

#### Wiping Turkey Off the Map.

The Entente Allies are now pushing the campaign with vigor against Turkey. Although we have heard little recently of the campaign of the Russians in the Caucacus we may rest assured that they are keeping the Turks busy in that region. We have also heard nothing recently of the Russian Black Sea fleet, but it is not unlikely it is watching the Black Sea entrance of the Bosphorus to prevent the escape of the Turkish fleet into the Black Sea. The full strength of the Turkish fleet last November was 12 each, and sixteen 10 inch guns throwing 100 lbs. The only warship of any importance is the Goeben, and there available as a fighting unit. Even if she is, the Turkish Navy is not likely less. As a quick pain cure and stime the three battle cruisers, the Agamennon and other ships of the British Navy after they force their way into the Sea of Marmora. They may how ever seek safety in the Bosphorus. Whether they will attempt to reach the Black Sea, will depend largely on the condition of the Goeben, and also whether the Russian Black Sea dreadnought is yet in commission. One of these forts, marked on the Admiralty maps as L, is armed with two 14 inch guns, that could hard ly reach the Queen Elizabeth which fired 29 rounds from her fifteen inch weapons by indirect fire and had the advantage of aeroplanes to direct he gunners. The other two forts wer armed with three 11 inch guns and some smaller cannon. 

'LA TOURAINE' UNDER CONTROL.




