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and that no direct or indirect negotiations for a settlement are taking place. At midday to-day the situation had not materially changed and with the transport workers and busmen still working, the element of surprise has not proved so successful as was anticipated. Rationing of foodstuffs and petrol and other drastic government measures have been a steady influence and to a superficial view things have been going on in a limited way much as usual, but the future hold many uncertainties. The transport workers and busmen are apparently eager to come out in sympathy with the railway men and as far as the situation in London with its nineteen millions of concentrated humanity is concerned, there is no doubt an extension of the strike in that direction would to a great extent cause paralysis in the metropolis. The authorities of course, are making every preparation but there are obvious limits to its organizing powers without the aid of transportation. Much will depend on the Government's power to maintain some sort of a train service and the outlook in this respect seems to be improving.

ALL SAILINGS CANCELLED.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29. All sailings to ports in Great Britain have been cancelled by the Shipping Board because of the strike of railway workers there.

SOLDIERS TO ASSIST.

LONDON, Sept. 29. Government officials were decidedly optimistic this morning in their expressions regarding the trend of the strike. The correspondent was officially informed that the machinery for the distribution of food is working so well that it is possible to announce that adequate supplies are absolutely guaranteed to the country. More than 100 trains are operating in the various districts and the number is increasing to-day, some of the operatives being volunteers and other union men who oppose the strike. The Government's attitude is unchanged. The Associated Press was told. It proposes to govern and not be run by a section of the community. Public sentiment, it was stated, is absolutely with the Government which is being deluged by offers of voluntary service from all parts of the country. Hundreds of thousands have already volunteered

ed, including large numbers of organizations of discharged soldiers and sailors who were tendering their services as bodies. The possibility of a spread of the strike to a few other unions is not overlooked, but no anxiety is expressed over this.

NOT DELAYED BY STRIKERS.

LONDON, Sept. 29. The Cunard Line steamer Saxonia sailed from Tilbury for New York to-day, notwithstanding the inconveniences created by the railroad strike. The vessel had on board 2000 passengers. Most of them motored to London Bridge from where they were taken by river steamers down stream to Tilbury on board the Saxonia.

PART SERVICE KEPT UP.

LONDON, Sept. 29. Two attempts to wreck the London to Brighton trains by boulders on the line are reported. The military are now on guard on the line. Strikers in Scotland have held up two trains, and one fireman was injured. The London and Brighton Company deny that seventy-five per cent. of drivers and firemen have resumed work, which it is reported they had offered. Except on certain of the trunk lines to the north, trains are now running on nearly every railway. An official report states that the Great Western service is almost normal. Many up-river residents are travelling to and from the city by the river. The London Electricians' Union has decided to take no action at present. At a meeting, the Livery men pledged their support of the Government, and demanded the immediate reassembly of Parliament. An extraordinarily large number of volunteers are coming forward. The position of the underground railways is much more hopeful. The power station at Chelsea is fully manned by volunteers. The renewal of the power will also enable the starting of the Surrey trams, considerably relieving the position of Southern London. Troops are being transported to important centres by destroyers, which are also conveying some mails. The sympathetic strike of the fish porters at Billingsgate has ended, and plentiful supplies of fish are arriving. Despite the promising signs, Secretary Bromley of the Drivers' and Firemen's Union, asserts the struggle will be long and most severe.



A Forlorn Hope.

Our friends of the Opposition appear to be in the greatest possible muddle in their attempt to secure a trio of candidates to contest the District of St. John's East. They have already approached several gentlemen, holding out special inducements for them to risk their political fortunes in leading a forlorn hope in the premier district of the island, but without success. They have also sent out special S.O.S. calls to others, whose business has taken them out of the city, to return post haste and permit their names to be placed in nomination, but a deaf ear has been turned to the entreaties, and all those who have been approached and sent for have flatly refused the offer and turned aside from the entreaties of the would-be political charmers.

Now this is really too bad, and as the Telegram has always been recognized to take the part of a "Good Samaritan" toward our unfortunate brethren of the press in all difficulties and distresses, perhaps a suggestion to-day would help out our friends somewhat. Anyhow it can do no possible harm and might materially assist the Opposition in providing still more amusement for the general public. As most of all the pictures shown on the cinematograph screens in the city are taken from foreign scenes, subjects and characters, a local drama once in a while should prove interesting, as well as amusing—no pun intended this time—and to fill up the cast of characters in the election farce of St. John's East, Messrs. Coaker and Squires should get up a sweepstake, placing the names of the committee and chief supporters in the hat of Dr. Campbell, the names, of course to be written on "scrips" of paper. This is done during Regatta time. On drawing, the three names that come out first, should be pledged to accept the L.R.P. ticket. It goes without saying that Dr. Campbell, who is a real sport, would not only loan his hat for the occasion, but would also act as master of ceremonies, and would see that no sleight of hand was performed, and that fair play would be guaranteed to all.

This suggestion is offered our genial contemporaries, who it is hoped will not take it as being out of either time or place, as it goes to show that the Telegram is, as usual, ever ready to assist in relieving the mental anxiety and worry under which our good friends of the Opposition are straining at the moment. Should it not be approved that Dr. Campbell draw the scrips from the hat, there is Doctor Mosdell upon whom to fall back, and who would assuredly take a hand in it. It is, however, painfully obvious that the general run of the oppositionists will see the utter futility of exhibiting their selections to the people of St. John's East, or in fact, in any other district, but they must make a showing, and

such an exhibition will, at least, give them an opportunity to shout for the purpose of keeping up their waning courage.

Many a dramatic company has been obliged to perform before a very small audience, and, although the efforts of the Squires-Coaker troupe will not be the success they fondly imagine, it will help the general public to pass a week or so in pleasantly viewing the antics of the political acrobats of the Opposition in their barren attempts to scale the walls of the impregnable ramparts of the Government. Comedy always takes with the people of Newfoundland. Of course if the ultra-conscientious mind of Hon. R. A. Squires revolts at the terrible crime of a sweepstake on a Sunday, for instance, like the good Sabbatarian that he undoubtedly is, he could easily absent himself from the drawing and his way to Harbor Main.

It cannot be supposed that the Coaker-Squires agglomeration have much hope of the success of their operations to capture the Government. They have already exhausted all their supplies of munitions in the form of vituperation, malice and abuse of the Government, individually and collectively. To the mind of students of history both the Coaker and the Squires factions bear a strong resemblance to the rebellious citizens of Capua a long time ago. The story is worth telling. Pacuvius Calavius, ascertaining that his townspeople were up in arms against the Government undertook to cure them of their discontent, and caused the Senators to be shut up in prison—the first step toward carrying out his plans. Next he called the contumacious populace together in the market place of the city and having told them what he had done, thus addressed them:

"Now you have your tyrants at your mercy. They are unarmed and helpless, and you can have your revenge. One by one they will be brought before you, that you may accuse and judge them. I will undertake to carry out your sentences. But there is one condition. As you condemn each one some better man must be chosen in his place: for of course the work of Government must go on."

The discontented citizens cheered, and at the bidding of Pacuvius one called out the name of a Senator against whom he had a particular grudge and said: "Let _____ take his place." At this the others began to protest and at least a hundred charges were preferred against the citizen chosen to fill the office of the condemned. The second and third senatorial accusations were heard amidst a similar confusion, until it became evident that the matter, as Pacuvius had shrewdly guessed, could never be settled in the way he had proposed. One by one the people stole away from the market place, each man having made up his mind that the old senators were after all the better law makers, and the easiest way out was to cease complaining and not run the risk of doing worse by making a change of rulers.

Truly for the sake of peace of mind—if there were no higher or nobler reason—it is very much better to—
"Bear those ills we have
Than fly to others that we know not of."

And so it is with the people of this dominion. Even the oil and water concoction of Coaker-Squiresism will be refused, and though every effort will be made to administer the impossible mixture by the party physicians, Messrs. Campbell and Mosdell, through the columns of their party press and otherwise, Newfoundlanders know

when they are well off, and will not surrender a certainty for an uncertainty.

The Manifesto.

On another page in this issue is published the Manifesto of the Hon. Sir M. P. Cashin, Prime Minister of Newfoundland, and leader of the Liberal Progressive Party. The attention of the public is directed to the contents of this document, which is clear cut and incisive, stating in the plainest terms and unadorned by flowery verbiage, the position of the dominion as it is: the record of the Liberal Progressive Government since its assumption of office in May last, and the legislative programme it is proposed to adopt in the future. The Manifesto is the plain statement of a leader who is desirous of placing the issues before the electors as lucidly and concisely as possible, and the Premier has done this in a manner which will appeal to all sorts and conditions of Newfoundlanders. He has addressed himself directly to the producers, and his assurances of co-operation and assistance by the Government will be heartily appreciated by all.

Space to-day does not permit a more lengthy review of the Manifesto. That will be a pleasure to be attended to later. In the meantime the people are asked to read and consider if the Manifesto of Sir Michael Cashin is not one of the most business-like and statesman-like documents that has ever been presented to them.

Qualification of Candidates.

The following questions and answers are printed for the guidance of our readers:

1. What net income must a candidate be in receipt of to qualify him for nomination?
Ans. According to Section 48, Sub-Section A of the Election Act, 1889, the candidate must be in receipt of a net income of four hundred and eighty dollars per year, and he must specify the source of his income.
2. Is there any property qualification?
Ans. The same Section of the Act provides that, if otherwise qualified, the candidate must be possessed of property clear of all incumbrances of two thousand four hundred dollars, in amount or value, and he must describe it particularly.
3. If a candidate not having either of these qualifications, took the necessary oaths to ensure his nomination, what would happen?
Ans. He would be guilty of Perjury.
4. If a voter gave such a candidate a vote would it be any good?
Ans. No. It would be a vote thrown away and wasted.

TO THE PEOPLE OF NEWFOUNDLAND:

Gentlemen,—I was entrusted by His Excellency the Governor in May last, with the duty of forming a new Government, and with the aid of members of the Assembly who had been in Opposition to the so-called National Government, I was successful in forming an administration, which now, as the Liberal-Progressive Party, appeals for your support, on the record it has made during the few months it has been in office, and the policy which I shall outline herein.

AS TO THE PAST AND PRESENT.

The record of the new Government is brief, for it came into office at the far-end of a session of the Legislature, without opportunity to formulate a policy. Brief though that record be, it is marked, I submit, by capacity and regard for the interests of the public.

Coastal Steam was forced upon the new Government for action at the very outset of its career. Provision for renewing the Bowring contract had not been made in time. The contractors for that service were only willing to renew it upon terms which permitted them to very largely increase passengers and freight rates for a ten-year period. Whilst recognizing that increased rates were reasonable under existing circumstances, the new Government felt that within so long a time as ten years, transportation by sea might be expected to become cheaper, and therefore that ten years was too long a term for a contract. The contractors were asked to accept a shorter term, and refused, asking, at the same time, for much higher rates for freight and passengers than they had tendered for. The Government therefore purchased the S. S. Prospero and the S. S. Fortia and they are now being operated by the Department of Shipping, at the rates first stipulated for by the contractors, which rates, it is hoped, may be made lower in the future.

The high cost of living has been agitating this Colony, in common with all other parts of the civilised world, and here, as elsewhere, the problem is how to make prices lower or earnings greater. The new Government has appointed a Commission, as representative as it is possible to make it, to enquire into the whole question, and to recommend remedial measures, and the Government pledges itself to take drastic steps to enforce those recommendations which may hold out even a reasonable prospect of improving existing conditions.

The classification and pay of persons in the various branches of the Public Service has for a long time been unsatisfactory. The increased cost of living has of course borne even harder upon salaried people than upon any other class, and has exaggerated long-standing hardships. A Commission of experienced and competent men has been appointed to enquire into and report upon the whole subject, and that report will be promptly dealt with when received.

A contract for the construction and operation of a modern long-distance telephone system on the Peninsula of Avalon has been entered into with a Company incorporated in this Colony, and which expects to raise its capital here, and I am confident that this long needed public utility will soon be in operation.

Coal-boring operations near Howley station, on the main line of railway, have been undertaken, and are now progressing satisfactorily, and I am hopeful that coal-bearing measures economically valuable will be found thus solving a question of first importance to the industries of the Colony.

AS TO THE FUTURE.

RAILWAYS.

It is provided by contract that the railway system of the Colony shall be operated "efficiently and continuously," and that it shall be "maintained in a safe, efficient, and satisfactory manner." It is undeniable that for years the contracts have not been kept in either particular. The difficulties naturally incident to the operation of new railways explained and excused this, to a certain extent, for a few

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years, and surrounding conditions during the Great War prolonged the period, but it is manifest that radical improvements are now essential, and earnest, vigorous efforts shall be made to bring these about. Measures for re-railing, and for providing adequate equipment, are in contemplation, and when these have been negotiated and executed, great improvement in operation will follow. A change in the location of the main line, so as to swing it more towards Hall's Bay, and branches to Hall's Bay and round the north side of Bonavista Bay, to a port in Fogo District, will be undertaken. Partially constructed branch lines will be completed and extended as rapidly as financial conditions permit.

CATTLE CLAIMS COMMISSIONER.

In this connection I have to announce that the Government have now in preparation a plan for the investigation by a Claims Commissioner, of all accidents to animals killed or injured upon the railway, whereby the liability shall be ascertained without delay and without right of appeal, and under which all losses for which the Reid-Mid. Co. is found to be liable shall be paid by it forthwith, or if the Company is declared not to be liable, shall be paid by the Government. In taking this step the Government recognizes the universal practice to turn animals at large to graze, and feels that the owners of the cattle killed or injured while grazing are entitled to compensation, which ought not to be delayed, and about which they should not be put to such trouble as in the past.

STEAM SERVICE.

The local and foreign steam service of the Colony was dislocated by the Great War, and can be but slowly restored to its former efficiency. Nevertheless, the Government has already received preliminary propositions, at least, for the establishment of a line of suitable steamers between a port in England, on the one side, and the United States of America, on the other, via St. John's and Halifax, N. S., and entertains with favor a proposal to adequately subsidize such a line.

It is also proposed by the Government to add new boats, as soon as prices will permit, to the Coastal and Labrador service, by purchase or charter, and to operate them under the Department of Shipping or by contract—whichever method may promise the most efficiency, economy and public satisfaction. It is suggested that one or more of the coastal boats might be used during the winter between St. John's and a port in Nova Scotia. It is also proposed that quite adequate waterside premises shall be acquired in St. John's and fitted up for the use of the coastal boats, so as to expedite and cheapen the handling of freight.

HOSPITAL ACCOMMODATION.

There has recently arisen a pressing demand for outport hospital accommodation, and the Government has already contributed to the establishment of hospitals at Harbour Grace and Twillingate, and proposes to do so for several other places, in aid of local effort. It is my opinion that a clear-cut policy of aiding such effort, and to establish convenient regional hospitals on the East, West and Southern coasts, should be propounded and adopted, so that equality of treatment to all sections may be afforded, and I think that all such hospitals should be affiliated to the General Hospital at St. John's, so that the medical and nursing staffs may be co-ordinated in effort. Under such a system, nurses could be partially trained in outport hospitals, complete their training at the General Hospital, and thus, while affording to outport hospitals the advantage of good and sufficient nursing staffs, be afforded an opportunity to obtain valuable graduating certificates as rewards for work well done.

OLD AGE-PENSIONS.

If it has been the practice for several years to vote annually a lump sum for Old Age Pensions, to divide the sum per capita amongst the Districts, and in each District to give Fifty Dollars per year to applicants seventy-five years of age, or older, residing in the District, as far as the District amount would permit. The system is

not satisfactory. In some Districts there has not been enough money, while in others there has been, at times, too much, and the total amount has never been enough to provide for all deserving and qualified applicants. I propose that henceforth a sum sufficient for all qualified applicants of seventy-five years of age shall be voted. I hope that the condition of the Colony's finances will permit me to propose also an allowance for women of the same age.

GOOD ROADS.

The Local and Main Line Road Grants, annually given, are insufficient for maintenance, and afford nothing whatever for improvement of existing roads and the construction of new ones. Not so long ago, one dollar per day was considered sufficient for men doing road work. To-day they cannot be employed for twice that amount. The improved condition of the people generally has resulted in greater use being made of the roads for vehicular traffic, and I am convinced, too, that new and good roads, linking up settlements now having little communication with each other, would very greatly benefit the people by increased intercourse. For all these reasons the Government propose that local and main line grants for maintenance shall be increased, and that a liberal special vote shall be made for improvements and construction, where most needed, with a view of creating a system of connecting roads between places now practically remote from each other.

EDUCATION.

An unusual degree of public interest has been manifested recently in the subject of Education generally, and very great generosity has been displayed by citizens in subscriptions to so-called "drives." Incidentally there has arisen in some quarters a demand for un-denominational schools, or, at least, for united Protestant schools, and I have been requested to state the policy of the new Government on this point. Briefly, it is this:—That there has been no sufficient expression of public opinion to warrant the Government in proposing any change in the basis of the existing system. When any denominations shall have unmistakably expressed, through their duly constituted authorities, their desire for united schools, the Government will not oppose that desire, but it will not, of its own motion, propose or forward such a union. But the Government does feel that a better education for every child in the Colony is the supreme goal of the hour. The King has said:—"I am convinced that nothing is more essential to national prosperity and happiness than education. The potentialities of the physical, mental and spiritual life of every community should be developed to the fullest extent. A true education would embrace all this; would cultivate them, in due proportion, and would transform our national life into a generation."

TEACHERS.

The new Government has recently increased teachers' salaries generously, effective from the first of July last, but recognizing that inequalities and insufficiency of pay will still exist, the Government propose to appoint a Commission, on which the teachers will be directly represented, to study and report upon the whole subject and upon classification and standardization. This Commission shall be appointed as soon as the teachers' representation can be chosen, so that the report may be ready for the next meeting of the Assembly. It has been represented to me that there are a number of aged retired school teachers who have never been eligible for pensions under existing schemes. They cannot now be many, but should, I think, be provided for. Just how it can be equitably done will require examination by the Commission, but help should be given the deserving.

THE FISHERIES.

The Fisheries far exceed all other resources of the Colony in value, and upon their successful prosecution depends, and must continue to depend, the prosperity of our people. Catch-

ing and price are the elements upon which success is based. To conserve existing fisheries and to discover new ones; to promote improvement in culture, and to enlarge old markets and procure others, are objects which the new Government will vigorously aim at. Valuable fisheries the Colony once possessed have been destroyed, and so the Herring and Lobster fisheries may be, unless carefully conserved. Quality is the greatest factor in the sale of all produce, especially food, and if the cure of our fish, and the methods of transporting it to the consumer, were better, the prices obtainable would be greatly increased. Better cure, better handling, will go far towards giving us better prices. The time and circumstances seem very opportune for investigating all that is wrapped up in the subject of marketing fish, and the Government pledges itself to make an aggressive and persistent enquiry, and to seek new and extended markets.

The President of the F.P.U. recently proposed that the Government, under the authority of the War Measures Act, shall (1) fix a price at which the fishermen shall sell their fish to exporters; (2) a price at which fish shall be sold for export; (3) that exporters shall be guaranteed by the Colony against loss; and (4) that a conference of exporters and the Government should be convened to discuss the situation. I immediately replied that fixing selling prices and guaranteeing exporters against loss would throw all the possible loss on the taxpayers, but leave to the exporters all possible gain. But I said that his suggestion for a conference sounded reasonable, and as he was himself a heavy exporter of fish, I suggested that he should be invited to the matter; I asked him to discuss it with the exporters; and I have heard no more from him about it, but have read, in a recent statement by him, in certain newspapers, that the members of the Board of Trade refused to cooperate.

If the proposals referred to be logically considered, it will be realized that they are fantastically absurd. Their real object was to enable the proposer to buy and export fish at the public expense, with an off chance that he would make a profit. Relying upon a Government guarantee, he could buy any quality and quantity of fish, sell it in destructive competition with other exporters, and throw the whole loss upon the taxpayers of the country. Besides, to fix a price at which the fishermen would be compelled to sell might at any time actually force them to take a lower price than they would have been otherwise able to get. In 1918 Mr. Coker proposed that 312 per quintal should be fixed as a price, but later in the year it sold for 116 in the open market here. The most utter and inextinguishable confusion would result from an endeavour to put Mr. Coker's scheme into effect. It would, I believe, destroy the stability of the fish trade of the Colony, and give our prosperity such a blow as would not be recovered from in a generation.

LOCAL INCORPORATION.

The Local Affairs Act, 1914, was enacted to provide for the free election of road boards. The opportunity thus afforded was seized upon by the President of the Fishermen's Protective Union as a means of forwarding his political ends. He instructed the Councils of the Union to arrange, wherever possible, that only members of the Union should be elected to sit on Boards, and, where that was not possible, to procure a majority of seats at least. As a consequence of such "log-rolling" tactics, many boards passed under the control of the Union Councils, often a minority of the whole people in the jurisdiction, and many partisan and improper things were done in consequence. It has been amply demonstrated, in fact, that the control of local affairs did not pass to the people concerned, but, through the medium of secret Union caucuses, to the domination of Mr. Coker, and that the authority formerly exercised by the Governor-in-Council was, in fact,

being exercised by the President of the F.P.U., with damage to the general public interest. It has, however, become apparent, not only in relation to roads and marine works, but as to hospitals, health, sanitation, and many matters of local importance, that a general measure should be enacted under which towns, settlements, sections, and even whole districts, may be incorporated, with large powers over a variety of local affairs, upon the request of their inhabitants, with the approval of the Governor-in-Council, and the boundaries of such areas defined by Proclamation, so that the confidence of administration may be considered in relation to each community.

MINES AND MINERALS.

The Government proposes to inaugurate a complete survey of the mining, timber and agricultural resources of the Colony. It will undertake an energetic search after mineral deposits by competent scientific and practical men, and stimulate search by liberal bounties. Resources known to exist need more advertising by the dissemination of reliable reports, and in this connection the High Commissioner's Office in London can be of much assistance. The High Commissioner has recommended the proposed survey, in consequence of representations made to him abroad.

AGRICULTURE.

Better organization of existing methods for encouraging agriculture is needed. A system of bounties for land-clearing, cattle-raising, stock-raising and crop development should be adopted. The transportation of produce to market should be improved. Agencies for bringing producer and customer together should be instituted. Teaching agriculture scientifically and practically should be undertaken. And the new Government will devote its energies to all these things, under competent advice.

TIMBER.

The Colony has ample resources for the establishment of several timber, pulp and paper mills, on large scales, and the Government will encourage their establishment. The forests on the Labrador will not be made use of by mills established there, so short could be utilized by bringing the wood to this Colony for manufacture. The Government will encourage this. It proposes to legislate for a system of scientific re-forestation, believing that thereby the forest wealth of the Colony can be increased and conserved.

LIGHT-HOUSES, FOG-ALARMS, AND LIFE-SAVING STATIONS.

Though much has been done in recent years for safe-guarding the lives of those who do business on the great waters, and the vessels that pass about our coasts, much remains to be done, and shall be done, by building more light-houses and fog-alarms, and by establishing life-saving stations and coast guards at the more dangerous places.

RETURNED SOLDIERS.

The Colony is paying Soldiers' pensions on the scale adopted in Canada. The Government has in course of arrangement a scheme for aiding dependents of deceased soldiers, who are not helped under existing rules. It is the intention of the Government, also, to provide for the establishment of returned soldiers on land or in the fisheries on the general lines which are being followed in Canada, but adapted to the peculiar conditions of this Colony.

TELEGRAPHS AND TELEPHONES.

The Postal Telegraph system has been considerably extended within recent years, and telephone lines have been erected in sections where the business to be done would not justify the opening of telegraph offices. It is the new Government's intention to extend the service still more generously.

CO-OPERATIVE ASSOCIATIONS.

Certain vote-seeking politicians are endeavouring to persuade the members of organizations with which they are connected that the new Government is unfriendly to them. I take

this occasion, therefore, to say that the Government will aid every organization or movement tending to the moral or material uplift of its promoters by means not detrimental to the general public.

It has been misrepresented that special persistence that the Government is opposed to the Fishermen's Protective Union. But the truth is that the Government is desirous of aiding the co-operative efforts of the Union in trade and industry, and is only opposed to the endeavours of its President and its subservient personal followers to seize the reins of power in public affairs, and to impose his autocratic rule upon the whole people. Government of the people should be by the people, and not by a man self-imposed upon them by the mis-use of his position. The prosperity of the Union is, in truth, placed in jeopardy only by the endeavour of its President to make himself a political dictator to the Colony, and that prosperity would best be served if the members of the Union would insist that it should be withdrawn from political partizan struggles.

PROHIBITION.

The enforcement of the Act prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors has done much good; few persons would care to have it repealed. Unfortunately, new evils have arisen through the illicit manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages and dangerous concoctions. There is, too, a widespread suspicion that by the sale of "script" certain medical men are profitably evading the intent of the Act. The Government, therefore, proposes to appoint a representative commission to consider and report upon the manner in which, while prohibition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage shall be strictly enforced, and the making and selling of substitutes prohibited under the severest penalties, it may be made possible to procure script for such liquor as physicians or other qualified persons may prescribe as necessary for medicinal purposes without unreasonable charges. The report of the Commission shall then be laid before the Legislature and people for consideration, and any legislation it may call for, and which is enacted by the Legislature, shall be submitted to the people for adoption or rejection by referendum.

FACTIONS IN OPPOSITION.

A small faction of persons opposed to the new Government have recently organized as the "Liberal Reform Party," and this self-styled band has accepted the leadership of the Hon. R. A. Squires. More recently Mr. W. F. Coker has attached himself and those he controls, to those Liberal Reformers, and submitted nominally to the leadership of Mr. Squires. These men were once colleagues in the National Government, and afterwards each freely expressed his opinion that the other was unworthy of confidence. They are neither Liberals nor Reformers, nor are the men so far announced as their colleagues, and the intelligence of the Colony will conclude, I believe, that no greater confidence should be placed in the candidates than the leaders have in each other.

CUSTOMS TARIFF.

Politicians out of office, seeking to catch the public ear, call for reduction in the Customs tariff on imports, and condemn the policy of accumulating a surplus of revenue yearly, but I am of opinion that large tariff reductions should not be promised at this time, because large expenditures on public improvements will be necessary, and also because continual tinkering with the Customs tariff is detrimental to industrial and manufacturing enterprises. Large annual surpluses tend to improve public credit, and credit is the world's money market; is essential to that large development of the Colony's resources at which the new Government aims. Having regard to the fact that, outside St. John's, no Municipal taxes are levied, the burden of taxation in this Colony is light in comparison with other countries. It is noteworthy that the

revenue now collected is not so large in proportion to the Colony's total trade as it was ten years ago.

FLOOD TIDE OF PROSPERITY.

When I entered public life, in 1902, the deposits in banks in this Colony amounted to about one million dollars; to-day they total twenty millions; then a small amount of debentures were held in investments; to-day over ten millions of dollars' worth are held. The first full year after I became Minister of Finance and Customs, 1909-10, the revenue about \$3,447,589; the last year it was about \$9,000,000, and for the first two months of the current financial year, it has largely exceeded the record. In 1909-10 the total imports and exports amounted to \$24,624,933; in 1918-19 to about \$50,000,000. The loans we have recently floated have been oversubscribed, and applications to purchase our bonds are constantly being received. I mention these facts because they eloquently refute the pessimists who croak of hard times, and prophecy disaster. As the Colony's Finance Minister for ten years, including all the period of the Great War, I assert that never has prosperity been so great and general in this Colony as now, and never have the people enjoyed so much of the fatness of the earth, and the fullness of good things. I foresee even better things. There is reason to believe that the Colony's expenditure in the Great War will be returned to it, as its share of the indemnity paid by the Empire's defeated foes. The value of the timber and mineral resources of the Colony is constantly increasing. There is good reason to hope that coal in commercially valuable form will be developed. Applications already received indicate the establishment of large pulp and timber mills. Recently a most substantial project for agricultural and other development in the Codroy Valley has been received, and it is being favorably considered. For these, and for many other reasons, I look to the future with confidence that the Colony can not only maintain her independence, but can attain a degree of prosperity far exceeding that of the past. Prudence, courage, sagacity in our rulers, and a strong determination by the people not to depart from the safe and sane lines upon which the Colony has developed so well, will carry the Colony on. We need to maintain faith in ourselves, and in each other, and should turn our faces from the fantastic notions proposed by socialistic and bolshevistic seekers after place and power.

RELYING UPON THE INTELLIGENCE OF MY FELLOW-COUNTRYMEN.

I confidently ask them to support the candidates of the Liberal-Progressive Party, of which I have the honor to be the leader, and the new Government, of which I am proud to be the Premier.

TO THE ELECTORS OF BONAVISTA DISTRICT.

My dear Friends, Elected by acclamation for your District in 1914, as an Independent, after having been its representative for twenty years, and having, I believe, faithfully discharged my duty towards you, I now appeal with confidence for your votes for my colleagues and myself at the approaching General Election of members of the House of Assembly. If any man intends to vote for one of us, he should vote for all, and I urge my special friends to do so.

I have been honoured by the consent of Captain William Winsor, of Westerville, and Dr. C. A. Forbes, of Bonavista, to become my colleagues as candidates, and I am confident that you will elect us as colleagues to represent you in the Assembly. Captain Winsor was one of your representatives during 1909-1913, and although defeated in the latter year, has resumed in your esteem, I know, the place he held before. Dr. Forbes is a native of the town wherein he resides, who has and deserves the respect and confidence of his neighbors as he will yours also, when you come to know him as they do. In these men residing on their respective sides of the Bay, and myself here at headquarters, you will have representatives qualified to serve you, and certain to do so, in a manner never excelled and seldom equalled in the history of your District.

I have joined with my colleagues in the foregoing address upon District

matters, but feel that something more will be expected of me. By his paper, the Advocate, by his speeches in the Assembly, and lastly by a recent "Appeal" to you, on behalf of himself and his colleagues, Mr. W. F. Coaker has vigorously and persistently assailed me, and I should be considered lacking in courage if I did not reply.

Many of you have been or are members of the F.P.U.—the "Union" as it is called—and quite a number are shareholders in the various enterprises carried on at Port Union. It has been vehemently charged of late that I am an enemy of the Union, and desire to injure the shareholders, and this charge will be vigorously dinied into your ears during the next few weeks by my opponents. Both charges are absolutely and entirely false, and both are made for the sole purpose of catching the votes of the unwary.

I was, in reality, a Union man in spirit long years before the F.P.U. was called into existence. The Seafarers' Strike was the first fishermen's union in the Colony, and I led it on to victory. I was Counsel for the F.P.U. from 1912 to 1918. I spoke with acceptance at its Convention in Catalina in 1914. "Morine," the Advocate said in May last, "was always the friend of the Union."

But friends, the "Union" I acted for and befriended was established to lower the prices of supplies and to increase the prices of fish, and the Union, as now managed, charges you the highest prices, and pays you the lowest, and from being a blessing to you, has become a burden, and may be a disaster if not directed in right ways.

The "Union" I assisted, befriended and advocated was to be an influence in the Colony for the public good, not seeking the benefit of its members only, but aiming to uplift the whole people; not desiring to grasp the reins of exclusive power, and the profits of place for itself, but to control for the general good, by beneficent influences, the exercise of power by others. These high ideals have been departed from by the President of the Union and it has been prostituted by him, and by some of his adherents, to base ends. He has attempted to make himself autocrat of the whole Colony, by misuse of his power, not to advance the Union's cause, but to satisfy his own insatiable ambition, and many of his followers, aping him, have become little autocrats in your District and elsewhere. His leadership has become a menace to your liberties.

I desire to see the Union re-established in its original condition, to be resurrected under new and saner leadership, to be confined to its original and commendable purposes, and this, I believe, is the only course which will safeguard the investments which many fishermen have made in union enterprises. I am satisfied that no President of the Union who is actively engaged in politics can adequately protect the money confided to his care. I am persuaded that ruin only can wait upon enterprises which are so mixed up in political warfare that they must share in its violent ups and downs. I say to the shareholders and depositors of the Union especially that it is because I am in truth their devoted friend far wiser and more unselfish than their President, that I refuse to submit to his dictation in public affairs, and

that this refusal is the reason, the sole reason, for the violent attacks made upon me. It is not expedient that I should speak the plainly bare of certain matters, but by the memory of all that I have done for them in past years, I plead with Union members to listen to my warning voice, and to aid my efforts to protect their own interests.

In a manifesto to you, issued by Mr. Coaker, he charges that I deserted you when I left the Colony in 1906, but he knew of that fact, if it were one, in 1912, when he urged me to return and become Counsel for the F.P.U., and when he endorsed me, in 1914, as a candidate, and you elected me as your member. He charged me with deserting again in 1916, but in the spring of this very year he agreed that I should not be opposed if I stood again for your votes; and—will you believe it—it is true—he strongly advised and actively induced me to go to Toronto in 1916, to reside there. For many years I have served you well in public life, with less reward in place and power than most men have got who have served so long, and I claim, and you will grant my right, to accept any offer which enables me to procure a livelihood for myself and family. If I go away, I return, and whether here or elsewhere, I always seek to serve you well. If my going was no loss to you, why blame me; and if it were a loss, give me credit for coming back, and thank me for it by your votes.

In his manifesto, addressed to all you electors, as well as those who are not members of the Union as those who care, Mr. Coaker fairly threatens that if not elected in Bonavista Bay, he "will retire from every commercial activity in connection with the F.P.U. and as manager of the operations at Port Union." That would be the very best thing that could happen to the shareholders and depositors. That is the one thing, in my opinion, which would give shareholders and depositors a chance to realize their money. Many a good promoter has proven to be a poor controller, and Mr. Coaker's place, as the manager of Union interests could be filled with a far abler and saner executive.

But let us examine this childish threat. Why should you, who are neither shareholders nor depositors, be bullied into voting for Mr. Coaker by his threat of desertion? Why should the care of your district affairs be committed to the mercies of Mr. Coaker and his servants because if not elected, he will resign from Port Union, with which you have nothing to do? Why should each every one of you be bound to the wheels of Mr. Coaker's chariot?

And to you, who are shareholders and depositors, I wish to point this out; that your safety lies in the wise and prudent care of business affairs at Port Union, not in Mr. Coaker's dominance in political life, and that if you allow him to remain a fighting politician and your business manager at the same time, he must neglect your business, and also call down upon it the opposition of every other interest in the colony. The care of your dollars demands that your business manager shall attend to your investments, and not to politics. But look farther into this threat of Mr. Coaker's and see what it really means. You shareholders in Bonavista Bay number only six hundred out of sixty-three hundred electors, and there are several thousand Union shareholders in other districts. Yet Mr. Coaker says that, even if you vote for him, but he is defeated by the votes of non-shareholders, he will desert you, and all the shareholders outside your District as well; will abandon Port Union; and will allow the investments there to be lost. What a shameful threat to make! What callous indifference to your interests to show on Mr. Coaker's part! But you need not fear, if such a threat could make you fear, for Mr. Coaker defeated will be glad to go back to Port Union, and the enjoyment of a bungalow, motor boat and car provided at your expense. His best work was done before he entered political life, and he would be a better servant to you if he were confined to the care of your business.

Mr. Coaker's references to the unfortunate Flat Islands affair are so obviously made, not out of any real sympathy with the people concerned, but to incense them to vote against me, that I shall mention it but briefly. The police were resisted; a larger posse was resisted, with a show of violence; and the Government sent H.M.S. Cornwall with a third detachment to overcome the resistance—necessary and prudent exercise of power, but for which greater harm might eventually result. As Minister of Justice I concurred in that, as I was in honor bound to concur, but while responsible with my colleagues for all that followed, it is a fact that personally I was not a party to it, except to the release of the men on bonds. The men of Flat Islands were badly advised—some day we shall know by whom. Obedience to law and order is the safeguard of good citizens. Had they come to me then, and explained their reasons for resisting, I could, perhaps, have helped them. They went instead, to other sources for advice, and the consequence was regrettable. I hope to be able to help a community for which I have always had a sincere regard and abiding friendship—help it far more effectively than Mr. Coaker can ever do.

There was one cognate subject to which Mr. Coaker did not refer. I mean his record on Conscription. He promised unionists that no Conscription law should ever be passed without their consent, but the law was enacted with his aid and approval, and without their consent, and while he was a member of the National Government, a force of soldiers, armed with rifles and bayonets, were sent to Bonavista town to overawe conscripted men. He will find it difficult, I think, to arouse enmity to me about the Flat Islands matter without answering for his own conduct concerning Conscription.

By my appointment as Minister of Justice and to a seat in the Executive Council, I have been placed in a position of greater influence, as affecter for District affairs, than I have held for many years. I have already been able to exert that influence for the benefit of the District. If continued as your representative, I shall, with the aid of my colleagues, be able to give you better service than ever before. Mr. Coaker has appealed to you to vote to keep him in power as President of the F.P.U. I ask you to vote

for me as Member for Bonavista Bay. His appeal is chiefly to the Unionists amongst you; mine is to all of you, Unionists and non-Unionists. He mixes and muddles your District affairs with Union matters, and evidently wants to run these affairs for his own purposes, while I want to manage your affairs for your own benefit. Which can serve you best?

Mr. Coaker asks you to vote for candidates of the so-called "Liberal Reform Party" led by a man whom he recently called "that black rascal Squires." You have read how Mr. Coaker, in the House of Assembly, a little over a year ago, charged Mr. Squires with corruptly receiving money from the Reid Company, while Colonial Secretary. You have read how Mr. Squires, in the Legislative Council, declared, at or about the same time, that "Coaker is untrustworthy, sets self-interest before the welfare of the country, is an offence to honest men and true—a stumbling block in the way of patriotic effort, and an example of petty meanness and self-seeking politics." You have read, too, how Mr. Coaker endeavoured to have Mr. Squires dismissed from the Legislative Council, for misconduct in public office. And you know that Mr. Squires established his paper, the Star to destroy Mr. Coaker as a public man. Those of you who are members of the F.P.U., are aware that, at the Catalina Convention in 1918, Mr. Coaker procured the adoption of resolutions demanding a public enquiry into the alleged misconduct of Mr. Squires—an enquiry which has never been held.

In view of these things said by them about each other—and not one of them withdrawn to this moment—is it not an insult to your intelligence to ask you to support Mr. Coaker and his colleagues under the leadership of Mr.

Squires? Is it not especially an insult to you who are Unionists?

Mr. Coaker induced me to return to this Colony in 1912, and made me Counsel for the F.P.U.; he asked my support when he was a candidate in 1913, and gave me his support in 1914; in the spring of this year he agreed not to oppose me as a candidate for Bonavista Bay, and, through his paper, the Advocate, he declared that "Morine had always been the friend of the Union." But now he revels in republishing about me every vile slander that my enemies have been able to concoct during thirty-five years of public life. He seeks to arouse against me every base passion. He denounced Mr. Squires and now supports him. He supported me, and now denounces me. Does his conduct not prove beyond possibility of denial that, as Mr. Squires has said of him, "He is an example of petty meanness and self-seeking politics," or, as Sir Robert Bond has said or implied of him, that he is "disloyal, treacherous, untrustworthy and a menace to public life."

My dear Bonavista District friends, you and your parents have known me intimately for nearly thirty-five years. Most of that which is so violently charged against me now, you and they have heard and considered in days gone by, and by their votes the electors of your District have again and again refuted the slanders, and confounded the slanderers. Shall we not again fight the good fight, shoulder to shoulder, and again win a notable victory? My work for you and yours is known to all of you, and upon that record I base my confident call upon you to "Stand Fast!"



From a recent Magazine we have copied the following. We only need to add, Papers to suit all requirements can be had at our Store.

1. Thou shalt heed the call of Plain quiet wall papers and white woodwork wherever such is possible.
2. Thou shalt lighten dark rooms by the use of light-hued, yellow-tinted wall paper, that suggests the blessed sunshine.
3. Thou shalt see that thy walls and thine own personality are not to forward, but modestly retiring.
4. Thou shalt use no large-patterned wall papers against which to hang thy pictures. The one will kill the other.
5. Thou shalt have no centerpiece or cornerpieces upon thy ceiling, but only a very nearly plain expanse of light color.
6. Thou shalt have thy fill of bright tints, and delicate designs for bedrooms and boudoirs, but for drawing-rooms, dining-rooms, libraries and halls, thou shalt be compelled to use less frivolous papers.

9. Thou shalt use attention-compelling cut out borders, or conventionally designed strips for divisions between walls and ceiling.
10. Thou shalt remember at all times that thy wall paper is but a background against which to show thy pictures, thy furniture, and thy friends.
