Coun. Harquail thought that the auditor's report with the statement should be in earlier, so that the Council could look it over before it is handed to the printer.

A communication from the Campbellton Women's Christian Temperance Union was read: Campbellton, March 9, 1917. The Mayor and Councillors of the Town of Campbellton, Gentlemen:

The members of the Women's Christian Temperance Union in this town have had under consideration for sometime the problem presented by the great number of children who are permitted to roam the streets without any adequate guardianship. We have finally decided to approach the council with the request that they will pass such an ordinance as exists in Chatham, a copy of which ordinance is enclosed.

We would suggest also that Campbellton is behind other towns in the province in not having availed itself of the law which makes compulsory education optional with any municipality. If a curfew law were passed and compulsory attendance at school in force the officer who enforces the curfew law might very well be required to act as truant officer.

## CAMPBELLTON HERO RETURNS HOME

Pte. James Fraser, Wounded at the Front, Arrived Home Sunday Morning

Pte. James Fraser a member of the bombing section of the 4th Battalion who was wounded in action in July last, arrived home Sunday morning and was warmly greeted by his many friends.

Pte. Fraser went from Campbellton with the first contingent as a member of the 12th Battalion and was in the trenches many months at one of the warmest sections before he was wounded.

He is wounded in the right elbow and will probably have a stiff arm. He is home on leave until April 6th when he goes to a Canadian Hospital for treatment.

Pte. Fraser came over from England on the Hospital ship "Letitia" and sailed through the submarine zone with all lights lighted and her Red Cross illuminated. The "Letitia" is one of the Donaldson line and was fitted up in first class shape as a hospital ship.

The matter of the extension of Hanover St. to Athol St. was taken up and after discussing the matter was referred back to the Public Properties and Street committee to get a definite proposition from parties interested and report at next meeting.

Coun. Patterson brought up the matter of cultivating vacant lots. He strongly favored this and thought the Council should encourage it in every way. Suggested that the town teams might be utilized to plow up such lots and help citizens generally who did not own teams or might find it difficult to have the work done.

Coun. Harquail also was in favor of encouraging the cultivation of vacant lots. He thought the Council should appoint a committee or a man to look after this matter.

Coun. Goss was also in favor of taking action in the matter, but if all the vacant lots were to be cultivated the town teams a few hours each day would not accomplish much. The matter should be gone into more fully. He favored appointing a man to give his time to this matter.

The matter was laid over until next meeting.

Coun Goss moved that the Fire Brigade Rules and Regulations as submitted, be approved—Carried.

Coun. Alexander moved that the list of Defaulters as they appear on April 25th 1917 be published, and the Town Treasurer be authorized to publish such list—Carried.

Coun. Alexander stated that a year or so ago the town had voted \$100.00 to the town band and moved that the Clerk be asked to inquire of the secretary of the band what disposal had been made of the money—Carried.

The meeting then adjourned.

## CRIMINAL CASES TRIED AT DALHOUSIE

Grand Jury Bring in True Bills in All Cases.—Sentence Later

The Restigouche County Court is in session at Dalhousie this week. His Honor Judge McLatchy presiding.

There were three criminal cases up before the Grand Jury and a True Bill returned in each.

These were:

The King vs. Fournier,  
The King vs. McDonald,  
The King vs. Diamond.

In the case of the King vs. Fournier, which was taken up Tuesday, the accused was found guilty of appropriating moneys of the Post Office department. Sentence will be delivered later.

In the King vs. McDonald the case was adjourned until the next court as a natural witness was ill.

In the King vs. Diamond accused was found not guilty on both counts.

## ANOTHER CAMPBELLTON BOY IS KILLED

Corp. J. W. Clark, Popular Young Man Makes Supreme Sacrifice

Again Campbellton is called upon to mourn the death of another of her brave sons serving at the front.

On Friday last Mr. E. E. Clark received a telegram from the Record Office, Ottawa, stating that his son, Corp. J. W. Clark had been killed in action.

Corp. Clark was one of our bright young men, quite unassuming and obliging he had numerous friends who mourn his death but rejoice that he was man enough to don the khaki in the service of his country. He was originally a member of a Nova Scotian Highland Battalion.

No particulars have been received of how he was killed.

When we return, the Mayor will be ready to give a detailed statement of all receipts and expenditures of these funds if necessary.

I have been suffering from bronchitis almost from the time I reached England. The Medical Board has ruled me unfit for foreign service. I am to come before the Board again and if no better shall come back home as soon as my clearance can be obtained and then are engaged in my attention at the moment.

Trusting that I am not imposing too much on your patriotism, asking you to do this for us, and with best wishes for our prosperity, health and happiness.

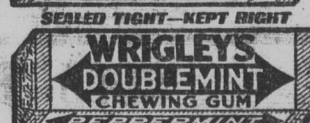

**PROSPECTS FOR  
THE 1917 POTATO CROP**

Present conditions indicate a potato shortage next year accompanied by fair prices. Arostook buyers are reported to be contracting for next season's crop at \$2.50 per barrel instead of \$1.00 which was the ruling contract price of last year. "Maine Farmer."

It is exceptionally difficult to form any definite opinion concerning the prospects for the New Brunswick potato crop of 1917, as the total yield depends to a large extent on numerous factors which we cannot, or have not, learned to control. There are, however, certain conditions existing which are likely to influence the acreage planted and the probable yield during the coming season.

Many of these factors that the average New Brunswick farmer may well consider and conclude that this crop may prove quite remunerative during the coming season.

First let us remember that our potatoes help, even in a small way, to supply the markets of the whole Northern America. Therefore, a shortage in the West Indies, or the Southern States, will more or less influence the value of the crop in New Brunswick and the greater shortage the greater will be the value of our crop. New Brunswick produces annually about 8,000,000 bushels of potatoes, while Canada produces approximately 75,000,000 bushels, the United States 400,000,000 bushels annually. Therefore, New Brunswick produces about one-tenth of the Canadian potato crop, or less than one-fifteenth of the total production in North America. Hence, an over production in New Brunswick will not materially affect the total production in the area of which we are a part, nor will it greatly reduce the price. On the other hand, anything which reduces the crop over the whole area, will tend to make a general scarcity and consequently higher prices will prevail. Let us realize then, that a large acreage in New Brunswick is not going to produce a glut on the market, accompanied by low prices.

What then are the existing conditions which are likely to influence the potato crop in North America (1) Price of seed stock, (2) Quality of seed stock, (3) Supply of the necessary fertilizer, (4) Necessary labor, (5) Probable value of the crop. With the exception of the last condition, all tend to show that we may have a scarcity during the coming season.

**PRICES OF SEED STOCK**  
The price of seed being one of the initial costs, influences to a large extent, the acreage planted. The average New Brunswick farmer planting six barrels of potatoes valued at \$5.00 per barrel, will expend \$30.00 on seed alone. Moreover, the Ontario and American farmer will pay \$8.00 or more, making the cost of seed approximately \$50.00 per acre. This condition will tend greatly to reduce the acreage over a very large area.

**QUALITY OF SEED STOCK**  
The quality of the seed stock is one of the most important factors in production and unless good seed is planted, a comparatively poor crop may be expected. This is particularly true in many sections. The unfavorable conditions prevailing during the last two years has probably weakened much of the stock in other sections of Canada and the United States, and owing to the scarcity and high price of good seed, much poor stock will be planted, which is almost sure to result in a low yield unless something is done to supply good seed.

**FERTILIZER**  
The scarcity of fertilizer containing a sufficient supply of potash will undoubtedly react to some extent on the crop. Many farmers will plant a smaller acreage on a good quality of fertilizer, while others will endeavor to get along without any, or use reduced quantities. This condition will be most marked in sections where the growers have been depending on commercial fertilizer, and to a smaller extent where barn-yard manure or clover crops have been regularly ploughed under.

**LABOR**  
The potato crop requires a good deal of hard labor, particularly in sections where modern machinery is not used, and the scarcity of farm laborers will undoubtedly further reduce the acreage planted and may also reduce the yield per acre, due to poor cultivation. Somewhere in France, Feb'y. 19th, 1917.

MY DEAR PARENTS:  
I have great pleasure in answering your letter received today and you may be sure that home news is always welcome to me. It makes me feel happy when you tell me you are well and getting along splendidly in every thing. I for my part always get along first class and I am quite used to soldiering by this time and I am getting used to face the Germans and give them the medicine they are looking for. I had a letter from Albert last week. He is in England as you ought to know and is enjoying life as it is. He was speaking of you in his letter, he says he would greatly enjoy a trip to dear old Balmoral.

Nobody seems to forget us anyway, today, mind you I had a parcel from the Ladies Club in Dalhousie and it goes without saying how pleasant it was to me. The parcel contained tobacco, of two kinds, cigars, one pair of socks, towel, paper, envelopes, and what was most delicious, a box of the best taffy I ever tasted, I assure you my dear parents, that I was overwhelmed with joy. I am going to write to those good Dalhousie ladies to try and thank them for the kindness and generosity they have for us. It goes without saying that such kindness does an awful lot of good to the heart of a Canadian boy.

I sincerely hope this terrible conflict will soon end and we will at last be assembled in our dear home in Balmoral.

seed stock (3) Supply of the necessary fertilizer, (4) Necessary labor, (5) Probable value of the crop. With the exception of the last condition, all tend to show that we may have a scarcity during the coming season.

**PRICES OF SEED STOCK**  
The price of seed being one of the initial costs, influences to a large extent, the acreage planted. The average New Brunswick farmer planting six barrels of potatoes valued at \$5.00 per barrel, will expend \$30.00 on seed alone. Moreover, the Ontario and American farmer will pay \$8.00 or more, making the cost of seed approximately \$50.00 per acre. This condition will tend greatly to reduce the acreage over a very large area.

**QUALITY OF SEED STOCK**  
The quality of the seed stock is one of the most important factors in production and unless good seed is planted, a comparatively poor crop may be expected. This is particularly true in many sections. The unfavorable conditions prevailing during the last two years has probably weakened much of the stock in other sections of Canada and the United States, and owing to the scarcity and high price of good seed, much poor stock will be planted, which is almost sure to result in a low yield unless something is done to supply good seed.

**FERTILIZER**  
The scarcity of fertilizer containing a sufficient supply of potash will undoubtedly react to some extent on the crop. Many farmers will plant a smaller acreage on a good quality of fertilizer, while others will endeavor to get along without any, or use reduced quantities. This condition will be most marked in sections where the growers have been depending on commercial fertilizer, and to a smaller extent where barn-yard manure or clover crops have been regularly ploughed under.

**LABOR**  
The potato crop requires a good deal of hard labor, particularly in sections where modern machinery is not used, and the scarcity of farm laborers will undoubtedly further reduce the acreage planted and may also reduce the yield per acre, due to poor cultivation. Dear Sir:  
You have already been notified of the death of your son, Pte. J. D. Court of the 232nd Overseas Battalion which I have the honor to command and I am writing personally to convey to your family the deep sympathy of all ranks of this Battalion, in the loss you have sustained. Yesterday afternoon about two hours before your son passed away, I went to the Hospital to see how he was getting along on and remained there half an hour but could not do anything. He was semi-conscious at the time and recognized me.

You will be glad to know that everything possible was done for the young man and that he received careful medical treatment, when the crisis arrived a special nurse was placed on the case by direct order of myself at the request of his company and recommended by the medical officers.

In closing I wish to congratulate you Sir on the splendid showing made by your family in the present war. I understand that you have one son who has already laid down his life in the cause of the Empire and although your son John did not meet his death on the battlefield in France he is none the less a hero in that he followed the path of duty and placed his services at the country's disposal. You will be glad to know that he was highly esteemed by his officers and comrades and his record in this Battalion has been that of a gentleman.

**VALUE OF CROP**  
The above four conditions indicate a small crop but the possibility of receiving a high price will induce many to plant more extensively, however indications at present are that this will not offset the scarcity due to other causes.

In view of the fact that these conditions exist in an aggravated form outside New Brunswick, in large potato growing areas the total crop for North America will be even smaller than during the past season, and farmers who have large quantities for sale will likely reap a just harvest.

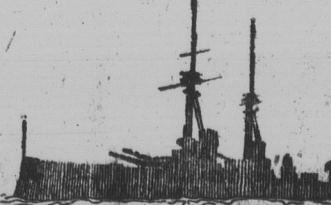
