## Badges for Militiamen.

At the suggestion of Lieut.-Colonel Ross, of the Governor General's Foot Guards, the Government have agreed to issue honorary service badges to the members of the Ontario Militia, for, and a general order will shortly be issued directing that every militiaman who has served three consecutive years in any one corps shall be entitled to wear one chevron on his sleeve. Those who serve six years will receive two chevrons, and three consecutive years in the same battalion. This system of rewards was approved and recommended to the Government by Major-General Leard, before his departure for Europe, but has been kept in abeyance. Lieut. Col. Ross has now submitted that a service medal should be given to every militiaman who has served twelve consecutive years in a single corps, and that under the consideration of the Militia authorities. The difficulty in the way seems to be to distinguish between city and country corps, the former holding annual drills, and the latter only drilling once in two years. It is probable that an arrangement will be made by which badges will be given to members of country battalions who have attended three drills consecutively.
