Enchanted are they with pictures of floating elevators, radio stations, sea plane bases and a multitude of other things, imaginable and unimaginable. Ordinarily this has been as a magnet to St. John. In the present instance, the Government of which Hon. THRONG ATTEND FUNERAL IN CORK

Burial of Seumas Quirke, Killed There

Cork, Sept. 13—The funeral of Seumas Quirke, a young volunteer, killed in Thursday's disturbance, brought out virtually every able-bodied man and woman in Cork yesterday. There were large numbers of children also, but there was an entire absence of disorder. The military, as on the occasion of the funeral of the slain Lord Mayor Mac-Curtain here in last April, remained in barracks.

where the hunger strikers are slowly dying.

The streets of Cork and the long route to the cemetery were lined with spectators as the funeral procession, in which probably 6,000 men and women marched passed. The Archbishop of Adelaide was among the high church dignitaries and hundreds of priests and monks made up the clerical contingent. Men prominent here in every walk of life were among the marching host.

The only notes of color in the drab sombre pageant was supplied by the Gaelic kilted bands, with bagpipes and muffled drums, which played unceasingly the Irish dirge "Wrap the Green Flag Around Me Boys—to die—'tis far more Sweet," and by little girls in vivid green mantles of the national costume.

Order was well preserved by the volunteers, a squad of whom fired a salute over the grave. The priest's brief oration at the graveside contained references to the hunger strikers and an expression of the wish that all Irishmen might meet death as heroically as Quirks had done and as the Cork prisoners were doing.

Dominion Labor Congress.

Windsor, Ont. Sept. 13—A resolution denouncing the British Government for its policy towards Lord Mayor MacSwiney of Cork has been submitted to the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress by a Toronto group of delegates.

Toronto delegates who are here, admit that such a resolution was drafted some time ago in Toronto by a branch of the Independent Labor Party which is entitled to representation at the congress. The names of some of the prominent members of the labor political group are attached to it but these will not be divulged until the formal presentation of the motion to the congress. "We have taken the stand endorsed at last year's congress," explains Tom Moore president of the congress, "that Ireland cannot secede from the empire, but that a dominion government, be granted that country by the British parliament. If the Irish had agreed among themselves some twenty years ago on what kind of government they wanted the British Empire would not now be confronted with the present serious situation. What is the use of telling the Irish people what they want when they don't know themselves? The events of the last year have not changed my views on the Irish question."
