Results in the Election of Mr. Essery as Mayor.

An Adverse Vote on the Early-Closing Bylaw.

The Free Library Idea Indorsed by a Large Majority.

London West Votes for Amalgamation by a Good Big Majority.

No Reduction in the Number of Wards Electric Light Figures Incomplete— The Successful Candidates for Alder-manic and School Ecard Henors—A Quartet of Speeches.

Being a-holiday, there was considerable Being a holiday, there was constituted interest in the London municipal elections yesterday, and an unusually full vote was polled, that for the mayor being greater by several hundreds than registered last year. The liquor men worked hard to defeat the early closing of bars bylaw, and it is The liquor men worked hard to defeat the early closing of bars bylaw, and it is alleged that a great many votes, vulgarly known as "pluggers," were polled against the proposed change. The defeat of the bylaw is a surprise to everyone. The anti-early closing scrutineers in more than one ward demanded that women voters should be sworn. By this means votes for the bylaw were undoubtedly lost, because not a few of the ladies, though well qualified, declined to go through the formula. Mr. Essery received the votes of the majority of those who opposed the early closing bylaw, but his majority was enhanced through other influences as well. In the aldermanic contests gome good men who served in last year's council have fallen by the way, but on the other hand some able men have been elected. In the school trustee contests wo of the old members have been left at home, but Mr. Stephenson has been sent back to represent No. 2 ward by a substantial majority. The free library bylaw was carried by an overwhelming majority. That the city should control its own electric lighting is, judging by the vote, the opinion of most of the electors. Before any change is made, the freeholders will have to vote on a bylaw authorizing the expenditure. The bylaw to decrease the number of wards to four was defeated by a large majority. It did not have a fair chance, as it was brought out too late in the year to be thoroughly discussed. Though the streets were a little heavy, owing to the fall of snow, it was an ideal polling day, and the voters got around without any difficulty.



London, Tuesday, Jan. 3. DUTY OF BROAD-MINDED,

The new organization which recently took its rise in the United States, and which has been imported into several places in Canada, and among other places into this city, yesterday undertook to run the municipal elections. And it did.

Such organizations are not new. Every now and then they take their rise, live out their brief day, and, after having accomplished themselves, expire-like a blown out candle. Among their members, to a considerable extent, are to be found wellmeaning persons who honestly believe there are dangers to be averted by whatever happens to be the special organiza tion of the moment, and that this is the right method of averting such dangers. That was the case at the time of the Lord George Gordon riots, when the passions of the unthinking were used by unscrupulous and irreligious persons for their private ends. That was he case with the Know Nothing movement in the United States, which raged fiercely for a brief period, and then col-(apsed so completely that presently everyoody was anxious to deny he had ever

No manicipal questions yesterday defeated Ald. Gartshore-a man who is respected by everybody, who conducted every hour of his campaign like a gentleman, and whose strength, after the misrepresentations of the moment have passed away, will be found to be unimpaired. For doubtless some of the adroit misrepresentations of his municipal position had their effect. What really defeated him was the focussing of passions too easily aroused-passions the arousing of which needs the gravest of justification, and the appealing to which for the sake of some petty purpose of ambition can never be other than a serious responsibility in the sight of God and man,

The organization of which we speak as having been recently copied and introduced from the United States is called The Protestant Protective Association. Its members are pledged to vote under all sircumstances whatever against Roman Catholics for any elective office whatever, and to give no employment to Roman Catholics. It is also understood -- and here is where the manipulators come in with their fine work-that any Protestant candidate who finds faver with Roman Catholics must also be taboocc. In Ald. Gartshore's situation by quietly but persistently spreading about the falsehood that he had always always been a Presbyterian; that he had to mention other forms of nisrepresenta- the footsteps of destiny.

tracise a minority of citizens-we vare not whether the minority be Roman Catholic or Protestant-from both elective position and from employment, is-must be-contrary to the spirit of Christ. It is a violation of the Golden Rule: do unto others as you would that others should do unto you. If carried out to its logical length, it would mean bitterness and discord among neigh bors and citizens; it would mean damage to the fair motto, live and let live, by which London has been heretofore honorably distinguished; yes, if not checked by the good ense and the large-mindedness of the community, it might come to mean more than bitterness, more than insecurity.

Another thing: nothing will do more to revent the progress of social reforms than he bedevilling of the community with false issues and ill-founded cries.

It is such crises as these that ask mer and women of light and leading to spread abroad, both publicly and conversationally the true principles of toleration.

THE FORWARD MOVEMENT. The Early Closing ballot, simply as an expression of opinion, yesterday scored the splendid figure of 2,757 votes. It is not easy to say what the genuine vote "against" really was, as it is admitted on all hands that personation and ways that are dark were more rife yesterday than at any election for several years. All the devices of petty electioneering, such as swearing respectable women, and the like, were also indulged to the full.

Yet the gratifying fact remains that no fewer than 2,757 of the best men and women of London yesterday expressed their opinion that the early closing of saloons and bars would be in the best interest of the community. When it is remembered that the campaign of the Early Closers was only of a few weeks' duration, and that at its start even some of those favorable to the general principle predicted it would not receive 500 votes, the magnificent figure yesterday reached shows as othing else could show the giant strides with which "The Forward Movement" is marching on. What the ultimate result will be no one who knows the irresistible. ness of the moral forces at work need bave the slightest doubt.

As an educational campaign there has never been a better. The superior weight of argument in favor of Early Closing literally converted hundreds of persons who a fortnight ago thought the idea of marshalling so magnificent a vote simply a chimera of the imagination. Abler or more convincing addresses in favor of Early Closing than those delivered by the Bishop of Huron, and by the Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist, Congregationalist and other clergymen have never in this city been heard. Indeed, so convincing were these addresses that not a soul ventured to take to the platform on behalf of the opposite

New Yorkers Say That Chicago Packers Were Caught in a squeeze.

New Yorkers Say That Chicage Packers
Were Gaught in a squeeze.

New York, Jan. 2.—The story from Chicage about the hog famine in the west is not believed by local commission men, who allege that some western packers have been caught in a squeeze and are giving this as an excuse. John Chinamon, a well-known commission merchant and member of the Produce Exchange, says: "The statement of the packers, that the hog famine is due to the spring rains, is all bosh. The whole amount of it is that Phil Armour and the other usually long-headed nen got nipped in a little squeeze operated by such men as Charlie Wright and John Cudahy, of Chicage, and now they haven't got the pork and can't get it. The speculation in corn, which was carried on so extensively, put the price up so high that the farmers found it much more profitable to market their corn than feed it to the logs, so they killed the animals and sent term to market. The result was that the immer killing increased about 1,000,000 head and the winter supply is short. Then, too, the opening of foreign markets to the American hog had a great deal to do with it. The only difference here is the increased price to consumers, as New York does not speculate in previsions and lets intures, as far as they are concerned, severely alone. The supply is gradually increasing, however, and will soon be all right."
