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

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



EPIDEMIC AT AN END.

Galt Had S1 Smallpox Cases, But Nearly All Are Convalescent, Galt, Feb. 11.-Notwithstanding some

rumors to the contrary, the smallpox epidemic in this town and neighborhood is at an end, and the disease otherwise is completely under control. There were in all 81 cases, affecting 21 families scattered thru the town, several of About three weeks ago the cases which were not convalescent were removed to the Isolation Hospital, which is on the hill west of the town and about six hundred yards from the General Hospital. Most of these cases, it is understood, were of a serious nature, being what is known as the confluent type. The local board of health has been The local board of health has been very active and energetic in dealing with the plague, and has been well supported by the citizens generally. Every house where there was a patient was closely quarantined, a guard being placed over it both night and day, and vent its spread. During the colder wea-ther fires were lighted near the quar-antined houses for the guards on duty. under treatment have been either discharged as cured or convalescent, the number in the Isolation Hospital being, so far as can be learned, sixteen. There was a slight reduction from the ast two years in deaths from contagious diseases. In tuberculosis the reduction was 122, measies 14, diphtheria 68, Scarlet fever agaths had increased by 73, whooping tough 32.

At me morning session the principal topic of discussion was the present outbreak of smallpex of an unusually virulent type. It is not so general as last year, but the mortality is greater. It had been reported in 42 centres, and was worst at Galt, where there were 65 cases, and five deaths. The necessity of prompt vaccination was emphasized. Out of 30 cases noted at Galt, 17 had never been vaccinated as were vaccinated in infancy, four after exposure to contagion. None of those who had undergone the operation succumbed. There had been 2468 cases, costing the municipalities half a million dollars.

In view of the serious aspect or the situation the board carried several protective measures. There is a provision for the instalment of temporary isolation hospitals to which cases must be removed, as now with diphtheria and smallpox. A medical officer on being informed of a known or asspected case must isolate it and quarantine all exposed persons, (ither in the home or other place of detention. No person who has not had scarlet fever will be permitted to leave their own premises until the period of incubation of the disease is passed and until the premises have been disinfected. If people are permitted to keep cases in their own houses the houses must be quarantined. The maximum period of incubation was placed at a week, and the minimum period of isolation at six weeks. When the disease occurs in a school a medical examination must be class-rooms or in the homes, till the period of incubation is passed. At present there is no fixed length of quarantine and incubation, and a doctor has the same autherity as a medical health officer.



Farmers' Paper on the Niagara Electric Franchises

From The Toronto Weekly Sun. The action of the Ontario govern nent in granting to a syndicate of Tovelop power at Niagara Falls has aroused widespread interest. The agreement for the concession was nade by the Niagara Falls Park Commissioners, under whose jurisdiction is vested the park at the Falls, and a strip of land along the river's bank, extending from Chippewa to Niagara-on-the-Lake. Prior agreements of a similar character have been made with two other power companies, the minimum annual rental in the case of one being \$15,000, and in the case of the other \$30,000. The minimum rental in the present case is \$15,000. The rent al increases in each case in propor-tion to the number of horsepower de-veloped. It is from the revenue de-rived from these sources that the Commissioners count on meeting expense of maintaining the parkaying off the debentures, which now mount to \$600,000. The government has reserved the right to pass upon all greements, that the Commissioners may make. Hence, the last agree-ment, like the former ones, came be-

ore it for consideration.

The ratification of the last agree nent by the government aroused spe-ial interest in Toronto, because only t the last session of the legislatur ne Municipal Committee, and virtua y the government, refused to give to coronto the right to develop and transmit electric energy from the same source. It now confers the right was denied to Toronto upon a bedy of men, who, between them control the street railway system and the electric light and power systems of the city.

These concerns are all largely over-capitalized, and the citizens are compelled to provide revenue on a vast amount of watered stock. It is hardly surprising that they regard the con-ferring, upon the capitalists mention-ed, of the franchise that was refused to them, as an attempt to plant the foot of monopoly firmly upon their necks. The provision in the charter that the company must sell power in Canada at the same price as it sells in the United States, does not, they

But, great as the interest o Toronto is in the matter, the interest of the Province is far greater. It is now clear that elec-tric energy will soon furnish the mo-tive power for the workshops and fac-tories of Western Ontario, and for a large section of the Province east of Toronto. It will furnish the means of cheaper electric transit. The possession of this power must give to those living in the district reached an immense advantage over all competi tors. We should see that this great gift of Nature comes to us free of toll, and that no promoters are permitted, thru schemes of over-capital-ization, to absorb the profits of a great public asset. If report be true, the company which has secured the last concession is already capitalized for ore than double the amount that ill be required to construct and equip its works.
