

CHINESE METHOD OF MAKING

Altho carried on by the most primitive methods and confined to a few localities, the manufacture of straw matting constitutes one of the most important industries of China. A ready market for Canton matting exists both at home and abroad. The United States alone took \$1,135,007 worth in 1909, and in 1910, \$975,851




