Tragic Occurrences at Antofagasta

Arrival from Chilean Port Tells of Brutal Killing of an Englishman.

Was Stoned to Death by Mob

One Hundred and Twenty Chileans Killed by Troops During Rioting.

Howard Schwerin, a mining engineer, son of P. Schwerin, manager of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, who arrived Saturday from Antofagasta, Chile, on board the British ship Inverclyde, in an interview given to a Colonist reporter told of tragic occurrences during the strike of the waterfront workers at the Chilean port.

"About fifty workers were lost during the rioting," said Mr. Schwerin. "That is a conservative estimate. They were mostly Chileans, though one Englishman was brutally killed. I think he was the only Anglo-Saxon killed. The Englishman, named Rogers, son of a merchant at Iquique, was employed by the Antofagasta & Bolivia Railway, and on the second day of the strike some of the mob mistook him for a Spaniard who was one of the volunteer guards which had killed many strikers on the previous day. Rogers was attacked by the strikers and tried to use his revolver. As revolvers sometimes jam when they are most needed, this one refused to work, and when Rogers found his weapon would not work he took to his heels. The strikers chased him and were overtaking him when he took shelter in the low doorway of a house of a poor man, where he again tried to make use of his revolver, without effect. The strikers, who had him at bay in the doorway, began pelting him with stones and he was soon bleeding as a result of wounds caused by the stones. He took to his heels and ran to the peon's door, and the mob rushed on to him, literally jumping the life from his bruised body under their feet. He was killed by a revolver and fired it point blank in the face of the dead man.

"The rioting started as a result of the attack on the strikers, take the strike from the volunteer guard. The strike followed the organization of the various branches of waterfront workers into a union. The strikers, however, were employed on lighters, and other workers having left work soon after the union was formed. The discovery of a man made in the same manner as Antofagasta, and the strike was well timed. When the strike occurred a number of Spaniards and Chileans, who were employed at Antofagasta, formed what they called a guard of honor and paraded in the plaza, armed with the general populace. Some of the strikers, it seems, were where the guard was assembled and where the rifles were fired from some of them. These men fired at the strikers and about the same time the strikers, who have been called out, arrived on the opposite side of the plaza, and the commander, thinking the strikers were firing on the populace, ordered the rifles to be fired. The two fires, lost a number. In all there were about forty strikers and bystanders killed when the two fires were fired. The strikers were sent ashore to picket the streets. The arrival of the sailors ended the rioting, and quiet was soon restored.

"Antofagasta is booming. Big strikes of nitrate have been made, and the business of Antofagasta is, in consequence, increasing in leaps and bounds. Because of the increased business a new port is being built named Mexilita about ten miles to the north. The strike caused the blockade of much freight on the docks at Antofagasta, and many ships were delayed. I expect that the coming season will be a very busy one in Chile.

"When the British ship Inverclyde was bound north while in the longitude of San Francisco on the date of the earthquake a heavy hurricane was experienced about 5 p.m. The storm was a very sudden one and very heavy. Captain King, of the Inverclyde, said on arrival he thought it was due to the San Francisco disturbance. Of course he had not the faintest idea of any disaster having occurred, and the news has worried me very much. I have sent a telegram enquiring about the safety of my father, Mr. Schwerin, of the Pacific Mail Steamship Co. who was living at the Palace hotel when it was destroyed.

DEATH WAS DUE TO NATURAL CAUSES

Jury's Verdict in Postponed Inquest on Infant Child of Mr. Duval.

(From Tuesday's Daily) The postponed inquest into the cause of the death of May Duval, infant child of Mr. and Mrs. Duval of North Park street, began January 12, was concluded yesterday when the jury returned the following verdict to the coroner, Dr. Hart: "We find that the child May Duval died as a result of natural causes, and from the evidence given there is nothing to indicate that the death of the child was due to the use of Dr. Steadman's Soothing Powders."

He had found no poisonous substance in the contents of the stomach, nor had he found any of the ordinary poisonous substances in the contents of the stomach. "Not finding any poison," he said, "I was unable to make a qualitative analysis; this was not necessary. He had failed to find anything to indicate the cause of the death, but from the evidence he had heard he concluded that death was due to convulsions. It was certainly not due to the medicine that death had resulted."

H. Mitchell a farmer living near Tacoma, on Tuesday found 250 pounds of contraband opium, where it had been concealed by smugglers. It was buried on the banks of the Puyallup river three miles from Tacoma and is part of an opium cache that had been hidden by the launch Ampt ten days ago. Mitchell said that the ground had been newly disturbed and investigated. Customs officers have been out until midnight trying to get a trace of the smugglers. They believe there is some six hundred more pounds of opium cached near Tacoma.
