Of the \$6000 to be raised annually the railways would pay \$3000 and the other \$3000 was between the city and Parkdale. They recommended that Parkdale offer as its share \$600 annually for forty years.

In the discussion that followed the councillors showed a desire to get even with the city for the way it acted in regard to the Queen-street subway, but there was an evident feeling that the King-street subway was a desirable thing, and would be an immense advantage to Parkdale. Some of the members doubted if \$600 was large enough, and offered to go \$300, but it was thought advisable to try the City Council with the smaller amount. Councillor Edwards suggested a bonus of \$10,000, and being done with the whole thing, but Mayor Lynd pointed out that by extending the payment over forty years the city twould eventually assume the liabilities of the town, since annexation was only a matter of time.

Alfred Russel Wallace. Alfred Russel Wellace.

This distinguished naturalist, who delivers a course of two lectures in University College next Thursday and Friday evenings, is one of the founders of the evolution theory of the origin of species. Hediscovered, simultaneously with Darwin, facts leading to one of the greatest discoveries of modern science, but at the same time he does not believe in the evolution of man from the anthropoid ane, as does Darwin. Born in 1822, in England, he has been since 1848 a traveler and investigator; he is the author of several books of travels and is a remarkably lucid and interesting lecturer. His lectures are on "The Darwinian Theory" and are delivered under the joint auspices of the Canadian Institute and University College.



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

The Structure to Connect Staten Island With the Mainland.

Washington, March 5.—Erastus Wiman of New York has scored an important triumph in having received the approval of the War Department for the plans of the Arthur Kill Bridge authorized at last session of Congress. These plans were materially altered by the Board of Army Engineers, and as they were hostile to the project the entire Congressional delegation of New Jersey urged Congress to confirm this action by a bill which, however, was defeated, and the War Department yesterday approved of Mr. Wiman's plans. There is, therefore, now no barrier, so far as the United States authorities are concerned, to the immediate construction of the bridge whereby Staten Island is made part of the mainland.
