Scores of other messages from the front are to similar effect. One private writes: "Mrs. ... offered to send me a rug. I have written to tell her to send out some Zam-Buk instead. It will be of more use here than all the blankets in creation."

Another says: "Advise every one of the boys to bring with him a box of Zam-Buk; it is better than a loaf of bread to a starving man out here."

Still another private says: "On the retreat from Mons we had a forced march of thirty-seven miles, and I engaged on communications, it is priceless. Send a few boxes in your next parcel. Remember also to take the same kind of injuries sustained at home, it is just as good."

**URGES ONE DIVORCE COURT FOR ALL CANADA**

Montreal, May 20—A divorce court for all Canada, on the plan of the Exchequer Court and sitting in the various provinces as often as necessary, was advocated by Howard Ross, K. C., in an address in the school room of Olivet Baptist Church. The address was given under the auspices of the Province of Quebec Baptist Women's Home and Foreign Mission Board.

"This would be a step toward the uniformity of laws," said Mr. Ross. "At present Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and British Columbia have divorce courts, and even in these courts there is a difference in procedure. In 1883 a divorce court was established in Prince Edward Island, but no cases have been tried by this court for many years. Only people who wish to do so need apply to such a court, as is the case with applications to the senate, thus giving such a court jurisdiction in Quebec Province would not interfere with the views of persons who object to divorces."

**ZIONIST COMMITTEE TO SEND FUNDS TO RUSSIA**

New York, May 20—The provisional executive committee for general Zionist affairs announces that it has arranged to forward to Russia funds which residents of the United States may desire to transmit to relatives there. This is an extension of the committee's plan of forwarding such funds to the people of Palestine.

**WOUNDED PRAISE CANADIANS**

A Nova Scotia nurse in one of the hospitals at the front, writes a very interesting letter to an Amherst lady. She says that on every hand, especially from the wounded "Tommys," who come to the hospital, she hears high praises of the Canadian soldiers for the bravery they displayed at the battles of Langemarck and Ypres. The wounded German prisoners who were also brought in, remarked that the Canadians fought "like very devils."

This nurse remarked as rather a striking coincidence that one of the first patients that had fallen to her lot to treat was Stanley Chambers, son of Syreter Chambers, of Truro, father and son being personal friends of her own.

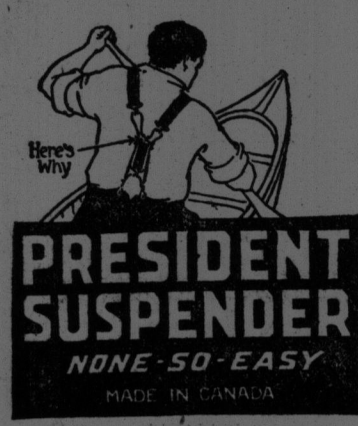

**DR. J. R. McINTOSH HAS PASSED AWAY**

Prominent Eye Specialist and Active Member of Masonic Fraternity Dead

St. John lost one of its most prominent citizens this morning in the death of John Robertson McIntosh, M.D., who passed away after having been in failing health for some time at his home, 40 Coburg street. A few days ago he suffered a stroke of paralysis. He was a native of West St. John where he was born fifty-three years ago, and though much of his younger life was spent away from home in study and practice, for more than twenty years he had been residing in this city, esteemed by the public, revered by his family and friends and recognized as a doctor of ability with an especially well developed and expert knowledge of eye and ear maladies.

His wife, who was formerly Miss Miriam McLeod of Springfield, to whom he was married on June 26, 1888, in Fredericton, survives, with two sons, John Forbes and Clarence Alexander McIntosh, both at home. Sincere sympathy will be extended by numerous friends in the hour of their bereavement. The funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.

His early school days were spent by Dr. McIntosh in the public schools of this city, and in 1876 he graduated from the Grammar School with honors, winning the Corporation Gold Medal. He then pursued his studies at the U.M.B. from which he graduated as B.A. in 1882. After this he went to the old country, taking up the study of medicine in Edinburgh, receiving his degree of M.B. and C.M. in 1888, and completing his studies at the university there in 1890 when he graduated with his M.D. degree.

The young doctor remained in England for a few years, practicing his profession for a time in Hartlepool, and later going to London where he spent about three years in practice, and in special studies of eye diseases. After the completion of this period he returned to St. John, and had since following his profession here, meeting with distinct success and winning a lasting reputation.

Doctor McIntosh was active and prominent in several societies, in which he will be greatly missed. He was particularly interested in the Masonic Fraternity, and had held offices in that order, including his being past master in Albion Lodge, past high priest, Carleton Chapter, No. 1, Royal Arch Chapter, past commander of the Encampment of St. John, Knights Templars, and past potentate of Luxor Temple, Order of the Mystic Shrine. Besides being prominent Mason, Doctor McIntosh took a keen interest in his membership in St. Andrew's Society, and was a member of the board of trustees of St. Andrew's church. By his associates in these several bodies today, the news of his death was learned with sincere regret.

**AT FOOTBALL WHEN THE BIG NEWS CAME**

Driver David Guilfoil Sends Word of Recent Heavy Fighting—Canadians Kept Germans From Calais

William Guilfoil, of 80 Chapel street, has received a letter from his brother, David, dated May 8, David is a driver with the Ammunition Column. He writes:

"I have had many narrow escapes, and came through O.K., although they fought us dirty and had a double-numbered. We gave them all they wanted and they did not get through, but it was a terrible battle and is still raging. The Canadian casualties are very heavy. We had just finished supper and were starting a game of football. Although there was heavy artillery fire, we did not pay much attention to it, and kept on playing. Suddenly some one says, 'The infantry are retreating,' and they were very fast. It was the French and Algerians, who were on the left of our boys. They were another out. By the time I got my horses hooked in, the bullets were flying in all directions, so we pulled out and were on the go, supplying the batteries, for three or four days without sleep or hardly anything to eat. It certainly was a terrible sight—men and horses lying everywhere dead and dying, and shells bursting all around. Think the people who thought the Canadians were only gilt-edged soldiers will change their minds. Had it not been for the Germans would have been well on their way to Calais."

"We are only fifty miles from the firing line and on clear days we can hear the roar of the cannon," says Private H. G. Case, No. 2 Co., C. A. S. Co. of this city, who is now in Sandling Camp, Aylesbury, Kent, with his unit. Private Case tells of frequent visits to Folkestone where the men find special facilities for managing themselves. On their arrival they had a twelve mile tramp from the train to the camp.

From Corporal Devennis:

A letter from Corporal Walter H. Devennis to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alex. Devennis, Barker street, from Folkestone, England, was received yesterday. It told of his trip across in safety, although he had been ill for a few days. He said he and his comrades had become accustomed to the life in the English camp, where they were comfortably located in huts. He asked to be remembered to his friends in St. John.

**ANXIETY DISPELLED**

Mrs. J. W. Warden and Children Did Not Leave New York Until Last Friday

A Vancouver despatch says that Mrs. J. W. Warden and three children, whom relatives here feared had sailed in the Lusitania and were lost, did not leave Vancouver until the day on which the Lusitania was torpedoed and they called from New York on last Friday. The news will bring relief to many friends. Mrs. Warden and children are going to the husband and father, Capt. J. W. Warden, of Baywater, who has been wounded in the war.

**ONE GOES TO DORCHESTER AND OSTROPOVITCH ACQUITTED**

Harry Ostropovitch and Emil Karl were tried before Judge Forbes this morning under the Speedy Trials Act on the charge of stealing \$60 from Peter Kirilick at East St. John about a month ago. Several witnesses were examined. His Honor acquitted Ostropovitch, and sentenced Karl guilty of theft, and sentenced him to serve two years in Dorchester penitentiary with hard labor. E. S. Ritchie appeared for Ostropovitch, and C. H. Ferguson prosecuted.

**FOURTY-THREE FROM THIS CHURCH**

Rev. Mr. Denison, pastor of the Tabernacle church, was unable to attend the recruiting meeting today, but he sent a message to the Times to say that his church and congregation, relatively small though it might be, had forty-three men enlisted, and ten more wanted to go, but were rejected. About twenty per cent. of the men of the church, members and adherents, had enlisted, and one mother herself an invalid, has given three sons to the cause. Mr. Denison added that on Sunday next he would comply with the governor's proclamation, in the fullest sympathy with the recruiting campaign.
