ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
ST. GEORGE'S SOCIETY,

For the year ending on the 5th January, 1847.

GENTLEMEN.—The Board of Management of the St. George's Society, on retiring from their respective Offices, have the honor to submit to the Members in general a Report of the proceedings and condition of the Society during the year 1846.

Eleven years have passed since the establishment of our National Society ; and it is not too much to say, that the happy idea which suggested its formation has been carried out to the fullest extent, and with constantly increasing success. Whether we regard the working of the Society, its exertions in the cause of Charity, or the continued harmony of its operations, we have reason to be proud of it as an English Institution ; and we may point triumphantly to its present condition, as a harbinger of long and continued prosperity in days to come.

Notwithstanding the limited means which for some years after its formation were at the disposal of the Society, it appears that from 1836 to 1846, we have expended in charity £817, in aid of the distressed of British origin ; being an average of nearly £75 per annum ; and we now possess a permanent Fund of £1000 bearing interest, which produced during the past year, the sum of £68.

Such being a general view of the condition of our Funds, the Board of Management proceed to furnish a detailed statement of their proceedings during the year.

Soon after the last Annual Meeting on the 5th January, 1846, the Report of the proceedings of the year 1845, with the Reports of the Treasurer, the Physicians, and Sub Committee of Accounts, together with the Statement of cases relieved by the Sub Committee of Charity, were published in pamphlet form ; and copies were distributed to the Members, and forwarded, as is customary, to other Societies, bearing the name of St. George.

It becoming desirable to settle the priority in certain cases of the Members of the Committee of Fifteen, the Society at its Quarterly meeting on the 25th March, confirmed an addition to By-Law, No. 11, made by the Board, to the following effect—and this addition will govern the election of Members of that Committee for the future ; viz :—“ Should there be an equal number
 “ of votes for any of the Members, the oldest Member
 “ shall be considered as entitled to the priority, but a
 “ Life Member of equal date shall be preferred in all
 “ cases : in the event of a tie between two ordinary
 “ Members of the same date, the priority shall be decided by Ballot.”

An additional number of Collars having become requisite on the encrease of the Committee from seven to fifteen, the Board have the satisfaction to state, that these necessary Insignia were procured in time for the celebration of St. George's Day, the expenses being defrayed by private subscription on the part of the Members. The Board beg to record their obligation to the liberality of the gentlemen who contributed thereto, which obviated any outlay from the Funds for the purpose of Decoration—an outlay which would have been justly objected to by the Society. And it may be proper here to mention, that the expense of the Banners and Insignia of the Society, elegant and costly as they are,

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has been altogether defrayed from funds specially subscribed for the purpose, without in the least degree infringing upon those devoted to charitable purposes.

The next event which the Board have to notice, is the celebration of our Anniversary on St. George's Day, as prescribed by the Constitution, the recurrence of which has ever been of absorbing interest with the Society. The Board witnessed with extreme satisfaction, that the celebration of 1846 was conducted with the same order, decorum and success as those of preceding years. The Banner of St. George was displayed at an early hour—a Special General Meeting for the despatch of business was held at ten A. M., when seven new members were elected. At eleven A. M., the Procession was formed in the Place d'Armes, headed by the music of H. M. 89th Regt.—the whole preceded by a strong and stirring muster of the "Sons of St. George," a band of British youths, who with commendable zeal had provided themselves with a Banner of their own in honor of the Day. The early opening of Spring added to the attraction—a bright sun gleamed propitiously on the banners and insignia, and shed its genial influence upon the gay assemblage, on their way in procession to the Cathedral. Divine Service was performed by the Reverend George Mackie, B. A., and an excellent and appropriate sermon was preached by the Revd. R. R. Burrage, both Chaplains to the Society, after which a collection was made in aid of the Charitable Fund, which amounted to £27. The Musical Service was much admired, and reflected the highest credit on the organist, S. S. Codman, Esq., who conducted it, assisted by A. Campbell, Esq., and the ladies and gentlemen amateurs, whose kind assistance was afforded on the occasion. The celebration of the Anniversary was duly concluded by a festive meeting at the St. George's Hotel, where a con-

siderable number of members and friends of the Society sat down to an excellent dinner and English fare. The Representatives of the Sister Societies honored the board with their presence at dinner, and the evening was passed as it will always be by the Sons of St. George, in the interchange of the best feelings of our nature, and in lively reminiscences of the glories of the land whence we derive our origin.

In obedience to the expressed wishes of the Society, the Board was occupied, on the opening of the Parliamentary Session, with the measures necessary to procure the desired Act of Incorporation. By the assistance of G. W. Wicksteed, Esq., whose valuable services were gratuitously afforded, and whose kindness the Board has much pleasure in acknowledging, a Bill was prepared, which having been approved at a full meeting of the Board of Management, reached a second reading in the House of Assembly, and was then referred to a Committee, by whom no Report was made. The Bill consequently fell to the ground ; and it will be for the new Board to carry out the future instruction of the Society on this head.

At the last Annual Meeting the Board of Management had to perform the melancholy task of reporting the calamities by fire and the immense loss of property, experienced by this community in the year 1845 ; while they expatiated with just pride on the succor to an unexampled extent which was dispensed to our suffering people by the generosity of the British nation. The Board regret that they have now to refer to a catastrophe more awful still, which in the month of June last, suddenly deprived many valuable citizens of life under circumstances the most appalling—amongst whom we have to record one of our own members, Mr. J. J. Sims. The Board did not fail to sympathize fully with the

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bereaved widow and family of the deceased brother ; and a letter of condolence was addressed to them, it is hoped in becoming terms, on behalf of the Society.

During the past year a lengthened correspondence has been carried on between the zealous Secretary of this Society and the Secretary of the St. George's Society of Montreal, relative to a division of the expenses of passages by sea for distressed persons of our origin to a British Port. We are happy to state that this Society voted a sum more than sufficient to the joint expense ; and the Board have much pleasure in annexing to this Report a gratifying letter from the Secretary of the Montreal Society, which closed the correspondence, and which demonstrates the good understanding that subsists between the two Societies, and their cordial co-operation in the work of Charity.

It is the pleasing duty of the Board to notice the proceedings of the Sub-Committee of Charity, which have always been of paramount importance with the Members at large. The gentlemen who compose the Charitable Sub-Committee have as usual discharged their duties with zeal and discrimination ; and the Board would be forgetful of their duty, did they fail to remind the Members of the gratitude which the Society owes to them, and particularly to S. Newton, Esq., Secretary, and to Henry Jessopp, Esq., who has so long given his most efficient services in this department, and has assisted the Society in a manner, which only his favorable position could effect. The number of cases in which relief has been granted to the distressed of our origin, during the year 1846, without including the number of individuals actually relieved, amounted to 54, and the relief afforded to £129 9s. 8d., which sum has been expended in passages by sea to a British Port—in transit to Montreal—in donations of money, clothing, pro-

visions, board and lodging, medical attendance and medicine. Full details are given in the Report of the Charitable Sub-Committee, which it is customary to publish for the information of the Members.

The Board beg also to refer to the Treasurer's Report annexed, in which much matter of interest will be found, furnished by Mr. Symes, whose zealous services are justly appreciated by the Society. They also request attention to the able Report of the Sub-Committee of Accounts, which affords most satisfactory details respecting the actual state of the Society's Funds.

The Board of Management have the painful task of reporting an unusual mortality in the Society during the past year. No fewer than eleven Members have died since the last Annual Report, of whom five were Life Members. Amongst them must be specially recorded the great and good Lord Metcalfe, Patron of the Society, whose acute suffering was terminated in his native country on the 5th September. He was born at Fern Hill in Berkshire, and at his decease, was 62 years of age. The Board did not allow this event to pass by without putting their feelings on record in the following Resolution, which was unanimously adopted, and published in the Newspapers of this City; viz: "The Board
 " of Management of the St. George's Society of Que-
 " bec, cannot refrain from availing themselves of this
 " their first meeting, since the receipt of the intelligence
 " of the decease of their lamented Patron Lord Metcalfe,
 " to record the affectionate regret which the Members
 " of the Society, generally, entertained for that Noble-
 " man, when living, and their profound respect for his
 " memory."

Although the office of Patron is not recognised in the Constitution of our Society, it has been customary to name a person of high standing in the Province, of our

own origin, and to request his acceptance of that office, which has always hitherto been graciously accorded. The death of Lord Metcalfe has rendered the office of Patron vacant, and as the Nobleman lately appointed Governor General of British North America is of illustrious Scottish descent, and cannot in consequence become a Member of our Society, the Board merely suggest to the Members the propriety of naming some other individual qualified by rank and character, as Patron for the year ensuing.

The number of Members who have departed this life seeming to call for a more extended notice, the Board have subjoined some memoranda of the situation in life, and the circumstances connected with their deceased brethren—which they trust will not be considered out of place in this Report.

ROBERT MORGAN—A native of Nottingham, came to Quebec Color Serjeant in the 2nd Battalion Grenadier Guards, in May, 1838; on the return of the Brigade to England, 1841, Serjeant Morgan was discharged with a pension; he died at Quebec, on the 1st February, 1846, at the age of 46 years.

CHARLES GIBBS GORTLEY, Life Member—Resident in Canada since 1819. For several years he carried on an extensive sail making business. In the fall of 1845, his health being impaired, he returned to his native place, Dartmouth, in Devonshire, where he died on the 24th March, 1846, in the 36th year of his age.

FROSTE RALPH GRAY, Life Member—A native of Quebec, where he received his education. For many years he was engaged in the Timber trade, under the firm of Wood and Gray, proprietors of the extensive cove known as St. Michael's, or Wood and Gray's cove; he died at Quebec on the 11th April, 1846, aged 38 years.

FREDERICK HACKER—A native of the city of Canterbury, county of Kent. He came to Quebec in 1832, by profession an architect; his talents were universally acknowledged, and the taste of his designs generally admired. He died at Quebec on the 8th May, 1846, in the 45th year of his age.

JOHN JAMES SIMS—A native of Bristol, resident in Canada since 1814. For many years the proprietor of an extensive and respectable establishment as a chemist and druggist. On Friday evening, the 12th June, 1846, Mr. Sims, with two of his children, were at the Theatre St. Louis, at an exhibition of Chemical Dioramas, at the close of which, at about 10 o'clock, by the accidental oversetting of a camphine lamp, the Theatre took fire, when 45 persons perished. Mr. Sims, with his daughter Rebecca, aged 23, and his son Kenneth, aged 13 years, were amongst the unfortunate victims. Their remains were accompanied to their last resting place on the Sunday following, by a large number of their fellow citizens. He died at the age of 52 years.

ELISHA WOODBURY—A native of Haverhill, State of Massachusetts, United States, grand-son of Elisha Woodbury, native of Yorkshire, England. Mr. Woodbury was a resident of this city for many years, a tinsmith by trade, and the proprietor of a respectable establishment in that line of business. He died on the 28th June, 1846, at the age of 45 years.

JAMES JOHN LOWNDES, Life Member—A native of London, born on Lord Mayor's day, November 9, 1801. Came to Canada in 1833. Mr. Lowndes was engaged in mercantile pursuits, and was an excellent accountant. He was lately more particularly engaged in the lumber business, and was a sufferer by the great fire of the 28th May, 1845. Since that period he turned his attention towards the erection of some neat incombustible

dwelling for the labouring class : he designed and built several brick cottages, which for convenience and economy are much admired. He also made experiments of several kinds of roofing materials, calculating with much ability the difference of the cost of each sort of material, the result of which he was kind enough to present to the Committee of Relief for the sufferers by the fires of the 28th May and 28th June, who caused it to be published as a model for general information and the benefit of the sufferers ; Mr. Lowndes was also a skilful Florist, and displayed much taste and judgment in his garden and premises at his residence, St. Foy's road. He was very active in body and mind, and fell a sacrifice to the devoted attention to a beloved child in a dangerous case of fever, which disease he himself contracted, and survived his son only a few days. He died on the 23d July, 1846, at the age of 45 years.

JOHN PARKER—A native of Thrumiston, Leicestershire. Came to Canada in 1828. Mr. Parker was a person of considerable intelligence, and acted for several years as clerk in the Police Office, where he was much respected. The superior abilities which he displayed in the execution of his duties were universally acknowledged. He died 28th August, 1846, aged 38 years.

CHARLES GREAVES WAKEFIELD—A native of London. Arrived in Quebec, with two daughters, 1842. Mr. Wakefield was an educated and accomplished gentleman, and had the satisfaction and happiness of seeing both his children married and happily settled before his death. He died on the 4th November, 1846, in the 51st year of his age.

JOHN JEFFERY, Life Member—A native of Plymouth, Devonshire, resident in Quebec since 1818, and for many years the proprietor of an extensive ship building establishment in Prince Edward street, St. Roch, where

he constructed ships of the largest class, the last being nearly ready to be launched, when the glorious news of the victories on the Banks of the Sutleje arrived, he named her the Sobraon. She is a fine ship of upwards of 1200 tons. He died at his residence, St. Roch, on the 13th December, 1846, in the 52d year of his age.

The Board have great pleasure in reporting that the Chaplain and Physicians continue their valuable services to the Society as heretofore. The aid rendered by the Chaplains on the Anniversary has been already mentioned ; and the Board beg to state, that the Physicians, although called upon to send in for payment the amount incurred for medicine, have uniformly refused todo so.

In concluding the Annual Report, the Board beg to congratulate the Members generally on the prosperous condition of our useful and beloved Society. Having alluded above to the only unfinished business, the Act of Incorporation, the Board have only to request the Members to bear in mind that the procuring a Diploma and Seal for the Society, was dependant on the obtaining an Act of Incorporation ; and that measure having

failed, it will become necessary to consider what steps are to be taken in the matter of the Diploma and Seal ; to which may be added, the frequently mooted subject of a Badge, to be worn by Members generally on days of ceremony.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF ACCOUNTS
OF THE

Your Committee have the honor to Report :

That they have examined the Books and Accounts of the Treasurer, the whole of which they found correct.

The permanent funds belonging to the Society, including fifty pounds recently invested, now consist of
 12 Shares Montreal Bank Stock, value £600 0 0
 16 do. Quebec Bank do. do. 400 0 0
 (The whole of the above Shares having cost £1021.)

There appears a balance in the hands of the Treasurer, to the credit of the permanent fund of £40 8 4

From which is to be deducted a sum overdrawn in the Charitable Fund, (which proved insufficient to meet the demands against it) 11 4 11

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The total of the funds belonging to the Society therefore amount to.....£1029 3 5

The amount distributed for charitable purposes during the past year is £129 9s. 8d., which appears less than the sum paid in 1845, say £171 11s. 3d.; but a larger amount was paid the last year for general charities, owing to a considerable sum having been granted the previous year to several of the sufferers by the calamitous fires.

Your Committee observe with pleasure that a large reduction took place in the expenses for the last celebration as compared with the previous year, the former

being only two pounds five shillings, while the latter amounted to eleven pounds twelve shillings and six pence.

REPORT OF THE TREASURER
FOR 1846.

The Treasurer, in presenting his Annual Report has again the pleasure of congratulating the St. George's Society upon the great extent of usefulness, which the transactions of the Charitable Committee during the past year will amply testify, no less a sum than £129 9s. 8d., having been administered to the necessities of their afflicted countrymen since this period last year; and when the Treasurer informs the members that the large sum of £816 16s. 11d., has been expended in charity alone, since the formation of the Society, they cannot but feel thankful that they have been the happy instruments in the hand of God of administering so much good towards the relief of their brethren in distress, so far away from their native country and friends.

The expenditure of the Charitable fund has exceeded the income by £11 4s. 11d., to which amount it now stands indebted, but the permanent fund has increased to the extent of £33 10s., and now amounts in the whole to £1040 8s. 4d.

In consequence of the Board of Management having been increased from seven to fifteen, and the Physicians not having been before provided with collars, ten more were deemed necessary to be procured. This number has been added to the insignia of the Society, at an ex-

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pense of £18 2s., which amount was obtained by private subscription from the members, who upon this, as upon former similar occasions, most liberally came forward in order to prevent any part of the funds of the Society being applied towards the purchase of the Insignia.

One life and eight ordinary members have been added to the Society since the last annual report, the present list of members being composed of 60 for life, 8 honorary, and 133 ordinary.

Eleven members have died during the past year, six of whom were only annual subscribers, and consequently the benefit of their subscriptions are entirely lost to the funds of the Society, five were life members, and the fruit of their benevolence continues as heretofore to administer towards the blessed work of charity. The large amount of interest received, derived chiefly from funds raised by life members' tips (the interest of the permanent fund amounting to more than one-half of the whole expenditure,) and the degree of permanency which they impart to the charitable designs of the Society, it is to be regretted that more do not come forward and place their names on that list, and it is to be hoped that during the present year, many more will be added to the list of life members; for as emigration increases, the continued exertions of every member will be necessary, in order to meet the natural yearly increased demands upon their bounty.
