Britain Feels Confident That He Can Handle the Situation in Afghanistan.

London, Oct. 8.—No confirmation has been received at the foreign office of the report of the death of the Amir of Afghanistan, but the accuracy of the report is not doubted.

At Simla it is believed that Habib Ouliah Khan, who was regarded by his father as his successor and had long had a share in the government of the country, will assume the succession peacefully. He is at Cabul. For some years, under his father's controlling hand, he has had charge of the army and the state treasury and the supreme court of appeals.

THE CAUSE. An eastbound freight engine, No. 1361, collided with a light engine, No. 1569, which was crossing from track three to track four, thus causing the wreck.
