Four Chinese warships, one French and one American, have been ordered to the coast to take measures for the protection of the Europeans.

Frosts and Floods.

LONDON, Dec. 1.—Severe frosts and snow are reported on the shores of the Mediterranean. Very severe frosts are reported in Spain, and the Pyrenees are impassable. The German rivers have fallen, but are full of ice. Harrow and Posen is estimated at 1,000,000 marks (about \$1,500,000).

HIS PERENNIAL HARVEST.

The Reaper, Death, Bury—244 Inmates—48 Victims of Typhoid, Diphtheria and Scarlet Fever.

At Toronto yesterday 244 funerals during the month of October, which is more than the average of population accounts for on the average.

The saddest record of the past month is the number of infectious and contagious diseases which terminated fatally. Daily carried by medical men there were 23 fatal cases of typhoid, 21 of diphtheria, 12 of scarlet fever, 12 of bronchitis, 12 of pneumonia and 6 of pneumonia.
