THE PRINCESS MAY IS NEARLY READY

SHIP HAS BEEN MADE A STately CRAFT Will Enter Northern Commission in Hoped Within the Next Fortnight.

(From Tuesday's Daily.) The announcement appearing in the Colonist on Tuesday that the new steel steamer for the quarantine station is nearing completion is an error. The vessel is no more than in frame as yet, and is therefore far from completion.

The only vessel in the yard of the B. C. Marine Railway at Esquimalt that is nearing this stage is the Princess May, the remodelled liner of the C. P. E. fleet.

When the Princess May leaves the yard there will be no more stately looking craft of her kind in these waters, or probably in the Pacific, in the coasting service.

The vessel will stand alone in a point of marine architecture. While capable of carrying a great deal of cargo, she has been converted into more of a commodious passenger steamer than she was before.

On the top deck the same arrangement of cabins which formed the observation room on the former steamer has been carried out.

When the steamer was first tied up it was stated that \$100,000 would be expended on her. To see the changes and improvements which have been effected is to realize that some such expenditure, if not a greater amount, has been made upon her.

The vessel, which will be placed on the Skagway run within the next fortnight, but if this is done it will mean that the finishing work must be completed with the utmost dispatch.
