REAL PARADISE FOR TOURISTS

Five Hundred Mile Belt Road Will Be Completed Next Year.

Que., Sep. 21.—Picturesque Gaspe Peninsula is to be opened to tourists with all its charms and beauties early next year, when the five hundred mile belt highway which circles the famous region will be at last completed. The construction of this beautiful belt highway presents one of the most difficult enterprises ever conducted by engineers of roads in this province. 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

OUR RIGHTS TO BE IGNORED

Press despatches state that Hon. A. B. Copp is to be appointed to the Senate.
If this appointment is made it means that the claims of Restigouche are again to be ignored, and another Westmorland politician is to get the reward. It begins to look as if, in order to gain recognition, one must reside in Westmorland or along the St. John River.
Restigouche has set forth her claims in no uncertain manner, and if we are to be ignored repeatedly then it seems time to take other steps to impress our importance upon the heads of governmental affairs.
Our claims are admitted to be just, then why should we be passed by to serve a political purpose? If a position must be found for Hon. Mr. Copp, surely there is something other than a soft seat in the Red Chamber for so young and clever a lawyer. Is there no hope of a judgeship or a seat on one of the numerous commissions?
Restigouche is entitled to a senatorship and she should have it.

Great Britain's ambassadors to foreign countries of the first rank, are paid \$8,000 a year by way of salary, and a special allowance, varying according to the capitals in which they reside, to cover the expense of entertaining, which are invariably heavy. Indeed, an ambassador needs to be a wealthy man, as he frequently has to dip into his own pocket in order to maintain his prestige at the Court to which he is accredited. One of the best known ambassadors is said to spend \$100,000 a year of his own money in this way.
In most cases Britain's ambassadors live rent free, the Government

having provided them with residences. They are also exempt from taxation, and have their own mail bags, which may not be examined either by post office or customs officials.
With certain exceptions, they are allowed to import and export goods for their private use without paying the usual duty. Incidentally, their official residences are regarded as British territory.

Only in the case of some particularly serious offence, such as treason, can the ambassador be arrested, and in this event he may claim the right to be placed under guard in his embassy, instead of being confined in prison, while the case is being investigated.

One of an ambassador's main qualifications for his important task is tact. Not only is it his business to maintain the prestige of his country, he must be careful not to ruffle the feelings of other ambassadors, and must take no part in political affairs.
These may not seem very arduous duties, but steering clear of difficult situations occupies a considerable portion of an ambassador's time, and not a little of his ingenuity.

In other days Britain's ambassadors frequently received princely presents on leaving a foreign court. One ambassador to Russia, for example, was given a parting gift of a large sum in cash, while another received jewels to the value of \$25,000.
Today an ambassador counts himself lucky if he receives nothing more substantial than a series of complimentary dinners and a column or two of praise in a foreign newspaper on the manner in which he has discharged his difficult duties.

"SLAVERY" IN PORTUGUESE AFRICA of \$39,280 was earned by 832 men during the year, it was stated.

"Now we are all slaves," says a black man in Portuguese Africa fifteen years after formal emancipation. "The slaves were better fed than we forced laborers are, for we are not properly fed. They were better clothed, and better housed, says the investigator, sent to Portuguese Africa Jacob Cohen, J. P. the other day. To Prof. Edward Alsworth Ross of the League of Nations.
