Since then however, the millers have taken second thought on the subject, and on Saturday last a deputation from the association waited upon the minister of finance with the proposal that the duty on wheat be reduced to ten cents and the duty on flour raised from fifty cents to seventy-five cents per barrel. This change in the millers' proposal probably indicates that they have reasons for believing that the government ontemplates some such alteration of the duties as that last suggested. They have discovered that a reduction of the wheat duty to seven and a half cents cannot be thought of at Ottawa. and now they ask for something that is more likely to be

It is to be hoped that this reading of the probabilities may be verified by the event. For the duties on grain, flour, and coal form together the keystone of the national policy arch, and were they removed the whole fabric would be in danger. Some of our contemporaries, while favoring protective duties on manufactured goods, are coal and flour duties. In doing this they are really trying to undermine the policy they profess to be in favor of. But this would be deciding upon accidental or temporary circumstances merely, instead of upon principles of justice good for all time and applicable to all cases. It is not right tha any private citizen, or any particular body of citizens, should have to pay the costs of determining whether a certain statute passed by a province or by the dominion, is good in law or the reverse. That, we old, is something that should be done by the dominion or the province, or jointly by the authorities of both. No private citizen should ever be placed in such a position that he has to pay for getting a decision to settle whether the dominion or the prov ince has jurisdiction. Such decisions concern the whole community, and should be paid for by the state, not by any individual or association. Every citizen is supposed to know the law, and is compelled to obey it.
