

"The New Brunswick Probitory Act was passed by the legislature during the sessoin of 1916, without any mandate from the people. It was passed as a war measure which was the justification for the passage of the act. The promise was made and it was dinstinctly understood when the bill was passed, that as soon as the war was over and the necessity of the act as a war measure was at an end, the question would be submitted to the people by way of a referendum, for decision, and indeed a clause in the act provides that after the act shall have been in force and operation for a sufficient length of time to enable its efficiency to be tested such a course was to be taken. With these facts before us, it is surprising that at a recent meeting in Moncton, according to press reports, the course of the government in submitting this question to the people should be questioned. As I see it, the first duty of the government in submitting this question to the people in this regard, and whatever the will of the people is on this important matter, as expressed at the polls will prevail.

Third, those who desire the opportunity of purchasing liquors of all kinds for personal and private use, but do not favor consumption in public, or the open bar. Fourth, those who are in favor of returning to conditions as they existed prior to the passing of the prophibitory law.

"Should the first question be answered in the affirmative, then the will of the first group of citizens I have mentioned must prevail and the New Brunswick Prohibitory Law will continue as at present. Should the second question, relative to the sale of light wines and beers be answered in the affirmative, then it will be the duty of the government to arrange for the distribution of these beverages under some system of government control and supervision.

"Should the first question be answered in the negative and a vote recorded for the repeal of the act, it will devolve upon the government to substitute some system to give expression to the will of the people in this regard, by making all necessary and proper regulations for the sale through government agencies, of liquors of all kinds for consumption in the homes of the people who desire its use in this way.

FRENCH AIRPLANE GOLIATH
MAKES NON-STOP RECORD Remains in Air 24 Hours 19 Minute and Covers 1,915 Kilometres.

Paris, June 10—The airplane Goliath, piloted by Lieuts. Bossoutrot and Bernard, has broken the world's record for continuous flight. It remained in the air twenty-four hours, nineteen minutes, seven seconds, covering a distance of 1,915 1-5 kilometres.

The Goliath also established what are said to be records for 1,000 and 1,500 kilometres, making the former in eleven hours twenty-nine minutes and fifty-six seconds and the latter in sixteen hours forty-two minutes eight seconds.

The flight was made at Etampes, near Paris. The former record for continuous flight was held by a German, W. Landmann, who remained in the air twenty-one hours, forty-eight minutes, forty seconds in June, 1914.

HELD UP BY BANDITS.

Pittsfield, Mass., June 10—Three masked automobile bandits at the point of revolvers held up and robbed Mr. and Mrs. Leon J. Hazelton in their home at "Jacob's Well" on the state highway in Becket. After ransacking the house and taking between \$75 and \$100, the bandits, according to the story told to State Detective Thomas G. Blight, of this city, bound and gagged Mr. and Mrs. Hazelton in chairs, back to back, and then left the premises, going towards Springfield, Mass. Mrs. Hazelton succeeded in unloosening the ropes and Mr. Hazelton telephoned word to the Westfield police, but no trace of the bandits could be found.

THEIR AUTOS IMPOUNDED. Winnipeg Being Fittingly Punished.

Winnipeg, June 10—The campaign against speeders in this city has resulted in four men being deprived of their automobiles for one week. After imposing fines varying from \$23 to \$53, Magistrate Sir Hugh John Macdonald ordered that their cars be impounded in accordance with an order issued May 31, that all speeders going more than twenty-five miles an hour after June 1 would have their cars impounded.

German Declines to Visit French Devastated Regions. Paris, June 10—Dr. Alexander Riddick, chief political writer of the Berlin Vossische Zeitung, and the first German newspaperman to come to Paris since the war, has been offered facilities for observing the situation in France. He came here on special permission of the French government, but has declined to accept an invitation of the government to visit the devastated regions.

KILLED BY BLOW OF BEAR. Prince Rupert, B. C., June 10—Clarence Thompson, a logger on Chicago Island, died recently from wounds inflicted by a large brown bear. Terribly lacerated, Thompson was found by a searching party, to whom he gave a connected account of his experience before he died.
