SERMON.

Discontent; Curse and Cure, By Rev. Dr. Reese F. Alsop, Rector of St. Ann's Church, Brooklyn, N. Y.

Dr. Reese F. Alsop, rector of St. Ann's church, New York, recently preached on "Discontent; Curse and Cure." The text was from Matthew xx: 11 and 12: "And when they had received it, they murmured against the good man of the house, saying, these last have wrought but equal labor, and thou hast made them equal unto us, which have borne the burden and heat of the day; and he answered and said unto them, ye know not what ye say; for who is the Lord of the harvest?"
