THREE MORE DREDGES FOR COURTENAY BAY

I. Norton Griffiths in Cable To The Board of Trade Announces Plans for Rushing the Work

That two dredges are already on their way to St. John and another is coming for the Courtenay Bay work, was the news cable yesterday by Norton Griffiths, M. P. Two of them should reach here before the end of the week. The cablegram follows:—

London, April 6, 1914.

Secretary Board of Trade, St. John, N. B.: Sucker sailed Thursday from New York. Elevator dredge General Diaz, similar to Fielding, sailed Thursday from New York. Lloyds would not allow earlier departure. I expect to sail within a fortnight after despatching still another and steam hoppers. No stone left unturned or expense spared to take advantage of the coming fine weather.

NORTON GRIFFITHS. The two dredges which left New York Thursday should arrive here before the end of the week, and they will be a valuable addition to the Courtenay Bay fleet.

The Norton Griffiths Company had a crew of men at work yesterday moving 100 pieces of machinery and apparatus which were brought here from London and Liverpool by the steamers Shenandoah and Tyrolia. The machine parts consist of buckets, dredging machinery and apparatus for use in the extensive operations which are to be carried on at Courtenay Bay this year.

ANNUAL MEETING OF KING'S DAUGHTERS

Encouraging Reports Show Good Work Accomplished During Year—Many Girls Assisted—The Y. W. C. A.

At the annual meeting of the St. John branch of the order of the King's Daughters, which was held last evening in the guild rooms in Prince Wm. Street, Mrs. G. A. Henderson presiding, the annual reports were submitted, and an increase of membership of 200 shown. Mrs. J. S. Flaglor, retiring president, led in the devotional exercises, and Miss Alice G. Rising was in her place as secretary. Her report of the year's work was interesting and well received, as it showed much good work done, and spoke of encouraging prospects.

The treasurer's report showed the income for the year to be \$8,512.80 and expenditures \$3,766, the amount in the bank being \$768.98.

The report of the house committee was presented by Mrs. A. F. Crockett. It showed the number of permanent boarders during the year was 186 and the number of transients 214. Receipts from the home were \$2,927.11 and expenditures \$2,024.70.

The general secretary's report showed that a large number of visits and calls had been made, many requests for meetings had been responded to and much literature had been distributed. Nineteen requests were made during the year to meet girls arriving on steamers as against forty-eight the previous year. The educational classes had been satisfactory in all respects.

The following ladies reported good work on the part of the committees named: Miss DeVoe, spiritual; Mrs. J. S. Flaglor, entertainment; Mrs. B. C. Laughlin, hospital; Mrs. Austin, mother's meetings; Miss Pratt, travelers' aid. Reports were also received from the following circles, showing a great amount of work done by each circle: Ministry, Doorkeepers, Comfort, Opportunity, St. David's, Lead-a-Hand, Forget-Me-Not.

Hints for the Cook

New Dessert. Cream together half a pound of butter and half a pound of sugar. Add to this four well beaten eggs and gradually stir in half a pound of flour. Spread on a fat tin to the thickness of a quarter of an inch and bake in a slow oven. Then let it cool and serve with finely grated pineapple or some very tart jam.

White Cake. One cup of sugar, one tablespoon lard, creamed well. Add one egg to this, one cup sweet milk, two cups of flour, in which two teaspoons of baking powder and pinch of salt has been sifted; one teaspoon of vanilla. Bake in moderate oven twenty-five minutes. When cold, use icing made like this: Icing For White Cake—Take the juice of two oranges, yolk of one egg and powdered sugar enough to make it stiff. Spread on cake.

THE DUGAL CHARGES.

A painful sensation was felt throughout the province this morning when news was received that charges of the gravest character had been made against the premier of the province, in connection with the leasing of crown lands on Queen lands.

Put in the briefest form the charges are that the premier, who is also minister of lands and mines, was a party to the extension of about \$100,000 from leases of crown timber lands.

It is charged that through the agency of William H. Berry, chief superintendent of sealing of the crown lands department, and under the direction of Premier Fleming, the leases of timber lands were compelled to pay \$15 per square mile over and above the bonus, the whole amounting to about \$100,000.

It is further charged that no portion of this sum was accounted for or paid into the revenues of the province, and Mr. Dugal, who formulates the charges, asks that a committee of the house be named to investigate the whole matter.

It seems incredible that Mr. Dugal would make so serious a charge without strong supporting evidence. There will be no disposition, however, to condemn the premier in advance; but he will be expected to facilitate in every possible way a prompt and complete inquiry into the whole matter.

No more serious charge has ever been made against a member of a government in this province.

There have been rumors that when the story of the leasing of crown lands under the new act was told it would reveal the Fleming government in a very bad light, but now a definite charge has been made, associating with it the name of the premier himself, and there is but one course to pursue.

The whole matter must be investigated, and until that has been done no government measures involving the province in large expenditures under government control should be considered by the house.

Mr. Fleming and his administration are under a cloud until the report of the house committee for which Mr. Dugal asks has been heard. If there is any foundation whatever for the charges made, the Fleming government is no longer to be trusted by the people.

The thing to do, and the only thing to do is to probe these charges. If the government should show any disposition to evade the inquiry, it would become the duty of the lieutenant-governor to intervene, and he may be relied on to do so.

One fact is perfectly clear. It is that this government must not be permitted to put through any legislation granting increased aid to the St. John and Quebec Railway Company until its skirts have been cleared in relation to the charges of blackmail in connection with the timber leases.

Not only the honor of the premier, but of the government, the legislature and the province is involved in this matter of the charges preferred by Mr. Dugal. Only a prompt and full inquiry will satisfy the people. If the charges can be sustained, the fate of the government is sealed. Partnership in the house could hardly dare to go the length of choking off the inquiry, but if it should every member would be a marked man, and there would still be the lieutenant-governor to be reckoned with.

In view of the charges made one reads again with interest the statement made by Premier Fleming about the middle of March on the working out of the Crown Timber Land Act. Referring to the fact that there had been no complete survey of crown lands, and that the government had no detailed particulars as to the various areas of the crown lands and their real value, he said that, "to obtain a full and complete survey would be a very costly proceeding, and to name the cost would probably stagger the house."

The premier said that the new policy was working out very satisfactorily, and that the new order of things, greatly increasing the financial returns to the province, "had all been brought about with practically no protest from the lumbermen."

There is a remarkable difference between this statement and the charges formulated by Mr. Dugal. If there is any ground for these charges, what shall be said about the "previous utterances of Premier Fleming?"

RUNS TRUE TO FORM.

An Ottawa correspondent says that the Borden government "has run true to form." In other words it stands by its friends the manufacturers, and gives them a little more protection. The hope that there might be a tariff revision downward is destroyed by the budget speech. There is to be no free food and no free agricultural implements, although there is a slight reduction in the duties on binders and mowers.

The manufacturers fare better, as there is increased protection for iron and steel beams, and an increase in the drawback on imported pig iron, a drawback on bituminous coal for smelting and foundry purposes, an increase in the tariff on iron and steel tubing, and various other articles, while iron rods are placed on the dutiable list. So far as the duty on food stuffs is concerned, the present unfavorable conditions between Canada and the United States are to be continued.

The Canadian farmers are to have the advantage of a free market in the United States, but there is to be no compensating change in favor of the Canadian consumers. The cost of living is to be made a little higher by increased duties in some directions, and that is precisely the aim and substance of Hon. Mr. White's tariff message. The Borden government "runs true to form." It stands for the protected interests and ignores the needs of the consumers. It increases the expenditure, increases the debt, and lays the blame upon financial stringency.

The people can only get relief from the burden by placing in power a government which will revise the tariff downward, conduct the country's affairs with a reasonable regard for prudence and economy, and bring back again the prosperous times which prevailed under the Laurier regime.

The readers of the St. John Standard had to buy the Telegraph this morning to get the real news from Fredericton.

Why did the St. John Standard this morning fail to tell its readers about the charges made against Premier Fleming in the legislature last night?

When Premier Fleming announced that he expected the legislature to prorogue last week he evidently did not anticipate what has since transpired.

The legislature of this province has now a matter to deal with that is of even more momentous interest than the Valley Railway bond guarantee.

Mr. J. Norton Griffiths, M. P., cables that two dredges are on the way to St. John and that a third will be sent immediately. The coming summer should be a very busy one at Courtenay Bay.

Mr. Dugal of Madawaska, whom supporters of the Fleming government have professed to regard as a joke, will now perhaps be taken more seriously.

The use of bridge timber owned by the province to build barns for friends of the government may be good politics, but is not good business.

The reform candidates in the city of Montreal were badly beaten in yesterday's civic elections. Let us hope that the civic elections in St. John will result in giving the city the best city council available out of all the candidates in the field.

The Fredericton Gleaner announces that Premier Fleming is to take a long rest. This announcement was made by Mr. Dugal asked for a committee to inquire into the charges made against the premier. If there is any ground whatever for those charges he will undoubtedly take a long rest.

The Fredericton Gleaner says the federal government has agreed to pay the entire cost of the bridges over the St. John and Kennebec rivers. Before any further legislation is enacted, however, in connection with the Valley Railway the Dugal charges must be investigated.

Who promoted the foreshores bill, which was suddenly withdrawn by the government after its second reading because of a protest from various parts of the province? It was a government bill. The government assumed responsibility for it, and attempted to crowd it through without giving those whose interests would be sacrificed an opportunity to be heard. Were some friends of the government to profit by the measure? By whom was the bill drawn? Did it emanate from the city of St. John? An answer to these questions would be much appreciated. Perhaps the members for the city and county can give the information. Surely the government would consult some of them in relation to the bill. Their constituents would be very glad to hear from them.

John H. Lancaster of Somerset, Me., has lately secured a valuable antique in a pewter platter which was brought over in the Mayflower by Martha Parker, who had been given it by her grandmother. The dish is circular, measures fifteen inches across, and is badly scarred.

FORESHORES BILL IS WITHDRAWN

The Government is Forced To Back Down

MYSTERIOUS MEASURE

Questions Now Asked Regarding Its Real Meaning—Sweeping Provisions Would Have Caused Trouble

In the face of determined opposition to the government bill authorizing the provincial government to give away the foreshore rights on any ungranted tidal waters, river or lake, Premier Fleming decided to withdraw the bill last evening. Hon. John E. Wilson telephoned the leaders of the movement in protest to that effect and later in the evening Mayor Frink received a telegram from the premier saying the bill had been withdrawn.

The county secretary and recorder were in conference with the city council yesterday afternoon regarding the bill and as a result a strong telegram protesting against the passage of the bill on the third reading was at once despatched. A delegation would have gone to Fredericton this morning to demand a hearing against the bill and only the messages from Messrs. Fleming and Wilson prevented this step being taken. Opposition to the bill had developed in other parts of the province as well, and the premier decided to bow to the storm which arose so quickly after the bill was given its second reading on Friday evening.

The origin of the bill appears to be shrouded in mystery although it is suspected the measure was put forward for favor interests friendly to the government.

What Was Behind It? "The bill is killed," said J. A. Likely who led the opposition last evening, "but I think the public should know who was responsible for it, who drew it and for whose benefit it was conceived. It was

TOOK BRIDGE TIMBERS TO BUILD THEIR BARN

Old Perry Point Bridge Now Part of Farm Buildings in Vicinity—Negligence of the Government Arouses Dissatisfaction

The people of that portion of Kings county who have been observing the valuable timbers of the old Perry Point bridge have disappeared from time to time, were much interested in the statement made by Hon. Mr. Morrisey that the valuable hard pine stringers were removed and piled near the site of the bridge, and when asked who furnished him with that information, he replied the "members for Kings county" do not seem to know very much about it if the letter of a prominent resident of Kingston parish, in reference to the matter, is to be credited, he says, "In regard to the timber of the old bridge, there is not one stick left of the good hard pine on this side of the river. They have made a clean sweep of everything this spring that would hold good. I can sit right here in my own room and see some of them left on my neighbors' farm, piled up to be used for rebuilding his barn as soon as the frost is out of the ground, while another neighbor has completed an ice-house from the same source."

It seems as if the administration of public affairs in the lower part of Kings county has fallen into neglectful hands. Hurdley V. Dickson, M. P., who is only supposed to have the patronage, has apparently favored one section of his party against the other, and there is much hard feeling in consequence. The road supervisors of both Kingston No. 1 and No. 2 has been ignored and important pieces of work given to some favorites. The result has been wasteful expenditure of public money and further dissatisfaction on the part of the people.

FAIR-HAIRED FLIRTS.

"Ninety out of every 100 respondents in divorce cases are blondes," said a celebrated American lawyer, Herman L. Roth, recently. "Blondes are vain. Blondes are fickle. SINGLE TAX MEN AND C. N. R. AID

The Letter and Petition Asking Dominion Government to Take Over the Road

The Single Tax Association of Ontario has issued the following letter and petition relating to the present application of the Canadian Northern Railway for further aid— Toronto, April 8, 1914.

The transportation of a country should always be under the sole control of the government, and ought never to be subject to the dominance and exactions of private corporations. Public opinion is unanimously in favor of the canal and highway being owned, controlled by the government in the interests of the whole people. The public would never dream of entrusting these functions to private individuals.

Whatever reasons can be urged for government control of canals and highways apply with equal force to the railways of the country.

At the present time most of the railways are owned by private corporations, and the difficulty of the public acquiring possession of these is very great; but when an opportunity arises, such as is the case with the Canadian Northern Railway at the present time, we are strongly of the opinion that advantage should be taken of this opportunity by the government.

The Canadian Northern Railway Company has applied to the dominion government for further aid, though nearly the whole cost of the road, amounting to many millions of dollars, has been supplied by the people of Canada by means of bonuses, grants and guarantees from municipalities, provincial governments and the Dominion of Canada. All these grants were made conditional upon the building and operating of the various railroads, which, together, make up the Canadian Northern Railway system, and since the company have confessed their inability to carry out their contract, that is to say, to complete their roads without further public assistance, and it is contrary to the public interest that the dominion government should give additional public money or its equivalent to what is really a national undertaking as long as it remains in the private hands, we therefore advocate

Tory Government Helps Its Friends
INCREASED DUTIES
Iron Industry Gets More Protection—Free Wheat and Agriculture Implements Refused—The Budget Speech
000,000 than the revenue of the preceding year, and still falling, there was coupled a total increase in expenditure of nearly \$40,000,000, and an increase in the net debt of some \$19,000,000. The total expenditure of the year was \$188,000,000, while the total revenue was estimated at \$169,000,000. The increase in consolidated fund expenditure, or for the ordinary cost of administration has been \$14,500,000.
During the first two complete fiscal years of the present government the total increase in the ordinary cost of administration has been nearly \$28,000,000. For the coming year Mr. White thinks that there will be a gradual improvement and that the worst of the financial stringency is over. He declared, however, that there must be still prudence and caution, and predicted more borrowing and a further increase in the national debt.
The principal change in the interests of the iron and steel industry was the imposition of a duty on wire rods, which are now on the free list. This duty will be \$2.25, British preference; and \$3.50 per ton general and intermediate. Mr. White explained that this might hit the nail manufacturers, especially, who were the chief opponents of the imposition of the duty. However, if it was found that the iron and steel men at Sydney and Hamilton took advantage of the duty to raise prices to the nail manufacturers the government would take steps to remove the duty.
There was also an increase in the duty on rolled iron and steel beams and other merchantable mill products, and some changes of relatively less importance with regard to drawbacks to Canadian manufacturers on imported pig iron and bituminous coal imported by coke oven proprietors for foundry or metal smelting purposes.
One of the most interesting of the tariff changes is the adoption of the British and United States legislation prohibiting after January 1 next, the importation of algerettes, osprey plumes, and feathers, quills, wings or parts either raw or manufactured of wild birds. This prohibition, however, does not apply to ostrich, pheasant or peacock plumes, or the plumage of birds used as diet.
Some of the other changes are as follows:
On desiccated coconut, the British preference is increased from 3 to 8 cents. Amyl alcohol used for metal varnishes, is put on the free list.
Trade journals are allowed to bring in loose inserts of fashion plates, etc., free.
The duty on caustic soda and hypochlorite of lime is increased by 7 1/2 per cent in the case of caustic soda, and by 10 per cent under the general tariff. There is a considerable list of judiciously.

Sensational Charge Against Premier Fleming Involving \$100,000 Is Made on The Floors of The Local Legislature

Investigation by Special Committee Into Alleged Blackmail of Lumbermen Demanded

Extortion of Money at Rate of \$15 a Square Mile Collected Through Agency of W. H. Berry For Premier is The Serious Charge Openly Made by Mr. Dugal—Meanwhile Trip Abroad For Fleming Is Announced

Fredericton, April 6—Hon. James Kidd Fleming, Premier and Minister of Lands and Mines for the Province, was formally charged by Louis Auguste Dugal from his seat in the House this evening with having been a party to the extortion of about \$100,000 from those holding timber limits.

Mr. Dugal's resolution, of which he gave notice for Thursday next, recited the facts in a general way, connecting the chief superintendent of sealers, W. H. Berry, with the collection of this huge sum of money, and asked for an investigation by a committee of the House.

Mr. Dugal's formal notice of motion was as follows:

I beg leave to give notice that on Thursday next I will move, seconded by Mr. Pelletier, the following motion, namely:

Whereas, Louis Auguste Dugal, a member of the Legislative Assembly of this province for the county of Madawaska, has from his place in the House this day formulated certain charges against the Honorable James Kidd Fleming, Premier, and Minister of Lands and Mines, which he is credibly informed and believes he can establish by satisfactory evidence, and which charges are:

That the said Honorable James Kidd Fleming, through the agency of William H. Berry, Chief Superintendent of Sealers of the Crown Land Department of this Province, and under the direct control of the said Honorable James Kidd Fleming, in the Year A. D. 1913, did unlawfully extort from diverse large lessees of Crown Timber Limits within this province, a sum of fifteen dollars per square mile of their said timber limits, over and above the amount of bonus paid by them respectively as set forth in the fifty third annual report of the Crown Land Department of the Province of New Brunswick for the year ending the 31st day of October A. D. 1913, in pages 23 to 27, there of, both inclusive, which said amounts so unlawfully extorted from said lessees amounted in the whole to the sum of about one hundred thousand dollars, no portion of which sum was accounted for or paid into the revenues of this province, and said moneys were extorted from said lessees, and paid to the said William H. Berry, with the knowledge and consent, and under direction of the Honorable James Kidd Fleming, while occupying the said offices of Premier and Minister of Lands and Mines, and all of said moneys were so paid before the said lands were classified under the provisions of chapter eleven of the Statutes of New Brunswick for the year A. D. 1913.

Therefore resolved: That a committee of the House, consisting of seven members, be nominated by Mr. Speaker to examine into the said charges, and to report whether they find the said Honorable James Kidd Fleming guilty of so directing the extortion of said moneys by the said William H. Berry; then what disposition did he make thereof, to whom the said moneys were paid, as well as the ultimate destination of all of said moneys, and that the said committee have power to call for papers and documents and to summon and examine witnesses under oath, under the provisions of Chapter 5 of the Consolidated Statutes of New Brunswick A. D. 1903; and

Further resolved: That said committee do proceed with such investigation until they have fully investigated such charges and reported upon the same to this House.

RECEIVED IN SILENCE

The charges were read by Mr. Dugal amid intense silence. They were not news to some of the members, but the most of those present were visibly surprised and astounded. No charges of so grave a character reflecting upon a leader of a provincial government have ever been preferred in all Canada. The charges are said to be the result of an investigation extending over a long period. The facts are alleged to have been known to many lumbermen for some months, and the only wonder is that they have kept quiet so long.

At last, however, the silence seems to have been broken in different parts of the province, and it is now said that the men who have hesitated to tell the story are ready to speak.

If Mr. Dugal's charges are proven this lumber bonus blackmail of the Fleming government will remain long in the minds of men. Never in the history of a province has its chief industry been subjected to such treatment; but there has been so much talk of irregularities in connection with the present administration that even these serious charges formally preferred will not shock the public as they would otherwise. Many of the government's supporters have felt that all was not right and have predicted Premier Fleming's early resignation and retirement.

Before Mr. Dugal's resolution became known the Premier's vacation was forsworn in an announcement in the Gleaner tonight, which indicated a long holiday, an ocean trip, ill health, and the duties of premier being carried on by Attorney General Clarke in his absence.

Under the heading "Premier Fleming to Take Long Rest," the Gleaner, the official organ of the government, says:

"It is understood that Premier Fleming, who suffered a severe attack of stomach trouble about three years ago, from which he has never fully recovered, will probably ask for two months leave of absence soon after the prorogation of the legislature. The premier's health has not been good for the past four or five months, and his physicians have advised a rest and an ocean trip. He will probably go abroad for two months and while away will doubtless consult specialists as to his stomach trouble.

"It is altogether likely that Hon. George J. Clark, attorney general, will be acting premier during the absence of Hon. Mr. Fleming."

THE NEXT STEP

There must be a searching investigation of such a serious charge, and the evidence of some of the most prominent men in the province, who will be asked to tell the story of how the money was demanded and to whom it was paid, will clear the air so far as these most serious allegations are concerned.

There have been two previous occasions in recent years when opposition men made charges from their places in the House. In 1892, A. A. Stockton, also as leader of the opposition, addressed a memorial to the governor of that day, Sir Leonard Tilley, asking for

a royal commission. The reply of Sir Leonard, which is found in the journals of 1892, speaks of the course that should be pursued. That course was followed by Mr. Hasen in 1900, when in opposition, when he made charges and had an investigation in the matter of the steel bridges, and the same procedure was followed by Mr. Dugal this evening in making his charges.

The Timber Bonuses.

It should be understood that while the Province collected from the crown land operators in bonus last year the sum of \$255,335.76 this represents only about one-third of the money that will be derived from the bonuses, for some of the larger operators paid one-half in cash and some of the others paid only one-quarter in cash and gave twelve months notes at five per cent for the remainder of their half payment.

The report of the Crown Land Department for the year ended October 31, 1913 fully explains the manner in which the leases were extended. In that report Mr. Fleming, Minister of Land and Mines explained the matter as follows:

A constant demand had been made by lessees during the last few years that the Department should disclose some policy with regard to the future disposal of the Crown leases and while many projects were put forward by the lumbermen, none of those had the approval of the Government, whereby the public would receive a fair return for the granting of these valuable privileges.

I was fairly convinced the lessees were making a reasonable request even five years before the expiry of the old license (1st August 1910) when they asked to have a future course fixed, in order to afford a guarantee for the large amount of capital invested in the lumber industry and particularly to afford security to the Banks and Trust Companies who are called upon to make large advances in the carrying on of the lumber business.

New Mill License.

We therefore brought into existence the New Mill License which provided that every lessee would have the right to renew his license for a period of 20 years provided he agreed to pay a reasonable bonus according to the value of the land and also agreed to pay a revised rate of stumpage and millage as might be fixed from time to time by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council. To arrive at this valuation I took the best means at my disposal to have the lands placed in four classifications, viz. A, B, C, D, the respective bonus rates being \$100 for Class A, \$75 for Class B, \$50 for Class C and \$20 the present open price for Class D. While I do not claim the classifications made were perfect, I do maintain, that, as a whole, an equitable arrangement was made and satisfactory on the whole to the lumbering community of the Province.

Under the provisions of the Bill I have taken steps to procure a more detailed classification of the public lands to be completed by the 1st August 1917, setting aside the tracts suitable for agriculture and segregating the lands only fit for the growth of lumber.

The provisions of the Bill respecting Pulp and Paper Licenses will appeal to every fair-minded person as legislation in the interests of the Province whereby fifty per cent of the bonus set under this class of license must be manufactured into Pulp and Paper in New Brunswick.

Results of the Bill.

Out of a total quantity of 16,477 1/2 square miles under Bonus last year, 9,454 1/2 square miles have been renewed under the New Mill License; 316 square miles have been renewed under the Pulp and Paper License and 377 square miles were renewed under the Old Act which expires 1st August 1918, when the latter license will be put up for sale or otherwise dealt with as the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council may decide.

The outcome has certainly been very gratifying to the Government and settles one of the hard problems of the past.

Owing to the stringency in the money market and in order to make the provisions of the Bill less onerous to the lessees I saw fit to divide the one-half payment due on August 1st 1913 accepting one-half of the bonus in cash and the other half by note at five per cent, payable 1st August 1914. This arrangement was largely accepted and appreciated by the lessees. Considerably more than half has been paid in cash.

The Crown Land Bidding Fund.

As forehanded in my last report I have decided to place in a sinking fund all moneys received from the sale of soil right land, together with the bonus received on Timber Licenses. Accordingly the sum of \$371,726.69 has been set apart, not including the instalments received from applicants in the Blue Bell Tract and other lands conveyed from the New Brunswick Railway Company which are also placed in a separate sinking fund.

On page 23 of the crown land report for 1913 a complete list of those who paid the bonuses, together with the amounts they paid, is given, as follows:

A LIVELY TILT IN LEGISLATURE

Over Discussion of Compensation Act

Fredericton, April 6—The house met at 8:55 o'clock. Mr. Dugal gave notice of inquiry as to the participation of government officials in elections. Mr. Dugal gave notice of motion for the appointment of a committee to inquire into crown land collections and to investigate charges in connection therewith against Hon. J. K. Fleming.

Mr. Carter gave notice of enquiry as to sales of materials and supplies by L. A. Dugal, leader of the opposition, to the town of Edmundston when mayor of that town. Hon. Mr. Fleming introduced a bill in addition to the act respecting the protection of woods from fire.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey introduced a bill to amend the act respecting expropriation in aid of public works. Hon. Mr. Carter introduced bills to amend the act respecting the solemnization of marriages, to amend the New Brunswick Railway act and entitled the Land Titles act.

Mr. Guthrie moved for the appointment of a committee to inquire into the advisability and cost of re-opening the Government House in Fredericton, and to report at the next session. The house went into committee with Mr. McManion in the chair and agreed to the bills to amend the Registry act, to amend the act establishing the board of public utility commissioners, and the bill relating to the North Shore Railway Co., each with amendments. The bills to provide a further sum of \$25,000 to complete the Normal school annex, and to make further provision for permanent bridge works of a permanent character were agreed to without amendments.

Hon. Mr. Clarke in regard to the bill to consolidate the Workmen's Compensation Act said that it contained no material changes. An amendment to the bill to have compensation given in all cases where the widow and children of the workmen killed reside in Canada, was lost. Mr. Guthrie thought the men coming to this country from their parents' dependents at home for whom they were providing should be included in the compensation, but this view was not shared by others, including Mr. Lockhart, Mr. Baxter, and others. Mr. Baxter referred to the matter of costs and caused a further discussion which he did not have heard of cases where the compensation was almost entirely eaten up by legal fees. Mr. Tilley took exception to the statement and said if such matters were to be discussed the Baristers' Society meetings were the proper place.

DID TORY MEMBER REALLY SAY THIS?

R. B. Bennett, a member of the Canadian parliament from Calgary, told the Harvard Canadian Club on Friday night that there was grave danger of dissolution of the British Empire unless a plan were evolved whereby all its subjects would have a vote in the government. "As Canadians," he said, "we are part of the empire. Its navy defends our commerce, its army is at our disposal. Yet we have no word to say in the government of which we are a part."

GETS WELL PAID FOR HIS VIGIL, THOUGH LONG ONE Russian Immigrant Comes Into Possession of Land Valued At \$8,300

Edmonton, Alta., April 7—Nicholas Nichaloff, a former subject of Russia, who passed five days and as many nights at the entrance of the dominion land office in Edmonton, earned property valued at \$8,300 by his lonely vigil. He was the successful applicant for a homestead near Athabasca, ninety-six miles north of here.

The Athabasca river passes through the holding, leaving 27.7 acres for actual use. This is valued at \$900 an acre. There were two other applicants for the land but they withdrew when they learned that Nichaloff was prepared to remain a month. The homestead was cancelled some time ago in consequence of the original filer not complying with the regulations. He was given thirty days in which to again open the land, but he took no heed of this and the land was again thrown open to settlement, with the result noted.

NEW CROSSING PLACE FOR VALLEY RAILWAY NOW IS SUGGESTED

S. L. Peters today submitted to Mayor Frink a plan showing a new route for bringing the Valley Railway across the St. John River. His route would be several miles above the crossing at present proposed at the Mistake and would span Hog Island.

The advantages, he says, are a saving of about five miles, and a saving in the cost of the bridges, as they would be shorter and would be built in shallower water. Mr. Peters has suggested that the city commissioners and the board of trade give the matter their consideration.

SHOOTS FELLOW POLICEMAN Paris Inspector Killed Friend Who Was Proving Untrue

Paris, April 7—A fatal tragedy in which Maurice De Lacroix, an inspector of police, shot and killed his comrade Inspector Dupin, Inspector Raymond Dupin, was enacted at police headquarters today. De Lacroix obtained evidence last night that Dupin was alienating the affections of Madame De Lacroix. The two met at headquarters this morning as usual, and after reporting to Chief Inspector Lebretton, left his office together.

As the two inspectors descended the stairs De Lacroix drew his revolver and shot Dupin five times, killing him instantly. De Lacroix then returned to the chief inspector's office and surrendered.

CONDENSED DESPATCHES

The German government has decided to construct a second outlet on the Baltic sea, for the Kaiser Wilhelm canal, connecting the North Sea with the Baltic.

May Richardson, militant suffragette, was released from Holloway jail, London, today to undergo an operation for appendicitis.

Vicount Kiyoura has informed the Emperor of Japan that it is impossible for him to form a new cabinet.

Suarez Carmichael of Montreal, is the third commissioner appointed on the British Columbia Indian Lands Commission. N. W. White, of Nova Scotia, will likely be the new chairman.

The Lion and Savage department store, and the Powers theatre in Decatur, Ill., were destroyed by fire today at a loss of \$760,000.

About 100,000 men are out of work in St. Petersburg, Russia. Thousands are penniless because of the shutting down of several large factories.

At the present time New Brunswick motorists planned their tours principally to the New England states and Nova Scotia and for this reason perhaps more than any other, the overtures of the Canadian federation had been turned down.

U. S. SUBMARINES RESTING IN CHAMBER OF THE GATUN LOCKS.




USING A PANAMA CANAL LOCK CHAMBER AS A DRY DOCK FOR SUBMARINES

They are seriously thinking of extending a call to Bruce Livingstone, a member of this year's graduating class from Pine Hill College, Halifax.

Mr. Livingstone, who is blind, has made for himself an enviable reputation as a diligent and painstaking student. He took his arts course with high honors at Dalhousie and is now completing his theological training at Pine Hill. He has preached at all three of the places with great acceptance, leaving a fine impression of unusually large congregations.

Mr. Livingstone's uncle, the late John Livingstone, was for many years a notable figure in the journalism of eastern Canada. Bruce Livingstone is the son of Bruce Livingstone, and was born in Harcourt, Kent county, about twenty-five or twenty-six years of age, he has a fine presence in the pulpit, and a great gift of natural oratory makes his sermons very impressive to his listeners. He is as acceptable socially as he is in the pulpit, and combines a rare degree of refinement with unflinching tact and cheerfulness.

Following the usual routine in such matters the call, after preparation, will be sent to the St. John Presbytery for approval, and it is felt that if no unforeseen obstacle arises Mr. Livingstone will accept. In that case these three congregations, who are in a period of uninterrupted prosperity under his guidance. An encouraging feature is that these three points, which have hitherto been under the care of the home mission board, will then rank as an augmented charge.

NEARLY 400 IS COUNT NOW IN WEST END EVANGELISTIC MEETINGS

The West End City Hall was well filled last night to hear Doctor Burrows as he delivered a very forceful sermon on "Seeking the Lost." Among those present were Rev. J. W. Dawson, Rev. H. Pierce, and the Rev. Mr. Schurman. Taking as his text Gen. III: 9, "And the Lord called and said, Where art thou?" he briefly related the incidents in the lives of Adam and Eve, and their fall, and then made the sermon of practical value to the needs of those who were listening. He pointed out the way in which people tried to hide from God. "Some try to hide behind formality, but formality will not hide you from the eye of God," said the evangelist. He then showed how Adam and Eve had an splendid start in life, but through the entrance of sin into their hearts that splendid start was blasted. "Every person has a good start in life," he declared, "but they blight it by allowing sin to creep in. No man is ready for the big things of life until he removes sin from his heart. There are people who are hiding behind excuses and excuses in the last analysis are but lies, but excuses are too thin to hide you from the Lord. No difference what you are trying to hide behind the eye of God will be able to penetrate it and at this time God knows just where you are."
