MURDER AND SUICIDE.

Owosso, Mich., July 14.—A horrible murder and suicide occurred three miles north of here yesterday morning at 4 o'clock. Perry Comstock, a well-to-do farmer, murdered his young wife and attempted to kill his adopted son, Oliver, then committed suicide by shooting himself. Comstock has been twice married. His former wife died three years ago. Comstock has since married a young lady named Collins, whose home was at Batavia, Of late family jars have been frequent, Comstock becoming very jealous of his adopted son, a young man of good appearance, and his wife, who is perhaps 23 years old, while he is a man of 55 years. He became crazed on the subject, and had threatened the life of his wife and all. He attempted suicide once before, but failed. Saturday night a quarrel took place, and Mrs. Comstock fied to the neighbors for safety. Sunday morning about 3 o'clock he called up his adopted son Oliver and sent him atter his wife to have her return, which she did. She and Comstock sat on the stoop and talked for some time, when he became excited and demanded to know if she would live with him or not. She became so alarmed at his demeanor that she darted up the road, when he rushed into the house and, securing his repeating rifle, started in pursuit, calling to her to stop or he would free. Oliver cried to her to stop for God's sake or his father would shoot. She did so at his solicitation, and as she turned Comstock fred, killing her instantly. Then turning he said to Oliver, "It is your turn now!" but the young man dodged behind a woodpile as the deadly missive sped past. There is some hope, notwithstanding, that prices for wheat and barley in Canada may be increased through the bad luck of the farmers in Europe. They are low spirited because of the outlook. 
