JAPANESE SITUATION

Japan Will Not Agree to Immigration Treaty

SACRIFICE OF HONOR

Mayor Schmitz Talks on Japs in 'Frisco Schools--Law of Segregation an Old One But Its Enforcement Has Created an Agitation.

TOKYO, Feb. 8.—While ignoring the anti-Japanese feeling in a portion of the American press, the Japanese public is almost unanimous in demanding that the solution of the San Francisco question must not involve the labor question.

CHICAGO, Feb. 8.—Mayor Eugene Schmitz, of San Francisco, who, with four members of the Board of Education and the superintendent of schools of that city, is en route to Washington, in response to an invitation from President Roosevelt, said last night that he would endorse his position on the Japanese school question rather than see it become injurious to the country.

WOULD GIRDLE WHOLE GLOBE

An All-World Government Cable Service Proposed by Principal Gordon to Empire Club of Toronto.

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A VICTIM OF TERRORISTS

Governor of Penza Shot and Killed by Assassin

WAS LEAVING THEATRE

When Terrorist Approached and Shot Him—Assassin Killed Two More Men, Wounded Third and Shot Himself.

PENZA, Russia, Feb. 8.—S. A. Alexandrovsky, governor of Penza, was shot and killed by a young man as he was leaving the theatre last night. In trying to escape, the assassin also killed the assistant chief of police and a policeman and wounded the manager of the theatre. The terrorist then shot himself and died in a hospital.

The assassin was not identified. The bullets which he used were subsequently discovered to be poisoned.

M. Alexandrovsky, who was well known as the chief commissioner of the Red Cross in the field in the war between Russia and Japan, had just stepped out of the theatre when a man pushed his way through the crowd and shot the governor through the neck. He fell dead on the spot.

When the assistant chief of police, who was standing in the door of the theatre, tried to draw his revolver he was shot dead by the terrorist. Seeing that it was impossible to get through the crowds around the theatre, the murderer dashed into the building firing wildly. The manager attempted to grapple with the murderer, who fired at him, but missed, and killed a policeman, who was in a line of fire. A second attempt to capture the assassin resulted in the severe wounding of the manager.

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Principal Gordon pointed out how little Canadian knew of other possessions of Britain and other possessions probably known as little of Canada. The ignorance of otherwise fairly informed people in Britain on Canadian affairs was so well known that it was not necessary to state instances. The Canadian press, excellent as it was, did not supply the information required by the Canadian relative to British colonial affairs.

What the imperial federationists desire was that the cable now running from Vancouver to Australia should be supplemented by the completion of three other sections of cables. The first section should be a cable from Britain to Nova Scotia, and across Canada to Vancouver, to join the Pacific cable there, then from Australia and New Zealand to India, and the third stretch from India to Cape Town, South Africa, thence to the West Indies, with branches from these latter lands to Nova Scotia and Great Britain. The greatest opposition at present came from the Eastern Telegraph Company, which had practically a monopoly. The influence of that corporation was used in Britain, Australia and India to prevent the construction of this all-British cable service, which, if properly used, would form a bond of union binding all parts of the empire more closely together and giving information which would be valuable in trade and commerce. The cost of such a cable would be about \$25,000,000, not a sum which should prevent its construction by the united empire.



THE CIVIC ELECTIONS

One Citizen Suggests that Board of Trade Put Ticket of Business Men in Field.

Unless there is an awakening of the citizens from the apathy that marks their bearing toward civic affairs at the present time, it seems unlikely that the civic elections to be held a few weeks hence will be of much interest, and but slight change will be effected in the council. Speaking with some of the leading merchants yesterday the question of the approaching elections was broached and elicited scarcely any interest. One prominent business man gave as his opinion that the board of trade, which is composed of good level headed men, should get busy in the near future and endeavor to place a ticket of the leading business men in the field. There had been talk some time ago, he said, of some of the merchants meeting together and considering the matter, but all interest had apparently died out and nothing was being done.

LADY GRENFELL'S BODY ARRIVES

It Was Placed on Empress of Britain for Shipment to England --- Britain Takes Large Passenger List.

The steamer Empress of Britain, which sails this evening, will take away about 400 to 450 passengers and a good general cargo. The Montreal train arrives today in four sections. The first section, which is the regular train, arrived as usual about 12.05. The second section, on which was the body of Lady Victoria Grenfell, daughter of Earl Grey, Governor General of Canada, arrived about two hours later, and went direct to Saint John, where the body was placed on board the steamer. The party accompanying the body consisted of Arthur Grenfell, R. Grenfell, Grenfell, Mrs. Balfour, Lady Sybil Grey and Col. Sir Henry Rawlinson. The body is being taken to England for interment.

One of the baggage rooms in the Empress of Britain, in which the casket will rest, has been converted into a temporary mortuary chamber, and decorated with boughs and evergreens. There was no ceremony attached to the transfer of the casket from the train to the steamer. The funeral car was simply drawn to the side of the big vessel and the casket taken aboard.

The bulk of the passengers for the steamer here, and the fourth section, with the overcoats mail and baggage will likely go through to Halifax and be placed on the steamer at that port. Among the St. John people taking passage on the Empress are Judge and Mrs. A. I. Trueman and James Manchester.

NEWSPAPER MEN FORM "DAYLIGHT" K. O. P.

(Boston Post, Feb. 6.) Named after a plucky American printer and under suspicious surroundings, with an initial membership of 39, Horace Greeley Lodge, I. O. O. F., was instituted in Encampment Hall, 724 Washington street, yesterday afternoon by Grand Chancellor Scott and a suite of grand officers in the presence of a large number of officers and members of other lodges. The new lodge is called a "daylight" lodge from the fact that all its members are night workers on newspapers in this city. The institution of a "daylight" lodge is an innovation in this city or in New England, and there are only four others in the country. The candidates were put through the first rank by Unity Lodge of Boston, second rank by Arctura Lodge of West Somerville and third rank by a combined staff. After the exercises a supper was served.

WINTER PORT NOTES

The valuation of the outward cargo of the Donaldson line steamship Kastania, now on her way to Glasgow is as follows: Canadian goods, \$126,650; foreign goods, \$18,938. Total \$145,588. The Donaldson line people, it is stated, have contracted to bring 10,000 passengers before April 1. Free now until the opening of navigation on the St. Lawrence river the emigration here from the old country will be large. All the C. P. R. passenger steamers have booked large numbers. C. P. R. steamship Lake Erie, now on her way to Liverpool, has booked 1,000 passengers on her return trip to this port from Liverpool. The outward cargo of the C. P. R. steamship Monmouth, now on her way to Bristol from this port, is: Canadian goods, \$201,488; foreign goods, \$27,677; total, \$229,165. C. P. R. steamship Montezuma, for London and Antwerp, took away \$201,751 worth of Canadian goods, and \$125,623 worth of foreign goods, a total of \$327,374. Furness line steamship Almeriana, Capt. Hanky, left London on the 7th inst at 2 p. m. for this port via Halifax.
