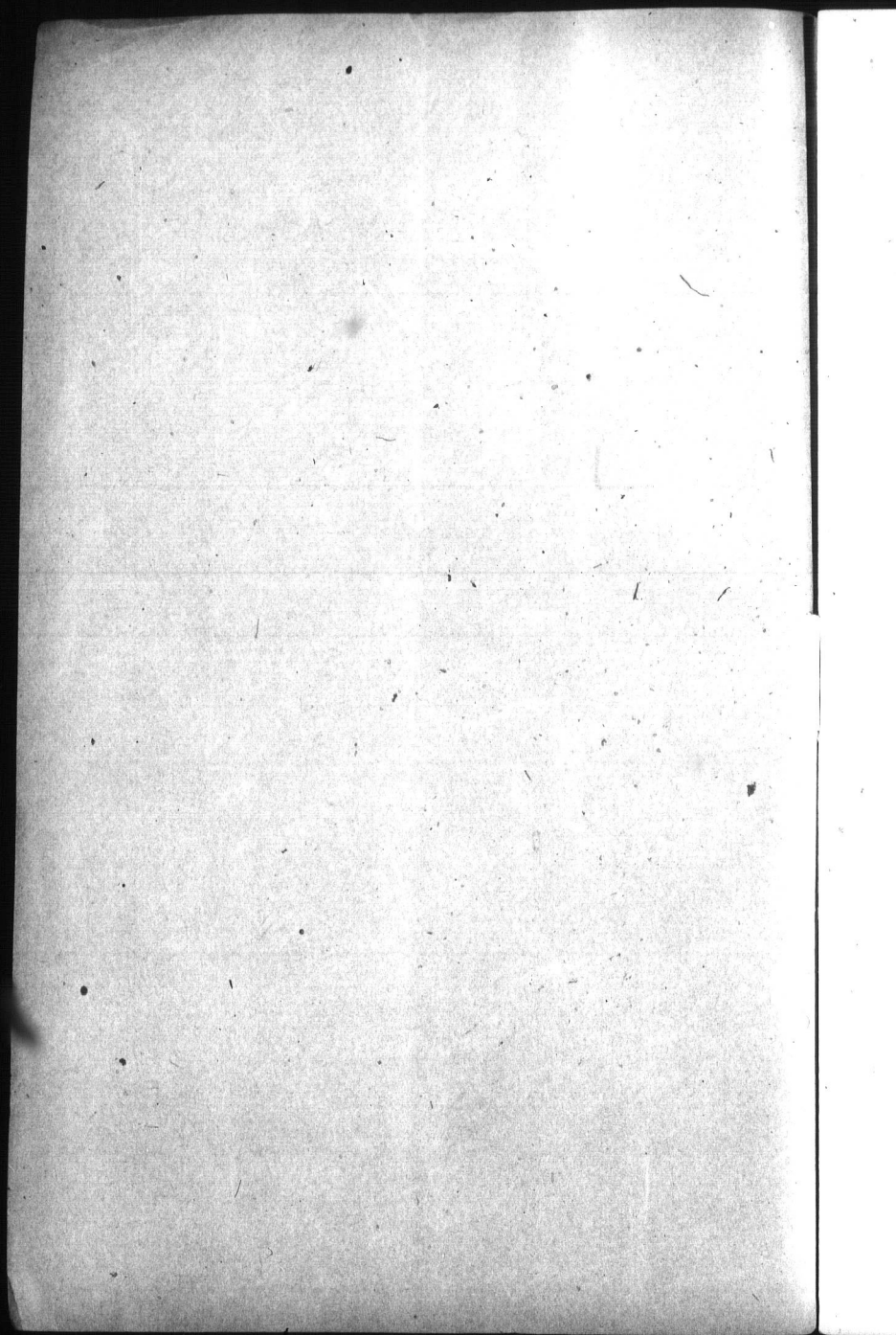

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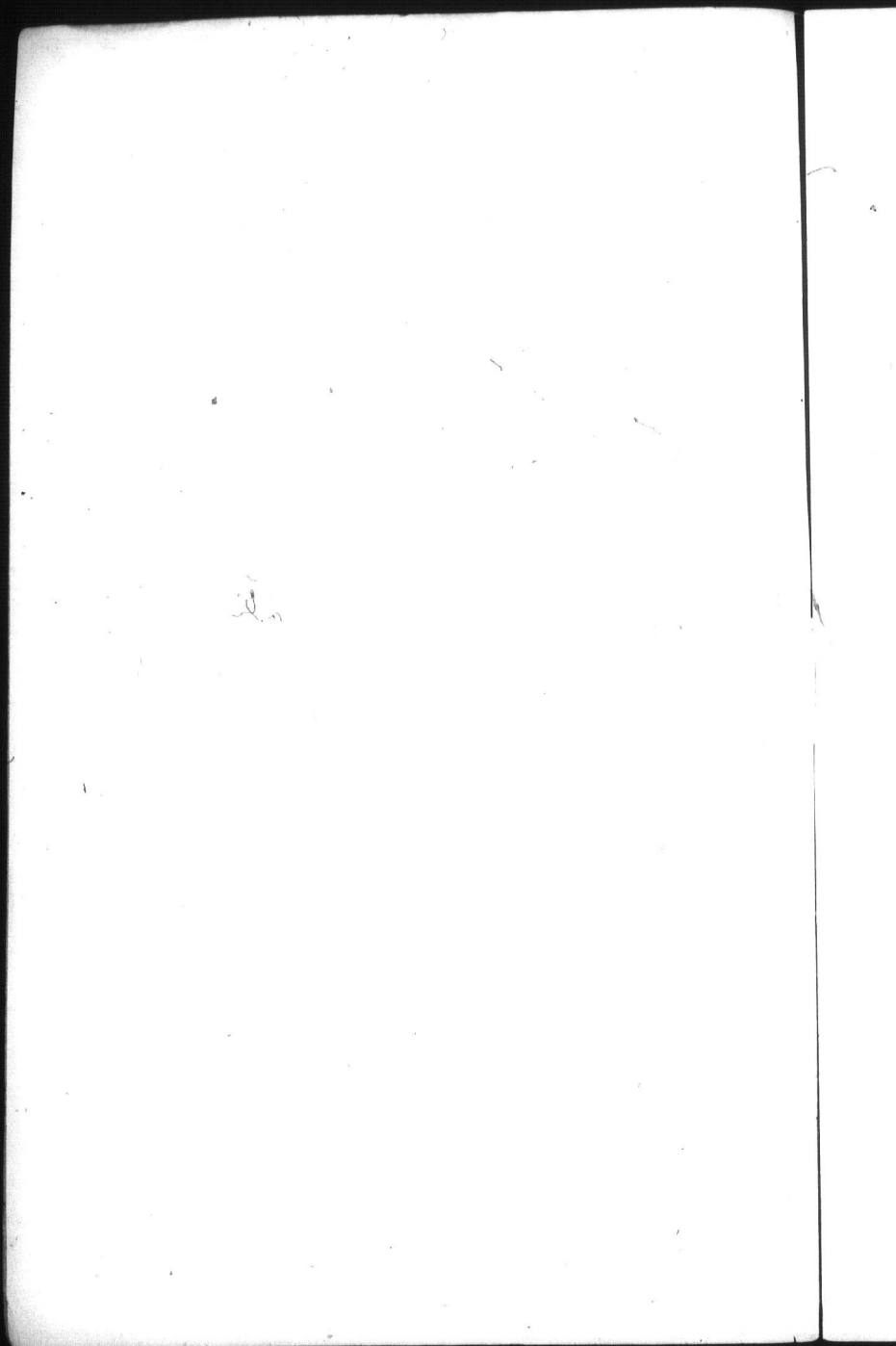
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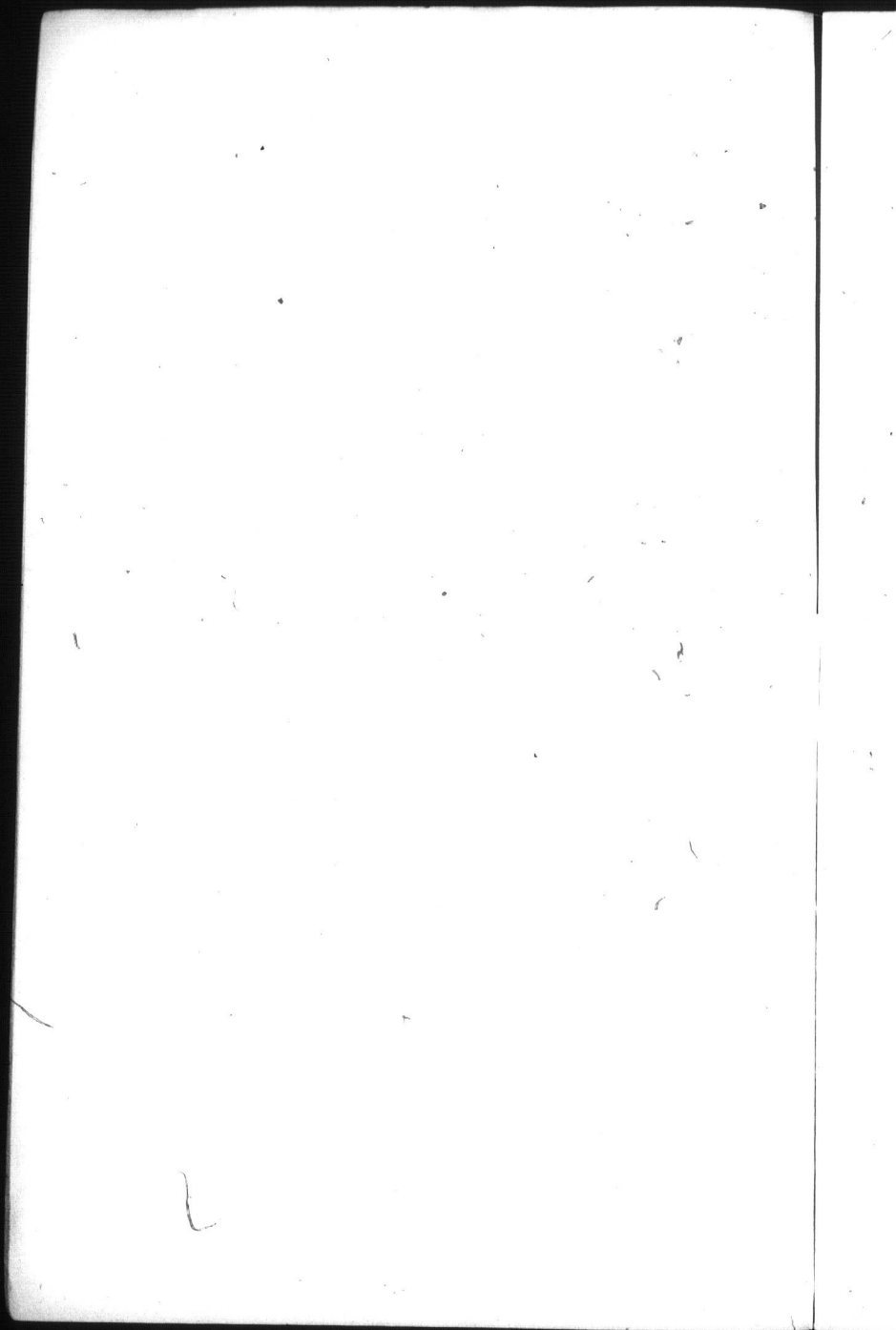
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# HOUSE OF INDUSTRY.

FIFTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT

1888-9.

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The Annual Meeting of the subscribers to this Institution was held in the Council Chamber, City Hall, on Tuesday, the 30th April, 1889. There was a fair attendance of subscribers. His Worship Mayor Clarke was elected chairman, and Rev. John Gillespie acted as secretary.

The following reports were then presented.

The Trustees and Managers of the House of Industry beg to submit their Fifty-second Annual Report of the affairs and management of the institution, together with Treasurer's statements, and statement of all property held by the trust.

The past year has been one of unusual activity.

Owing to a very general desire on the part of the citizens, that the means should be supplied by the city to enable the management to materially improve the accommodation for casuals, and in connection with the improved accommodation to inaugurate a system of labor, which, it was believed, would discourage and in effect exclude the professional tramp from its benefits.

The experience of the management in attempting to supply labor, being hitherto unsatisfactory, it was thought advisable to examine the system prevailing elsewhere. At the suggestion of the city authorities, the Rev. A. J. Broughall, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the House, accompanied by Mr. Taylor, the Relief Officer of the corporation, proceeded on this mission, and made an inspection of the plans in dealing with the poor in some of the centres of the United States. The result of these investigations was formulated in an exhaustive report presented

to the Board, by the Rev. Mr. Broughall on his return, which has already been printed and circulated.

The immediate effect was that the Corporation on the recommendation of his Worship the Mayor, cheerfully granted the necessary funds to carry out the objects recommended in the Report.

For the first object, viz.: The erection of additional buildings with baths and dormitories, the sum of \$10,000 was granted, full details of which are furnished in the accompanying report of the Standing Committee of the House, having the matter in charge. It will be observed that although the grant was only decided on in the month of October, the Committee were enabled, by strenuous efforts, to make such progress, by the beginning of the year that the benefits, to a large extent, were enjoyed during the most severe portion of the season. Sometime, however, before the end of the winter, the whole was in perfect working order, with the exception of the steam disinfecting system, which is to be used instead of the sulphur. We are happy to state that the grant will be sufficient to cover the whole expense of the building and its requirements.

For the second object, viz.: the labor test, the sum of \$2000 was granted.

By reference to the Treasurer's statement of this grant, it will be observed, that while a portion of the expense connected with this department has hitherto been charged against the revenue for inmates, it will require a similar yearly grant to maintain this new and important branch. By reference to the Committee's report on the subject, it will be seen that the number of casuals is less—by upwards of 4000—than last year. The remainder would have been very greatly lessened had the present system of dealing with the casual poor been ready at the beginning of the season. The number is also increased by the spring migratory tribe on its way west, by halting for a night to enjoy the cleansing process of the House.

Owing to the mild character of the early part of the season, the demand for outdoor relief was not so pressing as last year. It will be observed by the returns appended 1280 families of

outdoor poor were relieved, while for the corresponding period of last year, the number was 1296. Of this number, 670 families were relieved for the first time, a large number, however, have been relieved for from three to five years.

The number at present maintained in the Institution as permanent inmates is 84. The average number, owing to the limited accommodation, remains about the same as for several years past.

The ordinary revenue from all sources amounts to £16,154.01, including balance carried from last year. This shows a falling off, even allowing for last year's accounts representing a period of fifteen months. The falling off is chiefly in the voluntary subscriptions of the citizens. Had the management not been able to meet the expenses, for casuals, out of the special grant of £2000 for that purpose, the ordinary revenues would show a large deficit instead of a credit balance of \$555.70.

During the year the management sustained severe loss in the removal by death, of two of the Trustees who were Vice-Presidents of the Board, viz., the late Edward Hobson, and Neil C. Love. The former had been connected with the Board since 1854, and for a time its President. The latter was one of its most active members for the past fifteen years.

The Managers have much satisfaction in acknowledging an addition to the permanent investment of the Trust, by the liberal bequest of the late Mrs. Pollard of \$2000, through the executor, James Scott, Esq.

Thanks are due to Mr. William Davies and others, for substantial contributions to the food supply of the Institution during the year, also to the Gas Company for 1300 bushels of Coke.

The Managers acknowledge with gratitude the services of the various clergymen, by whom religious services for the inmates have been regularly maintained, and also the services of the ladies connected with the Flower Mission, and many gifts and other acts of kindness to the inmates.

The Board are pleased to acknowledge that the Superintendent and Mrs. North, have faithfully discharged the duties incumbent upon them to their entire satisfaction.



Other important matters coming under the supervision of various Standing Committees, are left for them to report.

Appended is the Treasurer's and Superintendent's statements.

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#### REPORT OF CASUAL POOR COMMITTEE.

*To the Board of Management House of Industry :*

A Special Committee, appointed by the Board of Management, waited upon the Executive Committee of the City Council last Autumn, for the purpose of making a statement respecting the inadequate provision then existing for the proper treatment of the casual poor, to be found in large numbers every winter in this city, and also to ask that the sum of ten thousand dollars should be placed at the disposal of the House of Industry, to enable it to deal effectively with that branch of its work.

As the result of this conference, and the information subsequently laid before them, the City Council, on the 29th October last, with praiseworthy liberality, placed at the disposal of the Board the above named sum, for the purpose of building and furnishing a "Wayfarers' Lodge" and thus making some provision for this class of the community.

Under the supervision of Mr. Mark Hall, architect, the lodge was erected without loss of time, and has now been in use about two months, contributing very materially to the cleanliness and comfort of the large number of casuals who have availed themselves of its warmth and shelter.

The labor test, which has been applied during the months of December, January, February, and March, is as follows : Each man receives a night's shelter and breakfast, in return for which he is required to cut and split one-quarter of a cord of wood. In case of refusing to do this service he cannot again claim a night's shelter.

Taken in connection with the thorough washing with which each casual is favored, the effect of the work has been very beneficial to the casuals personally. The number of applications has been lessened, and the result in the case of those who have complied with the conditions has been in some degree at least to restore the sense of the importance of honest labor, and to revive in their minds the connection between eating and working.

Many persons of the class named are debarred from the society of others on account of the filthy condition both of their clothing and persons.

The cleansing operations at the House restore to the casual the sense of personal freedom, as well as a certain amount of self-respect.

The total number of tramps for the three months, January to 31st March, 1889, was 663, of this number 127 were immigrants to this country within 18 months.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON VISITATION AND  
OUT-DOOR RELIEF.

The work of visiting in the several districts of the city has been more satisfactorily performed than in some previous years. Some of the larger districts were divided at the beginning of the season, and thus it has been possible for the visitors to pay repeated visits in many cases, and to discriminate more thoroughly between the deserving and the undeserving.

The whole number of families relieved from November, 1888, to April, 1889, has been 1280, as against 1296 families relieved in 1887-8. Taking into account the growth of the city, these figures indicate that destitution has not been so great as it was during the preceding year.

The Visitors for the House have held during the past season three meetings for conference, the first in December, the second in February, and the third in April. These meetings have afforded opportunity for comparing notes as to the details of the work of visitation, and have been found useful as well as pleasant. At the meeting held on 1st of April, the following resolutions were passed:

1. We recommend that the Board be asked to consider the advisability of providing work to some extent next winter for resident poor who apply for relief.

2. We recommend that a depot for the distribution of bread be established at some suitable point in the Western Division.

Your Committee ask the attention of the Board to these recommendations.

The members of your Committee have taken part in the meetings of the "Conference of Associated Charities." Comparison of notes with the representatives of other charitable organizations has been found valuable in a number of instances, and impostures has been to some extent checked.
