For the first death June 11th was a young woman aged 24, native of Scotland, who had earned her own living in this County for several years.

One year before her admission to the Alma House she became a victim to consumption but was able to care for herself until six months before her death, when she came to this institution.

She was given the large sitting room with a bed room off of it and furnished with every care until her death in June. She passed away very peacefully and gratefully to the Matron, Mrs. Lowe, who had attended her with motherly care and patience, and to the many friends she had found among strangers.

The second, a man aged ninety died of paralysis in July after several months' illness in bed.

The third, Charles Sabana, aged seventy-four died of typhoid fever in October. He came to the Alma House the previous December and in January 1901 slipped while in the yard and fractured his thigh near the hip joint.

He was confined to his bed for several weeks, although not using his own legs, and in the spring he again fell and broke his hip and was confined to his bed gradually failed and died of general debility in November.

The general health of the inmates has been good throughout the year. The chief benefit, however, is in removing the direct danger of fire from the number of stoves tended by irregular attendants.

I have also received during the year eight anonymous letters, of these I have taken no notice.

Of the ten cases tried only two convictions were secured and those were when I had no attorney at the trials. The same difficulty exists, namely, the getting of evidence that will stand the test when put on their oath.

At the opening of the year's work I passed the case standing against William Bailey of Wilmet, and after much difficulty he was arrested and taken to Annapolis but paid his fine and costs there and was released.

The two cases secured against Abbie Conn of Chertseyfield could not be collected and she was taken to jail. The remaining old cases gave no count of securing and I made no counts on them.
