CANADIAN PORTS ROBBED. If there were any sincere belief among members of the government which is engineering the Grand Trunk Pacific deal, that the good faith of the promoters was a sufficient guarantee for the protection of Canadian ports, that belief must be entirely dispensed with.

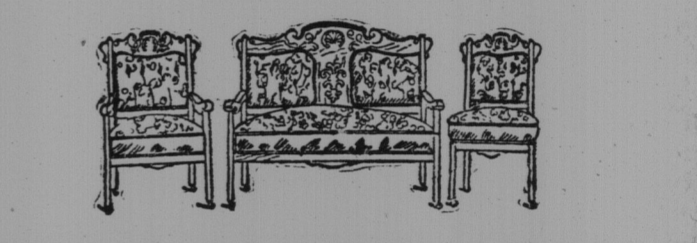
BLAIR'S MEMO.

SUNKEN TUG RAISED.
The Tug Leader Which Sank at South Wharf Yesterday Was Raised Uninjured.
