Brough Work on the Road. A very serious charge was preferred in the middle of last month before Police Magistrate Blair of Chatham by Joseph Hache, a one-armed man who drives the mail between Chatham and Pokemouche, against Neil Campbell who, we believe, lives at Tracadie. A warrant was issued by Mr. Blair for the arrest of Campbell and under his direction the complainant took to John Young Esq. who endorsed it. Complainant then placed the warrant in the hands of a constable who failed to execute it although he showed the paper to the accused. After several days the warrant was placed in the hands of Constable Wade who arrested Campbell and was bringing him to Chatham when Ralph Fayle, Esq. J. P., who lives at Tabusiac, released the prisoner on bail until August last. and Pokemouche. I met Neil Campbell on Saturday 14th inst. in Chatham and he said he would give me a passage to Tracadie. I said I had only a single seat and would be a passenger already. He asked who that was and I said a young lady in the Ferry boat that evening as I crossed into my wagon without me telling him to do so.

"I called at Mrs. Stothart's for the lady who belonged to Pokemouche. Campbell said he wanted to take the horse and wagon and have a drive, but I could not let him do that and told him I would then took hold of the mail bags and threw them out of the wagon, repeating the act three times. I told him, the third time, to get out of the wagon as he should not go with me. We then started for Lower Newcastle."

"We had not gone far, however, before Campbell tried to grab the reins and wanted to drive my horse. Shortly after this we arrived at the Post-Office. Mr. Loggie's Lawyer, Newcastle, Campbell having become somewhat civil."

"On my dropping the reins to deliver the mail bag Campbell picked them up and was making as if to drive off with my other mail and the young lady and as he hesitated in his attempts to this I prevented from leaving my horse to take the mail to Loggie's. I called out and in a short time a man young Loggie, with my assistance and took the mail to the Post-Office. I then continued my journey. There I think six or seven men standing by Loggie's barn."

"I had proceeded only a few yards from the post office when Campbell leaped forward quickly and seized the reins out of my hand and with a powerful jerk brought the horse back into the breaching. This he repeated to one side and the other until he had secured the reins and was driving the horse back to the post office. On Monday morning the Captain appeared accompanied by the Vice-Consul. The sailors had in the meantime, secured the services of Mr. Tweedie, as shanty contractor, in a considerable time was spent on the part of the Vice-Consul in endeavoring to persuade the men to withdraw their complaints against the Captain and ship, and to go on board again, and the Captain, on his part, was withdrawing his charges of desertion. The men all persistently refused and Mr. Hutcheon, finding his efforts fruitless, at last sent for Mr. Carman to conduct the case for the Captain, and a gentleman was also sent for to act as interpreter. These gentlemen met and saw that the case was going to be both tedious and expensive. The ship, I understood, was ready for sea, and if a survey had to be ordered it would delay her some time."

The Captain admitted he had beaten one of the men; he also admitted that their complaint about their food was true and he promised to buy a new boat before proceeding to sea. The Vice-Consul, on an amicable settlement of the whole matter. I called up the men singly and I said to each man: "If the Captain withdraws his charge against you—pays all the costs except your own lawyer's fees—gives you your property back, and gives you a new boat, won't you drop your complaints and go on board again?" One by one they all agreed to do so and both the Captain and Mr. Hutcheon appeared very much pleased with the settlement.

The matter of the costs then came up. Mr. Hutcheon himself agreed with Mr. Carman and fixed his fee at \$5. Mr. Tweedie agreed with the men for \$1.50 each and was going to get an order from the men upon the Captain for the same. The Captain said it was not necessary to get an order—that he would pay it. Mr. Hutcheon then requested me to make the whole thing, including the lawyers' fees into one bill and said he would settle with me. The Captain then requested the Constable to get a coach and take the men to Black Brook, and also to go with the men himself, as he was to include the price of the coach in the bill which Mr. Hutcheon would arrange. I made out the bill as requested, receipted it and sent it to Mr. Hutcheon, in order that the Captain might get it before he sailed.

As to the matter of the particulars of the account, I have already shown that the \$5 to Mr. Carman was an agreement made by Mr. Hutcheon, himself, with Mr. Carman. The charge of rapacity will hardly lie here. I have shown that the \$12 to Mr. Tweedie was agreed upon by the men and hearing of both the Captain and Mr. Hutcheon and by both of them promised to be paid. The charge of rapacity will hardly lie here. Taking the men to Black Brook, was an agreement made by the presence of the Captain with Mr. Hutcheon and the charge of rapacity will, therefore, hardly lie here. The men had six meals each for which they were charged the usual price, 20cts. The charge of rapacity will hardly lie here.

Now, then, we come to the Constable's rapacity, which we owe to when warrants were placed in the hands of the Constable he found it necessary to take another Constable with him, as it was not likely that one man could arrest fifty deserters. They had to cross the ferry and go to Douglastown. A mile allows 30cts. for an arrest and 10cts. a mile as mileage. The distance to Douglastown is 10 miles computed. The subpoena upon the ship's officers to testify in the different suits had to be served upon them at Black Brook, a distance of 6 or 7 miles from Chatham, for which the law allows 20cts. for service and 10cts. per mile as mileage. The Constable's bill on all the papers were charged 30cts. each man—less, not more than the law allows. The charge of rapacity will not lie here. Now for my own costs. The law allows me 30cts. for each complaint upon each; 20cts. for each man; 10cts. for each conviction or certificate dismissal and 30cts. for each subpoena. There were subpoenas for the officers in the case of the assault and battery and for giving evidence in the case of desertion. I charged for my own subpoena; so that the charge of rapacity will not lie here.

Now, Sir, in the face of these facts, which are incontrovertible and upon which, on every point, I defy contradiction, I ask you what ought to be said of the man who publicly accuses me of rapacity? And Mr. Hutcheon has not only accused me, but others, for he distinctly told me repeatedly that he did not find fault with my charge in particular, but with the whole account—even upon the very items that he agreed upon. As for the whole account being made out in my name it was done at his request and for his accommodation. The talk about Norwegian and strangers and true Christian charity etc., is, doubtless, exceedingly clever. I admit it is quite equal to the many former ridiculous attempts of the same gentleman to be satisfied with my name also as an evidence of deep research into the Scriptures, which, I presume, have been his guide and rule throughout a long life, but this sympathy for the "poor Norwegians" on the part of a gentleman who has pocketed, yearly, for a number of years, hundreds of dollars from the same "poor Norwegians," is for which he has done next to nothing, is evidently the only "Christianity" of which he is appreciative at its proper value by Norwegians generally.

If there was any one who had a right to complain it was the seaman. One of them had been beaten, for which he obtained

redress; they all had been in prison for nearly 48 hours, on a false charge; they had been deprived of their food and they had been put to the expense of employing a lawyer. In the opinion of the Vice-Consul, doubtless, these seamen "with luted breath and whispered humbly" should have pleaded guilty to a false charge; they should have said nothing about their own wrongs; they should have been contented with their food and their quarters, and have satisfied the Vice-Consul for Sweden and Norway, and been in accordance with his ideas of justice. My ideas do not accord with the Vice-Consul's, and the only reason I have in the whole matter is, that took any trouble at all to have it peaceably settled. I should have allowed the law to take its course.

In conclusion, Mr. Editor, you will, I am sure, admit that in occupying so much of your space, but this thing has been forced upon me, and I wish Mr. Hutcheon to understand distinctly that I will not allow him to slander me, directly or indirectly, without holding him strictly to account. MR. EDITOR.—During the recent electoral struggle in this county it was a notorious fact that certain government employees made themselves conspicuous by their conduct.
