Sir George A. Kirkpatrick, K.C.M.G. and ex-Lieut.-Governor, died at 2.50 o'clock this morning at his residence, 215 Simcoe-street. For several hours before the end came he was very low and peacefully slept away. During the past two days of his life it was an active part, entering as a private durance of the condition of the canada Locomotive works of Kingston. He was chairman for some time and afterwards secretary for the Board of Trustees of the Collegiate Institute, being connected with the board since 1870.

During the past two days of his life it was apparent that he could not live much longer. At noon hour on Monday he took a turn for the worse and rapidly sank.





This must, of course; be done decorously, and in my opinion the previous speaker compiled with this condition."
