





The same year John Moison built the first steamboat on the St. Lawrence, which plied between Montreal and Quebec. The year which witnessed the beginning of steam navigation on Lake Erie also saw the passage of the Atlantic by the Rising Sun, a steamer built by Lord Cochrane, and in 1819 an American-built steamship, the Savannah, of 380 tons, salled from New York to Savannah, and thence to Liverpool and St. Petersburg.





Her aluminum blocks are unusually large and her deck fittings are much more yachtlike and permanent looking than those of cup defence candidates of years gone by. Her mahogany hull, with its clean, easy lines and long overhangs fore and aft, make her a much more attractive vessel, from an artistic standard, than is the Resolute.
