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

### GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS.

Read the following Rules carefully and send in your entries as early as possible, and be sure that all fees accompany them.

When you have done with this book please pass it around among your

neighbors.

- 1. On September 13, 14, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20 and 21st the Exhibition Grounds will be open from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m., and commencing on Monday. 16th, to Saturday 21st inclusive, from 7 p.m. to 11 p.m., to the public, and will be closed on Monday, 23rd September, at 7 a.m., after which exhibitors must remove all their property from the grounds and buildings. No removals (live stock excepted), will under any circumstances, be allowed before Monday morning, September 23rd at 7 a.m.
- A large number of Special Attractions for day and night, in addition to the regular Exhibition, of which full particulars will subsequently be given, will be provided for the enjoyment of the visitors.

Military and other bands of music will be present every afternoon

and evening.

Intending exhibitors and visitors are particularly requested to read carefully and consider the following Rules and Regulations governing the Exhibition which will be in all cases strictly enforced.

Positively no smoking will be allowed in any of the buildings.

# ADMISSION TO THE GROUNDS.

- 6. The price of admission for adults, 25c.; children under 12 years of age, 15c., each time of entering. The admission will be by means of registering turnstiles, and each person must be provided with the proper ticket, as no money will be received at the gates.
  - SPECIAL-All exhibit Buildings will be open to the public till 9 o'clock each evening during the exhibition.
- The charge of admission for vehicles is as follows: One horse vehicle, 50c.; two horse vehicle, 75c., each time of entering, admitting the driver only; each additional occupant, 25c.

9. Exhibitors entering 1 or 2 animals shall receive one Pass, 3 or 4, 2 Passes, and so on.

10. Supply wagons, with supplies to parties having privileges on the grounds, with drivers, will be admitted free up to 9 a -. only, each day, and from 6 to 7 p.m. each evening, from Monday 16t, Saturday 21st.

Judges and members of the press will be furnished with tickets and badges, the latter being intended only as a means of showing their official connection with the Exhibition, and not for the purpose of securing their admittance to the grounds or grand stand. Badges will have no admitting privileges. Complimentary tickets will not admit to grand stand.

The entry tickets upon animals or articles will admit the person bringing them to the Show Grounds for exhibition, along with such animals or articles, without the use of any other ticket. Afterwards, such parties must be provided with regular Passes, as stated, or they will have to pay

the regular admission fee.

13. Any exhibitor or attendant making unseemly noises or otherwise calling the attention of visitors to his exhibits in a way that may be considered by the Board of Directors unseemly or a nuisance, shall be liable to forfeit his space and all privileges as an exhibitor if the Board of Directors so determine.

## ENTRIES AND FEES.

- 1. All entries must be made on printed forms, which may be obtained free of charge from the Secretary at Ottawa, by dropping him a post card, or from the Secretary of all county or township agricultural societies, where also copies of the Prize List may be had. forms are to be filled up and signed by the exhibitor and sent to the Secretary of the Association at Ottawa, not later than Wednesday, September 11th.
- 2. The entrance fee must in all cases be forwarded with the entry. No entry will be accepted unless this is done. Fees should be sent by money order or in bills in registered letter. Postage stamps are not desirable. Exhibitors wishing to become members of the Association can do so by paying an annual membership fee of \$5.00, which amount may be enclosed when sending entrance fees. It is not necessary to be a member in order to be an exhibitor.

3. Articles of work or specimens which have been awarded prizes at any previous exhibition of this Association cannot be entered in competition for prizes named in the Prize List of this year.

4. Exhibitors will please take notice that it is absolutely required that entries be made on or before the date above mentioned, in order to afford sufficient time to examine the entry papers and to correspond with parties if necessary, and for the correction of errors or omissions.

5. In the live stock and poultry classes, the entry must in every instance be made in the name of the bona fide owner, and unless this rule be observed, no premium will be awarded, or if awarded will be withheld. If any person shall exhibit any animal or bird of which he is not the bona fide owner, he shall forfeit any premium which may be awarded him, and be precluded from exhibiting in future.

6. In all other classes entries must be made in the names of the producers or manufacturers only, and by such producers themselves in person or their agents, who must have special authority for doing so, and shall produce the authority in writing, if so required by the Those who are not manufacturers or authorized agents may exhibit, but cannot compete for the prizes offered. If any person other than the authorized agent shall enter an article for competition as produced or manufactured by himself, when it has not really manufactured by himself, when it has not really the been so, he shall forfeit any premium which may be awarded the article, and be precluded from exhibiting in future.

7. A merchant who sells a line of goods which is also sold by other

merchants cannot be considered as an agent for such goods.

8. No person will be allowed to enter for exhibition more than one specimen in any one Class or Section, unless the additional article be a distinct named variety or pattern from the first. This rule not to apply to animals, but to all kinds of grain, vegetable, produce. fruit, manufactured articles, &c., in which each additional specimen would necessarily be precisely similar to the first.

O. Extra Entries.—Every article must be entered under some one of the headings in the regular list when possible; but if any article is of a distinct character from anything specified in the list, it may be en-

tered in the class with which it most nearly corresponds.

10. On the entry of each animal or article, a ticket will be furnished the exhibitor, specifying the class and section, and exhibitor's No., which ticket must remain attached to the animal or article during the Exhibition.

- 11. Exhibitors are particularly requested not to put their names on entry tickets attached to their exhibits until after the judges have gone round and made their awards.
- 12. All exhibitors intending to compete for any of the "specials" offered will please state so upon their entry.
- 13. In all cases the right is reserved to reject entirely or to accept conditionally any entry or application, and under no circumstances

will articles which are offensive by reason of their odor or appearance, or which are dangerous by reason of their combustible or explosive character, be admitted; and if any such be introduced by an exhibitor through misapprehension or otherwise, they may be removed by order of the Board of Directors.

14. Exhibitors shall, if required by the Directors, make a statutory declaration that the animals or articles exhibited by them are exhibited in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the Association; and in case any exhibitor refuses to make such declaration on being requested, all premiums awarded him, her or them shall be forfeited.

15. All persons who have sent in an entry to the Secretary in the usual way, with the necessary fees accompanying same, should such person or persons fail to make the exhibit through no fault of the Association, the entry fee in such case will be forfeited.

#### ENTRANCE FEES

16. The charges for exhibiting at this Exhibition are by fees, as follows:

Horses—Entrance fee, \$1.50 per head: Foals, when shown with dam, no entry fee will be charged, but if shown alone for a prize entry, fee is \$1.00; stalls free. In Class 4, "Specials for High Steppers," a "Special Entrance Fee," \$1.50 is required, even if the animals have been entered in another class, and entry fee paid therein.

Cattle—Over one year, entrance free; 50 cents per head for stalls; one year and under. entrance free; 25 cents per head for stalls.

Sheep-Entrance free; 25c. per head for pens.

Pigs-Entrance free; 25 cents per head for pens.

Poultry, Pigeons, &c .- Entrance fee; (see Poultry Department.)

Agricultural Implements-25 cents each article.

Machinery-50 cents each section, varying in some classes.

Stoves-25 cents each.

Carriages-25 cents for each vehicle.

Agricultural and Horticultural Products—One to three articles. 25 cents; three to ten articles, 50 cents; from ten to twenty, \$1.00; over twenty, \$1.50.

Ladies' and Children's Work—Five articles and under 25 cents; over five articles, 50 cents.

Manufactures and all other classes not named here, 25 cents each article; and 50 cents each section, in some of the classes.

Fine Arts—In each section, 25 cents per entry of three articles or less. Photography—See Index for Photo Department.

# EXHIBITORS, THEIR DUTIES AND PRIVILEGES.

1. The grounds and buildings will be open from and after Friday, August 30th, to exhibitors, their agents and employees, to give opportunity for the performance of any necessary or preparatory work.

2. Exhibits intended for competition arriving on the ground after the Judges have made their awards shall be debarred from competing for any prize, but may be shown for exhibition purposes.

3. Articles unaccompanied by their owners will be received by the Superintendent of the Department in which they are to be shown, when delivered on the grounds, but in all cases the expense (if any) attending the same must be prepaid by the exhibitor.

4. No changes will be allowed any exhibitor after making his or her entry.

5. Exhibitors on arriving with their articles. &c., will inquire for the Superintendent of the Department where articles are to be shown, when they will be informed where the same are to be placed.

6. Exhibitors are required to give all necessary attention to their exhibits while the Fair is being held, and at the close to take full charge of the same.

7. Objections against a member of the Awarding Committee (Judges) proceeding with the duties assigned to him, on the ground of incompetency or otherwise, shall be made in writing and submitted to the Secretary, setting forth good and sufficient reasons therefor.

8. The Secretary shall, upon receipt of such objection, if he deems same worthy of consideration, report to the President, who shall, with the Secretary and Superintendent of the Department concerned, constitute a committee to fill the vacancy.

9. Agricultural implements and machinery must be kept running to the hour of four o clock Saturday afternoon, September 2'st. as no packing or preparatory work will be allowed before that time.

10. In the perishable classes, fruit, flowers and vegetables, the privilege will be allowed (after the Judges have made their awards) of replacing any articles which may have deteriorated or wilted with a new supply.

11. All reasonable latitude will be allowed exhibitors in the taking of orders and the sale of articles on exhibition; but delivery of any will not be permitted till the close of the Exhibition, unless its space can be filled at once with a duplicate. Parties desiring the privilege to sell will so state when making their entries, giving full particulars.

12. While the Directors of the Association agree to take every reasonable precaution to insure the safety of the articles sent to the Exhibition, yet it must be distinctly undersood that the owners are required to assume all tak of exhibiting, and should any article be injured, lost or stolen, the burecto's will render all assistance in their power for the restoration of the same, but will not recognize any claim for payment of the value of any portion thereof.

13. At the close of the Exhibition, and at the hours appointed for the withdrawal of exhibits, exhibitors are required to promptly take charge of same, and remove at their earliest convenience.

14. Exhibitors desiring to retain their Prize Cards or Ribbons had better look after them, as no duplicates are issued.

#### LIVE STOCK.

1. Live stock exhibits received on the ground up to Monday, 10th September, at 10 a.m.

2. Commodious accommodation will be provided for horses, cattle, sheep and pigs, from Friday. September 13th, to the close of the Exhibition, and water, and straw for bedding, without charge. Hay and other feed will be provided by the Association at market prices. For information, exhibitors will apply to the Superintendents of the Grain and Fodder Department, Messrs. Bedingfield & Co., at their office on the grounds, or at their store, 347; Wellington Street, Ottawa.

3 The passageways in the stock buildings must be kept clear between the hours of 7 a.m and 7 p.m., as no obstruction of any kind will be allowed between those hours.

4. The Judges may order the production of any or all of the animals within the arena or horse ring, for review purposes, at any time during the holding of the Exhibition. Any exhibitor or attendant refusing to comply with such order will forfeit his right to compete for or receive any premium which may have been awarded. The Superintendent will see that this rule is strictly enforced.

5 Exhibitors with entries in competition for prizes failing to have the exhibits appear in the Judging Ring, when class is called, shall be at once excluded from all competitions in such class.

o. All animals in the Live Stock classes must be bona fide property of the exhibitor before the advertised closing date of entries, and if required by the Executive, the exhibitor shall produce satisfactory proofs of ownership.

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- 7 Every animal entered for competition shall be under the control of the Committee, but the Association will in no case be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur; and it shall be a condition of entry that each exhibitor shall hold the Association harmless from any loss or accident.
- 8. Each exhibitor shall be responsible for any injury that may be occasioned to any person whomsoever by any horse exhibited; and each exhibitor shall indemnify the Association against all claims or demands of any kind or nature that may grow out of any injury occasioned by any horse exhibited, or arise from the negligence of the person in charge of such horse.

# ADVANTAGES TO MANUFACTURERS.

- 1. The attention of the Manufacturers of Canada is directed to the fact that with a view of encouraging them to exhibit at the Exhibition which opens on Friday, 13th September, the Board of Directors give FREE space and MOTIVE POWER to all exhibitors of Machinery and Agricultural Implements.
- 2. The grounds and buildings generally have and will receive every attention during the year, and nothing left undone that could add to the comfort and convenience of exhibitors and visitors.

# RAILWAYS, STEAMBOATS AND CUSTOMS.

- 3. Favorable arrangements will be made with all the Railroad and Steamboat companies for the conveyance of passengers and articles to and from the Exhibition, at greatly reduced rates, and for special excursions from all parts of the Dominion and the northern part of the United States.
- 4. Live stock and all other exhibits sent as freight (not by express) will be returned free, on the freight being paid one way, that is, to Ottawa, and upon producing a Certificate from the Secretary of the Exhibition that such exhibit has not changed hands but remains the property of the original owner.
- 5. Arrangements will also be made with the Customs Department for the admission of articles from foreign countries for exhibition, free of duty, the Exhibition buildings being considered Customs warehouse for that purpose.
- 6 All exhibits sent by express will be delivered on the grounds without extra charge by the Express Companies.

#### PAYMENT OF PRIZES.

- 7. The Treasurer will commence the paying of premiums on Saturday, 21st September, at 9 o'clock a.m.; afterwards at the office, 26 Sparks Street, Ottawa.
- 8. Exhibitors from a distance are particularly requested to apply for their premiums on the above date, or leave a written order with some person who will make application for the money; also a list of articles on which prizes have been awarded.
- 9. Applicants requesting by letter payment of premiums to which they are entitled, will be paid by cheque, payable in Ottawa, to their order.
- 10. All persons to whom prizes are awarded must apply to the Secretary of the Association for payment thereof before the 15th of October of the year in which such prize is awarded; otherwise, all claims to such premium shall be forfeited.

#### DIPLOMAS AND MEDALS.

11. Diplomas and Medals may be awarded in lieu of money prizes, as follows, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors:

For a first prize—Diploma.

" of \$25 and upwards—Gold Medal.
" of \$10 and upwards—Silver Medal.
" of \$5 and upwards—Bronze Medal.

12. Diplomas (Live Stock Department excepted) are awarded for the display, and must not be considered as a recognizance of the merits of the exhibit.

# JUDGES AND JUDGING.

- 1. The Judges will be appointed by the Committee and Board of Directors previous to the Exhibition, and will receive a circular informing them of the fact, and when to report at the office on the grounds.
- 2. No person will be allowed to act as a Judge who is in any way interested in the articles to be examined.
- 3. Judges of live stock, poultry, agricultural and dairy products, cut flowers, fruit and vegetables, entered for the regular prizes, will meet in the Board Room at the Secretary's office on the grounds, presenting their circulars of appointment at the time mentioned thereon.
- 4. It is particularly requested that Judges will not enter into arguments with exhibitors as to the merits of their exhibits, and on no account are they to give reasons for their awards; and they are also particularly requested not to inform exhibitors as to the result of their judgments on articles for which prizes are not offered on the regular list until their recommendations have been approved by the Board.
- 5. It is desired that all the Judges of each class go together to hand in their report, instead of sending it by any one of their number and to remain together until their book has been examined by the Secretary or his assistants, in order that cases of error or doubt may be more promptly and easily made right.
- 6. Judges will please sign and hand in their lists of awards to the Secretary or his assistants as soon as possible, and make their more extended reports afterwards, making such recommendations as circumstances or their experience may suggest.
- Judges are requested to have the winner's name and address written upon the prize card, before placing same upon the animal or article to whom they have awarded the prize.
- 8. The Judges are particularly requested not to leave the grounds until they have ascertained from the Secretary that there are no protests against the awards in the classes they have judged.
- <sup>9</sup>. No animal deemed unworthy by the Judges shall be awarded a premium, but no prizes shall be withheld merely because there is no competition.
- 10. In addition to the stated premiums offered for articles enumerated in the list, the Judges are authorized to recommend premiums for such articles not enumerated as they may consider worthy, suggesting the amount of value of such premiums for the consideration of the Board of Directors. The Judges may also distinguish such animals or articles as they consider deserving of notice, but which have not received prizes, by tickets, with the words "Highly Commended" or "Commended" upon them. These tickets will not entitle the holder to any money payment.
- 11. Under "Extras" in any of the classes, when more than one entry of the same kind of article has been made, they will be judged as in competition for the first and second prize, the same as though they had been in regular sections, and when but one such entry has been made, the article, if worthy, shall be awarded a first or second prize. The judges, however, are instructed not to award prizes in either the "regular" or "extra" sections of any class, unless the article comes up to the desired "standard" of excellence.
- 12. No award of prizes for extras will be paid until sanctioned by the Board of Directors of the Association.
- 13. Each award must be written in a plain, careful manner, on the blank page opposite the number of the entry, with the name and number of the exhibitor.

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- 14. Exhibitors can ascertain from the Superintendents of the several departments when judges may be expected to examine their animals or articles. No complaint or appeal based upon the statement that the judges have overlooked unimals or articles will, therefore, be considered by the Directors.
- 15. An exhibitor lodging a protest must make it in writing, and it must be delivered to the Secretary or his assistant within three hours of the cause of protest; it must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal, and must be accompanied by a deposit of \$5, which sum shall be forfeited to the Association if said protest is not sustained. The Board of Directors, however, earnestly hope that exhibitors will not enter protests without the strongest ground for doing so, as much annoyance and unpleasantness is often occasioned by protests of a frivolous nature.
- 16. The Judges are expected, in the execution of their duties, to be careful to act with the most rigid impartiality, and make their entries in a clear and conspicuous manner; in all cases of doubt or difficulty, referring freely to the Secretary, or to the Committee of the Association in charge of the Department.
- 17. No animal or article exhibited shall have about it any prize colors or cards until the awards have been made in their respective classes.
- 18. No person shall be permitted in the horse or cattle rings during the time of judging except the Judges, the grooms, or persons in charge of the animals, members of the Horse and Cattle Committees, and members of the Press.
- 19. All prize cards which have been affixed by the Judges must be displayed during the Exhibition. Any infraction of this rule will incur the forfeit of any premium awarded
- 20. Any person who shall attem. o interfere with the Judges while in the discharge of their duties, or will shall at any time, on the premises of the Association, use any contemptuous or abusive language to a judge in consequence of any award made by him, shall forfeit his right to any premium to which he might otherwise be entitled, and shall be excluded from exhibiting for one year thereafter. Judges are particularly requested to immediately report any breach of this rule.
- 21. Upon the discovery of any fraud, deception or dishonest practice, either in the preparation, ownership or representation concerning any animal or article exhibited, which may have affected or have been intended to affect the decision of the Judge or Judges; or upon the discovery of any fraud or deception in making an entry or entries on the part of any exhibitor, the Board of Directors reserve the right to withhold the payment of any prizes awarded, and may prohibit any such party from exhibiting in any class for one or more years, and may also publish the names of such persons or not, as may be deemed the most expedient; and any prize or prizes so withheld shall be awarded as though such exhibitor or exhibitors had not shown or exhibited.

#### SPACE.

- 22. Applications for space in any of the buildings may be made at the same time as entry, or at any time up to September 11th, by persons who intend making special exhibits, either for prizes or exhibition purposes.
- 23. Intending exhibitors are requested, when sending in their entries, to state what size space they require.
- 24. When an allotment of space has been made to an exhibitor and he fails to artistically arrange and decorate his stand, make and maintain a creditable display, the Board of Directors reserve the right to declare the space forfeited forthwith, and to have such exhibits removed from the building.

25. Exhibitors desiring the privilege to sell, shall have the same granted upon condition of maintaining their display, and by paying a certain rental per foot frontage, or a bulk sum, according to the position occupied, and shall receive a receipt therefor, signed by the Secretary of the Association.

24 All exhibits which have been regularly entered and space held for same must be in their place, and in space reserved therefor, not later than 6 o'clock p.m., on the second day of the Exhibition, otherwise such exhibitor or exhibitors will jurieit the right to such space, and will be called upon by the Association to pay twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) as liquidated damages for breach of contract for non-adherence to this rule. This does not apply to live stock exhibits.

# MISCELLANEOUS PENALTY FOR INJURING PROPERTY.

Any person who wilfully or maliciously injuries or destroys any property within the Exhibition Grounds, or who shall interfere with or hinder or obstruct the officers or servants of the Association, or any policeman or constable in the discharge of his or their duty, or gain admission to the grounds in a surreptitious manner and contrary to the rules of the Association, shall be liable to a fine of not less than one or more than twenty dollars. Said fine to be enforced and collected as fines are usually collected, and to be paid over to the Association for its use and benefit, and in default of payment the said offender shall be imprisoned in the common jail for a period of not less than thirty days. (See Section 115 of Agriculture and Arts Act.)

# TO PROMOTE HARMONY AND ATTRACTIVENESS.

The Board of Directors reserve the right to prescribe and regulate all matters pertaining to the harmony and attractiveness of the Exhibition.

- 1. Cotton signs which obstruct the view and light are not permitted. Exhibitors are recommended to use banners, which are much more handsome and business like.
- 2. The arrangement of an exhibit, especially as regards height. must be such as will not obstruct light or view.
- 3. The wholesale distribution of handbills or other advertising matter that may cause a nuisance is not allowed. Neat cards or folders are far more effective and apt to be carried away by visitors.

# FIRE, POLICE PROTECTION AND INSURANCE.

The Exhibition Grounds being connected by telephone, and a detachment of police and special constables being on duty night and day, as well as a corps of watchmen, the risk and probability of fire is reduced almost to a minimum. Notwithstanding all these precautions, the Association will not hold themselves responsible for any loss or damage by fire, theft or otherwise, and should exhibitors require their exhibits covered by insurance, they are required to give the matter their own personal attention.

# ENQUIRIES.

Communications and enquiries pertaining to the Exhibition and its arrangements should be addressed to the Secretary, Mr. E. Mc-Mahon, 26 Sparks Street, Ottawa, Ont. Persons desirous to make enquiries in person can do so at the office, 26 Sparks Street (Russell House Block). THE PRESS.

Members of the Press are cordially invited to the Exhibition. Ample accommodation will be provided for them, and all necessary information promptly furnished. Editors are requested to notify the Secretary two or three weeks previous to the Exhibition of the number of representatives they will have on duty, in order that tickets for them may be forwarded.

# TELEGRAPH, EXPRESS AND POST OFFICE.

The Great North-Western Telegraph Co., Canadian Pacific Telegraph Co., and the Express Companies have offices on the grounds, and there is a post office, at which mails are received and despatched twice daily. The grounds are also connected with the City of Ottawa and other places throughout the province by telephone.

#### VISITORS.

Visitors may be assured of finding on the grounds everything necessary to the convenience and comfort of old and young, during the entire day. Ample restaurants and lunch rooms, managed by experienced caterers, and under the supervision of the Board of Directors as to price and quality of food, will serve meals and refreshments during hours of Exhibition, at reasonable rates. A baggage department for the deposit of satchels, cloaks, &c., and in charge of responsible parties, is conveniently located for the accommodation of visitors. The hotels and boarding houses of the city are ample for the occasion, and will adhere to their regular rates; and the city authorities will co-operate with the officers of the Association in every practicable manner to ensure the safety and contribute to the pleasure of visitors.

If your neighbors express a desire for a copy of the Prize List, send their addresses at once on a Post Card, and a copy will be mailed.

The Exhibition will be open to the public from Monday, Septemer 16th, and will close on Saturday night, September 21st, at 11 p.m. No removals of exhibits will be allowed before Monday morning, September 23r<sup>1</sup>, (Live Stock excepted).

The gates will open at 7 o'clock a.m. of each day, and at that time every officer is requested to be at his post.

Send your entries early.

Be sure and enclose all fees with entries.

All visitors to the Exhibition are cordially invited to remain over and enjoy the evening entertainments, which will this year be novel and up-to-date.

# HOW TO REACH THE GROUNDS.

The grounds cover a large acreage in extent, are the finest and the buildings are the most commedious in Central Canada.

The grounds are in close proximity to the Rideau Canal, to the south of the city. They are easy of access, and can be reached in a few moments by either the Ottawa Electric Railway from the railway stations and all central points of the city, or a line of steamers running on the canal, which land visitors on the grounds.

# COMPETITION OPEN TO THE WORLD.

#### HORSES.

Entries close Wednesday, September 11th.

Veterinary Surgeons appointed by the Exhibition Association shall be in attendance on the grounds during the Exhibition for the purpose of pronouncing on the soundness of the horses entered for competition. . . No horses shall be allowed to compete for prizes until they have been examined by the Association's Veterinary Surgeons and the Certificate placed in the hands of the Chairman of the Committee before the judging takes place. These Certificates shall be private and confidential and shall be used by the Chairman of the Committee only.

The veterinary examination of all horses shall be conducted jointly by two of the Association's Veterinary Surgeons; should they disagree as to the soundness of a horse a third shall be called in whose decision

shall be final.

3. Entrance \$1.50 per head; Foals, when shown with Dam, no entry fee will be charged, but if shown alone for a prize, entry fee is \$1.00; stalls

This payment includes the charge for straw for bedding.

4. All entries received up to two weeks before opening date of Exhibition will be duly acknowledged. Entries received later than that will not be acknowledged, owing to press of other business, but space will be provided as requested, and entry tickets will be held at the Exhibition office until called for. In case no space is available at time entry is made, prompt notification of that fact will be sent, and fee returned to sender.

- No horse or mare will be allowed to compete in more than one Class or Section, except when competing for Diploma or medal for the best horse or mare of any age in his or her class. Any exhibitor found violating this rule shall forfeit any prize money won, and will be required forthwith to return to the Chairman of the Horse Committee all ribbons or cards that accompanied such award, and will be debarred from further competition in any live stock class during the Exhibition of 1907. clause applies to all classes from 1 to 19 inclusive. Horses entered in any Class, if deemed suitable, can also enter and compete in Class 4 Specials.
- The ages of horses and foals will be reckoned from 1st January, 1907. All foals will be considered one year old fon the 1st January after birth.

9. The breeder's name, if known, the owner's name and address, the name of animal and the age should accompany all entries.

- 10. Evidence must be adduced of all brood animals exhibited having had stock within the past 12 months, unless they are evidently with
- 11. Exhibitors will be required to show in such a manner as the Judges may direct. Exhibitors refusing to comply with the requirements of the Judges will forfeit the right to compete.
- 12. All stallions exhibited in the ring or on parade must be shown and led by the person in charge on foot. No owner or attendant will be permitted to show or lead under any other conditions.

- 13. All animals competing for prizes must be entered in the names of their bona fide owners or by their duly authorized agents; should doubt arise, the Awarding Committee may require affidavits or owner ship from the exhibitor.
- 14. Exhibitors desiring to take their horses home at night will be granted the privilege by depositing with the Superintendent \$5 as a guarantee the return of the animal next morning. If the horse is not returned at 10 a.m. next day the guarantee deposit and the occupancy of the stall or scalls will be for exted to the Association.
- 15. A Canadian bred horse shall be understood to be a horse that is foaled in Canade.
- 16. Exhibitors, on application at the office of the Superintendent, and on deposit of 25 cents, will receive a lock and key corresponding with the number of the s. ble, which will be duly returned at the close of the Exhibition on receipt of the lock and key in good order.
- 17. Every exhibitor must make his own choice as to the class in which he will enter his horse and abide by it. No change will be allowed any exhibitor after making his or her entry.
- 18. In case of animals being entered and not exhibited, the entrance fee will be forfeited.
- 19. In order to prevent the non-exhibition of animals which have been entered for the "Fair," thus causing unnecessary preparation and expense, a fine of \$5.00 will be levied on each entry not exhibited, to be collected before the animal or animals leave the ground; when called for by the programme, unless a certificate under the hand of the Exhibitior be lodged with the Secretary of the Association before the day of the Exhibition, certifying that such non-exhibition is caused either by the death of the animal, an accident, contagious or other disease (confirmed by the certificate of a Veterinary Surgeon). (The above fine will not be imposed on an exhibitor having more than one entry in a section, provided one or more of such entries are exhibited), but nothing in this clause shall interfere with the right of the committee to remove any animal from the buildings and grounds forthwith for non-compliance with the rules governing this department or the general rules of the Exhibition.
- 20. No animal deemed unworthy by the Judges shall be awarded a Premium, but no Prize shall be withheld merely because there is no competition.
- 21. Horses entered for exhibition purposes shall be ridden or driven only while being exhibited in the ring.
- 22. Stalls will be allotted by the Secretary when the entries are made.
- 23. All animals will be called into the ring for examination by the Judges, and the prize animals unto the track for parades. Owners or attendants must be prepared to bring them out when called for, or forfeit claim to any premiums awarded. The Horse Superintendent will see that this rule is strictly enforced.
- 24. The grooms or persons in charge of horses are urgently requested to be convenient to their annuals when the different classes are being called to the ring, thereby avoiding unnecessary difficulty and delay, otherwise the Committee in charge will not be responsible should animals not be brought out after due notification for the class to be judged has been given.
- 25 Non-compliance with any of these rules, or the general rules of the Association, on the part of any exhibitor, or his employee, shall incur the forfeiture of any premium awarded.
- 26. Certificate of registration must be produced when called for by the Judge.
- 27. Live stock exhibits received on the grounds up to Monday, September 16th, at 10 a.m.

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28: Judging in the Horse Department will commence on Tuesday, September 17th.

29. No person shall be permitted in the horse or cattle rings during the time of judging except the Judges, the grooms or persons in charge of the animals, members of the Horse and Cattle Committees, and members of the Press.

30. In all cases where a stallion with three of his get is to be exhibited, an affidavit from the owner of the stallion to the effect that the gets to be shown are the produce of such stallion, must accompany each entry, otherwise it will not be accepted.

31. In order to compete for "Specials," a bona fide entry must first be made in the Class in which such special is offered.

32. Horses shown singly cannot show as one of a team, neither can one of a team show singly, either for cash prizes or specials, except in Class 4, "Specials for High Steppers."

- It shall be a condition of entry that the Association shall not be liable for any loss to an exhibitor occasioned by fire, accident, condition of structures, or the negligence of other exhibitors or officials, or otherwise howsoever.
- 34. Signification of prizes will be as follows:-For a first prize, Blue Ribbon: for a second prize, Red Ribbon; for a third prize, Green Card. No duplicate ribbons or cards will be issued in the event of any being lost or stolen. Exhibitors will therefore be governed accordingly.

35. The eligibility of exhibitors to the Amateur class shall be decided

by the Horse Committee before entry is accepted.

1. Cattle over one year—Entrance free; 50 cents per head for stalls. One year and under—Entrance free; 25 cents per head for stalls.

2. Committee—N. F. Wilson, M.P. (Chairman), Robert Richardson (Vice-Chairman), J. C. Smith, John McKellar, B. Rothwell, Geo. Boyce, ex-Ald. Slattery, Ald. Desjardins, J. B. Spencer, Peter White, ex-Ald. Gleeson.

- 3. All entries received up to two weeks before opening date of Exhibition will be duly acknowledged. Entries received later than that will not be acknowledged, owing to press of other business, but space will be provided as requested, and entry tickets will be held at the Exhibition office until called for. In case no space is available at time entry is made, prompt notification of that fact will be sent, and fee returned to sender.
- 4. In all cases the precise age of the animal and name (if named), and owner's name, must be given.
- 5. All animals shown in the pure bred classes must be registered in Records recognized as reliable by the Dominion Department of Agriculture, and certificate of registration produced when called for by the Director in charge of ring.
- 6. All cattle must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor before the opening of the Exhibition, and satisfactory proof of ownership must be furnished should the Executive so require.
- 7. An animal must not be allowed to compete as a three year old cow unless she has a calf or is evidently in calf; but a two year old animal having had a calf will be allowed to compete as a two year old heifer.
- 8. Cows must be giving milk at the time of the Fair, or evidently well gone in calf.
- 9. All cows exhibited in dairy classes must be milked dry between the hours of 6 and 7 p.m. on the evening previous to the day of judging, and judging to commence not later than 9 a.m. The Superintendent of Cattle will see this rule is complied with.
- 10. Breeding cows must have produced a living calf within the past fifteen months.
- 11. Bulls must have a ring in their nose, or le otherwise properly secured to preven\* accident.
- 12. No animal shall compete in more than one class or section, except for diplomas, herd prizes or specials.
- 13. In all live stock classes where there is only one exhibitor in a section, not more than two prizes will be paid. No animal deemed unworthy by the Judges shall be awarded a premium.
- 14. The ages of cattle will be calculated to 1st September, except in dairy breeds, which will be calculated to 1st August, 1907.
- 15. All animals will be called into the rings for examination by the Judges, and all prize animals unto the track for parades. Owners or

attendants must be prepared to bring them out when called for, or forfeit claim to any premiums awarded. The Cattle Superintendent will see that this rule is strictly enforced.

16. Live stock exhibits will be received on the grounds up to Monday, day, September 16th, at 10 o'clock a.m.

17. Herds will be judged last in all of the Cattle Classes.

- 11. The butter will be judged by a scale of points as follows: Flavor, 45; quality and texture, 25; color, 15; salting, 10; finish, 5; total, 100 for perfection.
- 12. Copies of the score of points awarded will be forwarded to each exhibitor of butter and cheese within a reasonable time after the close of the Exhibition.
- 13. No brand or other distinguishing marks will be allowed on any of the tubs, boxes or firk ns in which butter is exhibited, of her than the entry ticket, the Association reserving the right to remove such entry ticket if they see fit.
