FRENCH CAPTURE PRISONERS.

The French troops have made further advances around Belloy and St Maur, and have captured four hundred additional prisoners, some cannon and machine guns, according to the official statement to-night. They have also reoccupied Montcourt and part of Bussieres, north of the Marne. The French troops were withdrawn east of the Oise along the lines of Bailly, Tracy, Le-Val and Nampeel, under the protection of covering detachments without the enemy being aware of the movement. While most of the German attacks were repulsed, the enemy succeeded in getting a foothold on the southern bank of the Matz

BRITISH TRANSPORT SUNK.

The British transport Ausonia, ownd by the Cunard Steamship Co., has been torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine, several hundred miles from the British coast, while on her way westward. Ninety members of her crew were picked up by another steamer eastward bound and landed on the English coast. Search is being made for forty more of her crew, who are reported missing. The Ausonia was a steel four-masted steamship of

8,153 gross tons, built at Newcastle, England, in 1907, for the cabin and immigrant trade between London and variety.





The French forces operating on the east bank of the Oise River south of Noyon have evacuated the Cariehout Wood and the Germans are closely pressing them southward, accord-Wednesday. The statement asserts that the territory on the opposite side of the river near where the Martz enters the stream, has been cleared of Allied troops. Nowhere else along the battle front running from Mont Didier to the region around Noyon is any claim made to further advances by the Germans. On the contrary the latest statement shows, that the enemy everywhere has been busily engaged in attempts to hold back the French and other allied troops, among them some Americans. No mention is made in the communication of the Allies as having advanced their front east of Mery and the Genlis Wood, or of the repulse of violent German attacks along the Aronde River and at the Loges farm and Anteuil. Neither is there any mention of the fact that the enemy notwithstanding his numerous attempts has been enabled to debouch south of the Matz River. The communication asserts that all the counter attacks of the Allied forces have been repulsed, and that they suffered heavy casualties. It declared that the number of prisoners taken by General von Hutiers' army has now risen to more than 13,000. THE ALLIES' DAY. WITH THE FRENCH ARMIES IN FRANCE, June 11.—The Allied troops to-day showed the Germans they could not have it all their own way. by executing a number of counter attacks, which were invariably successful. Some important territory was won back, and inroads were even made into the German position; it was in fact a thoroughly good day for the Allies, who in addition to regaining ground, captured more than 1,000 prisoners. The principal counter attack occurred between Demfront, near Rubescourt, and Jacquemoulin, south of Belloy, a front of about 12 kilometres. Allied infantry supported by tanks achieved an advance averaging 1,500 metres. They retook Belloy, reached the edge of St. Maur, arrived north of Parte and Leges farm and obtained a footing at Antheuil. The French troops displayed remarkable courage and willingness to get at the foe, who appeared completely disconcerted by their dash. Horse teams could be seen galloping forward to save their guns, and some of the Germans lost their heads completely. The battleground is literally covered with German dead. The counter attack on the French left wing, which was the first carried out to-day, took the French close to the original lines as they stood Sunday. The Allies also got beyond Mery in another assault. while a further fierce return blow enabled them to reach the vicinity of St.

SLAUGHTERING GERMANS.

WITH THE FRENCH ARMIES IN FRANCE, June 12. (By the Associated Press.)-French cannons and machine guns have reached a heavy toll since Sunday. An entire division of the famous Jaegers was cut to pieces at Ressons-Sur-Matz, while a Guards' division lost a great proportion of its effectives. Other divisions, it is learned, suffered equally during the preparation for the attack and the advance to the narrow valleys, all the passes of which were dominated by the Allied guns. Every prisoner taken seems horror stricken at the slaughter of his comrades.

#### Hun Torture of Prisoners.

A SOLDIER'S NARRATIVE. Special Correspondent at the Hague

in "Daily Mail.") Germans coming along the trench which I was taken prisoner shot our wounded. They took deliberate aim and fired on anybody lying down. As the men got into the train for Schneidemubl Camp (in Posen) the Germans hauled back any who had overcoats and took them from them. It was freezing hard, and we had to make the journey with only our shirs. trousers and boots.

At Schneidemubl, where there was an epidemic of typhus, the British prisoners were sent in batches of about 50 down to a receiving room, where they lay about on the floor among the Russians like rotten sheep. One man was lying down when a Russian fell over him dead. About 20 or 30 British prisoners died of typhus and 7.000 Russians were counted as having died of it.

We were taken to one parracks and stripped and had our hair shaved off. and marched. otherwise. through water about a foot deep to another barracks. If men got up through being delirious, wishing to go to the latrines or attempting to leave the hut, they were knocked back by the orderlies with knotted towels When I went out I had to put on the clothes of a Russian who was being admitted to the hospital suffering from typhus.

The general treatment of prisoners at Schneidemuhl Camp for the first six months that I was there was terrible. The Germans were constantly shooting somebody or putting the bayonet into them.

I was present at a flogging in one of the dugouts. A barrel was brought in by command of the captain, and the man was laid over it with his shirt off. Four or five Germans got hold of thick sticks and the officers told the men to thrash him. They hit him over the head and over the back and knocked him unconscious. I and knocked him unconscious. I should think that they gave him 30 or 40 strokes each. He was taken up and tied to the wires for two hours. All the Englishmen were formed up under a strong guard and a batter. under a strong guard and a battery

the camp his body was put in a coffin without a lid and was taken round the

Prisoners from the reprisal gangs eturned to camp in a very bad state. One had been injured when working down a coal mine. He was descending a ladder about 43 yards long into the mine when a German civilian working there came down after him. The prisner was a little man and could only go down one rung at a time. He said the German followed him down after he had gone three or four rungs and rposely trod on his head and hands, ith the result that he fell to the botalmost broke his back. He is suffering from curvature of the spine in consequence of the fall, but is still working in the lager at Friedrichs-

Reprisal prisoners complain that no arcels reached them. Until recently he parcels of the other prisoners vere opened, and the contents put ino one basin. Tooth powder, dubbin, tton, tooth tablets, pepper, and cigettes were removed from the parels and confiscated. English newsapers were not allowed.

#### FRENCH OFFICIAL.

PARIS, June 12. (Official.) The battle between Mont Didier and the Oise continued without great change during the night. On our left all attempted attacks by the enemy against positions we had reconquered were broken. The French troops have realized new progress east of Mery and the Genil Wood. Violent German attacks have likewise been repulsed by the French on the Aronde front, at St. Maur, the Lege farm and Anthouil. The French troops have inflicted heavy losses on their assailants while guarding their positions. On the right the Germans, despite repeated efforts have not been able to debouch south of the Amtz. The French are holding that part of the field south of Chevincourt and Marest-sur-Metz. Accordng to new information from the battle front, the French counter attack yesterday occurred while a powerful German attack was in progress on the same front. French troops came in contact with heavy forces of the ene my and threw them into disorder Prisoners taken by one French division are found to belong to four different German divisions. South of the Aisne the Germans attacked this morning between Dooiver and the Villers-Cotterets forest. Violent combats are going on, on the front of Demmiers Cutry and south of Ambleny.

PROBABLY A DECISIVE DAY.

PARIS. June 12. To-day's fighting probably will decide on which side victory will rest in the present battle, says Henry Bitou, the military critic, in summing up the situation. He says the fighting is taking the classical form in which each side has won on one wing, and the scales are now even. By their counter attack the French stopped the enemy from carrying out his plan and at the same time assured themselves of a better line of defence. The Germans now are obliged, M. Bitou believes, to keep their effectives on the line to dip into their stock of reserves for fresh divisions.

The German plans for the present battle, says Marcel Hustin, of the Echo de Paris, in reporting the statements of prisoners, included the attacking and storming of Compeigne by the cavalry of the Guards under General Von Schoeler, on Sunday evening. Now the Germans not only are not at Compeigne, but they show a great deal less vigor in their efforts except on their left.

#### A HAIG REPORT.

LONDON, June 12. Field Marshal Haig's report from British Headquarters in France tonight, says: The French troops carried out a successful raid last night in the neighborhood of Locre. Nothing af special interest occurred during the day on the British front

A NAVAL SCRAP.

ROME, June 12. An official statement issued by the Italian admiralty says: "At dawn on Monday, near the Dalmatian Islands, two small Italian torpedo boats, under command of Commander Rizze Luigi de Milazze, attacked an Austrian naval division consisting of two large battleships of the Viribus unit class, escorted by ten destroyers. Our units having boldly broken through the line of destroyers, hit the leading battleship with two torpedoes and the other with one, and returned to their base unscathed. One of the destroyers which pursued them was damaged seriously. The battleships of the Viribus unit type are four in number and are the largest in the Austrian navy. They displaced 20,000 tons and earry a thousand men each.






