SEVERAL ST. JOHN MEN IN NEW LIST OF CASUALTIES RECEIVED

One Killed; Others Wounded — New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and P. E. Island Soldiers in Lengthy Roster

The news that he was wounded by a bursting shell which killed three others in the same group has been received from her husband by Mrs. Alphonso McDonald of 157 Rockland road. In the same mail she received word that her husband's brother, Fias McDonald, had been admitted to hospital suffering from shell shock.

F. Alphonso McDonald had been a checker with the C. P. R. in this city, and was in the 68th Battalion. He is now in the Bevin Military Hospital, Kent county, England, suffering from a fracture and three wounds in the arm. At the time he was wounded he was standing in a group of four when the shell burst amongst them. He escaped death, apparently by a miracle, while the others were killed.

His brother, Fias McDonald, had been employed with the C. P. R. as a trucker and went overseas with the same draft. He was admitted to the military hospital in Epsom, England, suffering from shell shock. The brothers are natives of Glace Bay, C. B.

Sergeant James Donahue
Mrs. John Crawford of Fairville yesterday received from England word of the death of Sgt. James Donahue of a N. B. Infantry battalion, who was killed in a bayonet charge on Sept. 17. The word came from his father in England. Sgt. Donahue had lived in St. John for nine years, boarding with Mrs. Crawford. He was a bricklayer by trade and made many warm friends in this city. He was 28 years old and had no relatives in St. John. His people live in London. **Helmet Saves Life**
Gunner James Crossman's life was saved by a steel helmet it was wearing, according to a letter received by his mother, Mrs. George Crossman of Moncton, from Capt. F. J. Alderson of a battery in which Gunner Crossman was serving. Crossman was wounded in the head with a piece of shrapnel.

Official information has reached Mrs. J. E. Durean of 122 Hawthorne avenue, St. John, that her husband, Pte. J. E. Durean, was wounded in the left arm on October 7, and was admitted to No. 11 station hospital, France. Pte. Durean went over with a New Brunswick battalion and has been in the trenches for a year, but up to the present had been most fortunate. He is twenty-nine years of age. He has a wife and four small children. Previous to proceeding overseas he was in the employ of the Imperial Continental Ltd. The despatch came to Mrs. Durean on last Sunday night.
Gunner I. N. Carson
Gunner I. N. Carson, son of Heber Carson of Moncton, was killed in action on October 8. He lived for some years in Calgary, and enlisted in the 51st Battalion, later being transferred to another unit.

H. C. Donovan
Mrs. J. J. Donovan, of 627 Main street, received a telegram from Ottawa this morning informing her that her son, Driver Harold Christie Donovan, had been admitted to No. 4 Australian General Hospital in Boulogne on October 7, suffering from a gun-shot wound in the shoulder and hand. Driver Donovan joined in Halifax at the outbreak of the war and was given the rank of corporal. In order that he might get the benefit of an earlier date, he resigned from that unit, returned home and joined No. 3 Army Service Corps. Upon his arrival in England he was transferred to a Field Ammunition corps. He has two brothers also in khaki—Private Leo J. with a Canadian Cavalry unit and Private Offert K. with the 140th.

Major Southam
Hamilton, Oct. 17.—Major Gordon H. Southam, commander of the Hamilton Sportsmen's Battery, son of William Southam, president of the Spectator Printing Company, has been killed in action. He was one of Canada's famous football stars and prominent in other lines of sport.

Second Time Wounded.
That Bombardier Thomas James was wounded in action on October 7, and was admitted to No. 4 Australian General Hospital, Glasgow, is the official word received by his sister, Mrs. Northrup, 78 St. John street, West. Bombardier James is twenty-four years of age and a member of a fighting family. One brother was killed in action at the Verdun, another is with the Canadian forces now at the front, and has also two cousins who have given their lives on the field of action. He was a miner in Sydney previous to enlistment, but formerly lived here.

It is worthy of note that Bombardier James enlisted on the first day that war was declared. This is the second time that his name has appeared on the casualty list.

POPE APPEALS TO AMERICAN CHILDREN

Asks Them to Aid the Million and Half of Needy Little Ones in Belgium

Rome, Oct. 17.—The Pope has made an appeal to the children of happy and prosperous America to aid the million and a half unhappy children of Belgium.

The appeal of the Pontiff is the result of a visit paid him by George Marshall, a young American boy who came to the Vatican at the instance of Herbert Hoover, chairman of the American commission for relief of Belgium.

Mr. Marshall, who is twelve years of age, told the Pope that the Belgian children were reduced below normal weight and were suffering from lack of food.

He said that tuberculosis was increasing rapidly and that many children were dying from lack of food.

He proposed to give the children a supplementary daily meal of a cup of chocolate or milk and one sweetened biscuit.

Experience has shown that this addition to their diet will maintain their condition at normal and will restore those already weakened.

The cost of this meal is three cents for each child daily. Mr. Hoover hopes to obtain the assistance of the American Catholic clergy in enlisting the American children in relief work.

GERMANS FORCING BELGIANS TO WORK FOR THEM; SHOOT 12

London, Oct. 17.—The Amsterdam correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Company writes: "Three hundred workers in a Ghent factory who refused to work in German munition factories in Belgium have been arrested and sent to Germany. Twelve who resisted were shot."

The Germans everywhere are forcing the Belgians to work for them, particularly on their railways.

ALL MADE MONEY EXCEPT THE PHILADELPHIA CLUB

Chicago, Oct. 17.—Prosperity marked the American League season just closed, according to B. B. Johnson, president of the organization, who is at his office here today, after an absence of two weeks, during which he attended the world's series.

"Only one club in the league lost money," he said, "and some teams practically made up what money they lost through the invasion of the Federal League. Philadelphia is the only club that lost money."

AN AFTER THE WAR TRADE MATTER

New York, Oct. 17.—American business must expect the keenest competition with European nations, especially Great Britain, in the Latin-American trade after the war, according to a statement by John Barrett, director-general of the Pan-American Union, who returned yesterday from Bordeaux after a trip to England and France.

"I return convinced," said Mr. Barrett, "that the commercial, manufacturing, banking and general financial interests of the United States will make a great mistake if they count upon any general let-up in British and French efforts to take care, after the war, of their trade and financial interests in Latin America. Although the belligerent nations will be heavily handicapped by the cost of the war, they are leaving no efforts neglected at the present time to prepare to regain any commerce they may have lost."

SON OF M. P. IS KILLED

Ottawa, Oct. 17.—Robert Cruise, 15 year old son of Robert Cruise, M. P., for Dauphin, has been killed in action at the front.

Hon. J. D. Hazen's son was killed last spring while several other members including Messrs. Cockshutt and Turfitt have had sons wounded with the Canadian forces.

Wilson Acknowledges Failure.
Long Branch, N. J., Oct. 17.—President Wilson announced today that his efforts to bring an agreement among belligerent nations to allow relief supplies to be sent to Poland had failed.

Bring Home Word That War Has Taken Definite Turn in Allies' Favor

New York, Oct. 17.—Belief that the war has taken a definite turn in favor of the allies may be regarded as certain was expressed by passengers on board the steamer La Fayette which arrived here yesterday from Bordeaux.

Samuel S. CROSS OF LEGION OF HONOR FOR BISHOP OF ARRAS

Paris, Oct. 17.—Monsieur Emile Lobbey, Bishop of Arras, has been decorated with the Cross of the Legion of Honor for his heroism and devotion which he remained at his post of duty under fire.

The official decree says: "He remained at Arras amidst the first lines from October, 1914, to June, 1915, under a bombardment which was sometimes very violent. He exerted himself unceasingly for the accomplishment of his ministry, visiting the soldiers, burying the dead, assisting ambulances, giving to all a magnificent example of calm, sangfroid, energy and duty fully done under the immediate menace of the enemy."

BUT WHERE IS SHE?

London, Oct. 17.—According to the Vossische Zeitung, the commander of the second German army corps as forbidden the publication of the Pommersee Telegram for printing an article entitled "The Destruction of the Bremen," a commercial submarine. French And British Both Report Gains

SOMETHING IS DEVELOPING IN GREEK SITUATION

Petrograd, Oct. 17.—"Teutonic troops are heavily counter-attacking the Russian lines in the region southeast of Lemberg. The attacks were launched after bombardments of great intensity, in the district north of Korytnia and near Bolshova, five miles north of Hales. The Russians took fifty prisoners and captured a machine gun during the fighting. In the Carpathians, near the junction of the Romanian, Hungarian and Bukovinian borders, where the Austrian and German forces have assumed the offensive, the Russians repelled all attacks.

Paris, Oct. 17.—Violent artillery fighting is in progress on the Macedonian front. In the region of the Cerna river, the war office reports, the Serbians checked a Romanian counter-attack.

Three Canadians Make Good Escape

Break German Prison Camp and Reach Holland Safely; It Was Second Attempt

London, Sept. 22.—The statement recently made from Holland that live wire on the frontier had been cut by the Germans seems to be borne out by the fact that three Canadians have arrived in England this week, having escaped from prison camps. They arrived together but two of them were from Seltsigen and one from Munster. The three met in Holland at the consulate and were sent to England. Corp. Edward Edwards, of Toronto and M. C. Simmons, of Trail, B.C., the former of the P.C.L.I., the latter of the 7th Battalion, were taken prisoners at the second battle of Ypres last year. They were sent to Giessem, from where they were transferred to Cille and then to Seltsigen early this year. The last-mentioned place was a farm camp, where the land was being reclaimed and cultivated. They had made an attempt to escape from Giessem, which being unsuccessful, entailed fourteen days in a dark cell for each, followed by a certain "strafing" for a few weeks. Nothing daunted, they made another attempt on the 29th August this year, and this time after 20 days of hardships and dangers obtained their freedom. The actual distance to the frontier was about 160 miles, but to avoid detection they made wide detours. The escape was made at night, and was temporarily absent, and there was no chance of taking rations or extra clothes with them. Fortunately the weather was not bad for sleeping out of doors and living on uncooked food. Their daily menu comprised succulent foods such as turnips and potatoes, with berries and other fruit found growing and beyond water their only drink milk drawn from a kindly kine. Not caring to frequent the main roads, they considered it safer not to cross bridges, and were obliged several times to swim rivers and canals which in that part of Germany are abundant. An effective disguise was contrived by the aid of a stray paintpot, which altered the color of their uniforms. Once when they came to a canal bank they were challenged by an elderly sentinel, but as it was two to one they looked of the tramp variety, he did not stop to discuss the matter, but allowed them to go by turning his back. When the two men got into Holland they did not know where they were definitely, although they suspected they were safe as they tried to cook some food in an empty house. The villagers who approached them were quite friendly, and gladly escorted them to the local authorities; in fact, when it became known that the men were Canadian fugitive soldiers the village band turned out and played them up to the mayor's house. Arrangements were made to supply them with food and clothing, and to take charge of the men, and within a few days they reached London.

BONDS FOR NEW SCHOOL

Other Matters at Meeting of the Trustees. Reporting for the building committee, G. E. Day announced that the carpenter contractor for the Bentley street school had refused to sign the contract on the grounds that the price of iron beams was not included in the figures and that they would cost \$5,000 more. He recommended that half of the increased cost be met by eliminating the vacuum cleaning system and excavating one foot less of rock in the rear. The \$75,000 needed to build the new school house in Bentley street, now in the course of construction, will be raised by the issue of bonds, in denominations of \$500, redeemable in twenty-five years, with interest payable at five per cent. This and the fact that the Grand Lodge of Masons of New Brunswick would be asked to lay the corner stone of the new building, was decided at the regular meeting of the board of school trustees, held last evening. These decisions and a vote to the effect that an enumeration of children of the school age be taken with the next list of taxpayers, and urging the committee appointed last July to again go before the government and ask for permission to raise the school assessment to \$200,000, constituted the principal items, outside of routine matters, that were disposed of by the board. Secretary Leavitt's report showed that the number of students enrolled in the schools total 7,792, of whom 3,177 are boys and 4,615 are girls. The average attendance during September was 91.56. One thousand one hundred and forty-five new permits were issued, compared with 1,124 last year. The secretary also read a new schedule of increase in wages for teachers. Mr. Henry, one of the former teachers in the St. John schools, has been wounded at the front, and the board directed the secretary to write his parents, expressing the feeling of the trustees. Trust Officer McMann submitted his report, showing 50 irregulars and four truants during the month of September. During the two years of war about 800 mines have been driven ashore or exploded on the west coast of Jutland.

MORNING WAR CABLES. To the south of the Somme yesterday the French forces captured a small wood and repulsed a counter-attack by the Germans. The British troops repulsed an effort by the Germans to recapture ground around the British front. The Sifton on the Macedonian front British troops have advanced and reached the village of Bursak, eight miles southwest of Demir-Hissar. The Roumanian army headquarters reports that on Transylvania front they have captured several positions from the Teutonic allies. The Entente allies have formally recognized the provisional government of Greece in the island of Crete, set up by former Premier Venizelos. It is only in Crete that the question has arisen. The German Imperial Bank, on behalf of the committee formed under the presidency of the Crown Prince, has appealed to the people of Germany to give their gold ornaments, etc., to be converted into coin for the use of the government.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES. It is learned from good authority in Ottawa that the Alberta legislature will be dissolved and a general election will be held before Christmas. The Sifton government will undoubtedly be returned and probably with an increased majority. The commission appointed in London to inquire into the shooting of P. Sheehy Skerrington during the rebellion in Ireland last spring, found, yesterday, that the execution of Skerrington was not justified and that the action of Captain Bowen Colthurst as remarkable, leaving no room for excuse.

Six Brothers In Fighting Ranks

Three Have Won Commissions on the Field; Their Grandfather Was Officer in U. S. Army

The six sons of Mrs. G. D. Campbell of Weymouth, N.S., formerly of Bangor, who enlisted in the British army, are now serving their country with bravery and distinction, thus carrying out the proud traditions of their family. Mrs. Campbell's father, Alpheus Taf Palmer of Bangor, was a first lieutenant in the United States army during the Mexican war of 1846, and was brevetted on the field in recognition of his service. During the Civil war, he acted as drill-master and recruiting officer for the volunteer regiments then departing for the south.

Mrs. Campbell is the wife of G. D. Campbell, head of the Campbell Pulp & Paper Co., Ltd., one of the big industries of Digby county, Nova Scotia. Her fighting sons are:

Colin, lieutenant in a regiment at the front.
Kenneth, lieutenant of the 219th Highland battalion.
Thomas in the — battalion at the front.
Glidden, machine gun officer with the 8th Nova Scotia Highlanders.
Albert, with the 58th Howitzer Battery of Fredericton, now at Peterawa.
Duncan, sergeant in the 106th Battalion, now in England.

This is one of the finest records of any family in Nova Scotia, or for that matter in Canada. A year ago last Christmas the entire family was united in Weymouth; today, the sons are scattered at the front, in England and in Canada. All are King's College men. Three of them have won commissions. Colin won his after long service as a private and experience in severe fighting at the front. The other two, Glidden and Kenneth, obtained commissions after long study and close attention to military duties. Three others, Thomas, Albert and Duncan, enlisted as privates. Duncan was promoted to sergeant soon after enlisting.

Colin, the youngest of the family, was the first to enlist, joining the army in August, 1914, soon after the war broke out. He entered the home service and did duty at McNab's Island in connection with the searchlight service. Later he became attached to the 28th artillery battery at Fredericton. When the battery was sent to France, Campbell was wounded in the battle of La Bassée. He was returned to England and after convalescing, again went to the front and was in the big offensive near Albert, where he received several wounds and is again in England recovering.

Thomas Campbell has seen much active service in Belgium, and was awarded to England suffering from shell shock, but has completely recovered and is doing another bit at the front.

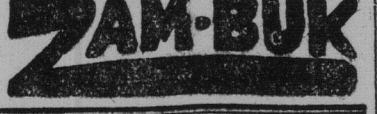

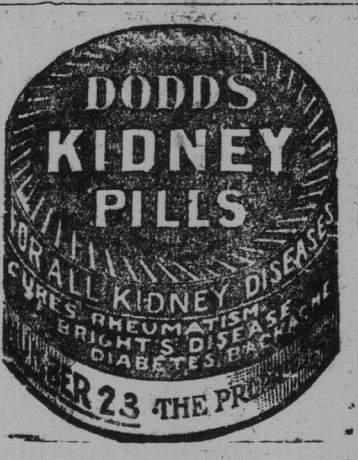

ARTIFICIAL LIMBS FOR THE CANADIANS

Ottawa, Oct. 17.—The military hospitals commission has appointed a committee on orthopedics, to consider the matter of artificial limbs for members of the Canadian expeditionary force who need such appliances. The committee will be composed of the following experts: Dr. Clarence Starr, Toronto, president; Dr. W. E. Galle, Toronto, and Lieut.-Col. McKenzie Forbes, M.D., Montreal. Dr. F. J. Shepherd, Montreal, one of the medical members of the commission, and Lieut.-Col. Thompson, M.D., the medical superintendent of the commission will be ex-officio members.

The committee will decide, amongst other things: The type of limb to be used; the standardization of its parts; whether, in supplying limbs for the upper extremities, the individual should have different kinds for different work or one limb with different attachments. The commission has its own factory close to its central convalescent hospital in Toronto. There, from now on, all the artificial limbs required by the soldiers will be made.

Mrs. Robert Brown, 88 Millidgeville avenue, has received a letter from her son, Pte. James H. Brown, of the 26th Battalion, from Lord Derby War Hospital, Warrington, England, dated Sept. 30. He has been wounded for the second time. In the letter he says:

"I went from Boulogne to Havre last month and from there to the battalion and we had a big hike from Ypres to the Somme. We were fifteen days on the road. Then we went into action a few days later and I was wounded for the second time. I was hit a little harder this time. I am still in bed, it is

We lost a lot of the boys in that fight, but we made a good job of it. For three days we were in it, it was a great fight and Fritz was not in it with our boys. We took the village of Courcellette from him, and a lot of prisoners. That was where I got wounded. There is nothing more I can tell you just now of that fight."

EDITH CAVELL CASE IS PROMPT AGAIN

British Doctor Charged With Providing Funds For Her, Court-martialed by Germans

London, Oct. 17.—A court-martial will assemble at Brussels today for the trial of fourteen persons accused of conspiracy, according to news despatches from Rotterdam. The despatches say that the prisoners include Dr. Bull, a wealthy Englishman, who is charged with having provided Nurse Edith Cavell with funds to assist in the escape of Belgian soldiers.

Dr. Bull, who was formerly dentist to the Belgian royal family, will, it is said, have the assistance of United States Minister Brand Whitlock in his defense.

Fire at Camp Borden.

Camp Borden, Ont., Oct. 16.—Fire at midnight tonight destroyed the headquarters, mess room and kitchen. The loss is estimated at \$4,000.
