The Annual General Meeting of the Shareholders of the Continental Life Insurance Company was held at its Head Office, Toronto, on Wednesday, Feb. 11, 1903.

The Directors' Report for 1902 was presented as follows: Your Directors have great pleasure in presenting their Annual Report of the business of the Company for the year 1902.

During the year, 1055 applications for new insurance and revival of policies amounting to \$1,275,800.00 were received. The policies issued and revived numbered 1027 for \$1,214,886.00, 48 applications for \$71,000.00 having been rejected or deferred.

The total amount of insurance in force at the end of the year was 2369 over the previous year, or over 47 per cent. The total amount paid for re-insurances, the net premium income was \$78,208.13, which with \$436.87 received for interest on investments and \$18,477.77 received for premium on re-insurances, the net premium income was \$97,122.77. Adding \$52,491.52 received on account of Capital Stock, the total income was \$149,113.29.

The ratio of expenses of management to premium income was considerably less than in 1901.

After paying death losses, expenses of management, etc., the assets of the Company amounted to \$269,439.44, an increase of \$35,554.91 over those of the previous year.

The reserve on policies has been computed according to the Dominion Government standard, and amounted to \$128,830.75. The surplus to policyholders over all liabilities was \$126,376.79, an amount almost equal to the reserve on policies.

The death losses for the year were four in number, amounting to \$5479.02, which shows a rate of mortality exceptionally favorable and seldom equalled in the history of life insurance companies. The total amount paid for death claims was \$7329.02, which includes claim for \$2000.00 carried over from the previous year. There were no death claims unpaid at the end of 1902.

GIBSON AND CONNIE LAW

Modesty is not the predominating feature of Hon. J. M. Gibson's defence of the Connée law. Mr. Gibson is Attorney-General of Ontario, and he is financially interested in companies which the Connée law protects.

From the statement that Mr. Gibson now makes it is clear that the peculiar character of the first appeal against the scrap-iron law was a mere coincidence. It is clear also that Mr. Gibson's faith in the justice of the Connée Act is not shaken.

How can the Attorney-General of Ontario disassociate himself from Mr. Gibson, the beneficiary of government favors? Any Minister at Ottawa might, with as much justification, take shares in the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company and then pass judgment upon the application for a subsidy.

And yet Hon. J. M. Gibson has the nerve to defend the Connée Act. Who asked for the Connée Act? There was not a hint from the people that they should be placed at the mercy of every gas, water and electric light company in the Province.

PLEASE YOUR PATRONS. One thing the Canadian Pacific management prided itself on, and what it largely relied on, was that all its officers and men took a pride in being obliging to the public in trying to serve and please its patrons.

source are so only to a very limited extent. A judge is in a similar cramped position in regard to invasions of public right by corporations and moneyed interests. He may have the strongest views against a piece of legislation that is opposed to the public interest, but his duty is to interpret, not to condemn.

The moral of all this is that we require men of great legal attainments, astuteness, alertness and public spirit in positions like those of the Minister of Justice and the Solicitor-General of Canada and the Attorney-General of Ontario. These men can do what judges cannot do. They can take the initiative. They can frame legislation and by the strength of the government and the party majority they can have it enacted.

When a murder or other great crime is committed the Attorney-General has no doubt or misgiving as to his duty. He feels that he acts for all people of Ontario, and he has the kind of machinery in motion to detect, pursue and punish the offender. He does not satisfy himself with vague generalities about observing a strict impartiality as between the public and the prisoner.

A LAW FOR CORPORATIONS. There is need of a provincial general law covering the relations of all franchise-holding corporations with each other, with municipalities and with the public. A small, weak municipality may make an agreement which not only gives away its own rights but endangers the rights of others.

The railways of this country are governed by a general railway act as well as by the law governing common carriers. The law is not perfect, and, in fact, it has many grave defects. Still there is a general law in which the people may find a declaration of their rights, and which may be improved from time to time.
