newspaper. It upholds Canadian ideas, and
when it found a Canadian newspaper, made
in the United States, attacking a prominent
Canadian, taxing a late member of the
Canadian Parliament with being an un-
patriotic traitor, it felt justified in repro-
ducing the article for two reasons: (1) That
Mr. McGillivray might be given a chance to
deny it, if he had not so spoken, and after
it had been extensively circulated in the
States; (2) That if he did deny such a
speech the people of Canada, and especially
the Foresters, ought to know it. No
Order stands so high for loyalty as the
Foresters.

Mr. McGillivray, on the same Monday,
wrote a letter to the World denying the
charge made against him, expressed his
loyalty to Canadian institutions, and his
loyalty to the "irresponsible scribbler" who
had attacked him in the Chicago paper
which attacked the Order of Foresters before
the World published McGillivray's let-
ter, and accepted his denial.

On Thursday night, Mr. McGillivray stated
in the World office that the item pub-
lished in Monday's paper was a mis-
take on the part of the printer, and that
we had not given his letter as prominent
a position as he may refer to later on.

circulation only, probably for a period

Le Roi's Ore Taken From Its Greatest Depth

GIVES THE BEST RETURNS.

Proves That the Rossland Gold-Copper Veins Won't "Peter Out."

Chicago is Now Taking a Keen Interest in the Kootenay District—London, B.C., the Centre of the Silver-Lead Mining Industry—Clarke Wallace's Mine—Property Contained in Chicago Standard's Mining District—General Mining News.

The last returns from the greatest depth yet obtained in the Le Roi give the highest average values in gold ever obtained in the history of the mine.

This item, clipped from that reliable journal, The Rossland Mining Review, must prove very encouraging to those who believe in the future of the great Trail Creek camp.

Chicago is falling in line with Toronto in taking an interest in the Kootenay.

This is proven by the fact that the two leading dailies of that city, The Record and The Times-Herald, have thought it necessary to despatch each a special correspondent to Rossland.

Rossland is a 3-year-old, with 8000 population, and all hands predicting there will be 30,000 here by September 1.

Buildings are now being rushed to completion in two feet of snow, but with it all the weather is moderate.

The hard times in the United States are bringing into this country energy and brains, and the Canadians realize that their country is being developed.

This camp is attracting miners from Australia and South Africa, and produces gold in formation found in no other part of the world.

The fact that the excitement extends over several hundred miles of territory, and is all within British possessions, lends the thing a stability that is sufficient inducement for the English investors to make but another haul in America, and transform bleak mountain sides into prosperous communities.

But Alberta declines to form a closer union with the Revelstoke, B. C. Herald, the people of Alberta, particularly in the towns of Edmonton, McLeod and Calgary, are taking a keen interest in Kootenay mining affairs.

Several mining and development syndicates have been formed in Calgary and more will follow. Besides capital, Alberta has contributed a considerable number of enterprising citizens to this country; in fact, there is scarcely a town in Kootenay where old Alberta pioneers cannot be found occupying prominent positions.

As to a scheme mooted some time ago of provincial union between Alberta and British Columbia, Albertans were at first disposed to regard it favorably, but since looking into the unsatisfactory state of British Columbia's politics, they have dropped the idea of such a union until the Pacific Province secures a less extravagant government, more in touch with the people.

Rev. Newton Hill of Omemee, who has been assisting Rev. A. B. Chambers in revival services, New Richmond Methodist church, will remain another week.

The success achieved last week was most gratifying. Rev. Mr. Hill's earnestness, and his plain presentation of gospel truth, have made a decided impression on the membership of the church and a goodly number of converts.

A Vigorous Advance in Prices, for Which the Financial Men Find it Difficult to Account.
