mines, St. John's, some few weeks ago, requesting that they send me the most recent data relating to the mineral resources of Newfoundland. In reply to same, all I received was a small pamphlet dealing with them in a very general and hazy manner, but contained no details of importance, such as would be of value to an engineer or anyone interested.

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It is a well-known fact that the prospector does not enter a country until he is able to obtain sufficient data and statistics, dealing upon the various sections of the said country. 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At the present time the Department of Mines does neither possess an up-to-date report upon the mineral resources of Newfoundland or a recent geological map of the same country.

I had occasion to write to the Department of Mines, St. John's, some two weeks ago, requesting it to send me the most recent data relative to the mineral resources of Newfoundland. In reply to same, all I received was a small pamphlet dealing upon them in a very general and lucid manner, but contained no details of importance such as would be of value to an engineer or anyone interested

in mining matters, and even the said pamphlet has not been published since 1909. Furthermore, the most recent geological map of the country is ten years old. I consider that such a state of affairs are detrimental to the progression of any country.

Newfoundland is the oldest of the British colonies, and as an Englishman, I feel that it is high time Newfoundland takes the proper steps to further advance and then advertise the mineral resources of the country as afore stated, and it can only do so conscientiously by forming a Bureau of Mines and geological survey.

Newfoundland could learn much from the excellent work performed by the United States Geological Survey, Dominion Geological Survey of Canada, and the Bureau of Mines, Toronto, Ontario Province; the latter under the able guidance and leadership of Prof. G. Willet Miller.

Ontario Province alone can boast of controlling the world's market for nickel, holding third place as a silver producer for the entire globe, and is now on the threshold of ranking amongst the largest gold-producers of modern times.

Such results are mainly due to the various researches and expeditions furnished by the provincial Dominion governments, respectively, whose reports and surveys, etc., are read and studied in detail by the many prospectors who then have a tentative object in view.

I appreciate the fact that Newfoundland is not equally as fortunate as the United States of America or the Dominion of Canada from a financial standpoint, but even so, she is in a position to follow such a skeleton programme as I have endeavored to outline on a small scale.

Why not appropriate four million dollars for railway construction, instead of five million, which I understand is the intention of the present administration, and allot three quarters of a million for Department of Mines and geological survey, etc., and one quarter of a million for agricultural purposes, which, by the way, Newfoundland also has excellent prospects of in certain sections of the Island? By the latter remarks I do not intend insinuating that railway construction in a new country is not necessary, but I do contend that it is useless to construct numerous branch railroads to points and through sections of the country that have really no staple industry to back same up.

Furthermore, what is being done with the thousands of dollars filling the coffers of Department of Mines

being the proceeds of various license fees, land titles, dues, etc? Surely a certain proportion of these funds should be utilized for the further advancement of development of the mineral resources of the country in a scientific manner.

There are several bright and intelligent young men, graduating each year from the various universities and school of mines, in the Dominion of Canada and the United States of America, who would only be under the guidance of experienced men, the former whose service the Newfoundland government could easily obtain without paying excessive salaries.

It is not my intention to criticise the Newfoundland government as such, but have taken the liberty to make the foregoing suggestion, as I consider same may possibly, either directly or indirectly, act as an incentive to further and better a country, claiming the British flag, which should be the desire of every true Britisher.
