He told Mrs. Quinn of his discovery and Wednesday morning sha was at the bedside of her husband, reproaching him for sending her no word of his whereabouts. Quinn was formerly engaged as a teachor on Hart's island, where he was messenger in the office of Warden McNamara in the almshouse. ARE OUR SCHOOLS NURSERIES? A radical reformation in the management of the public schools of London is

The school trustees, through reasons best known to themselves, have too long delayed action, but instances in which the best interests of the children are being needlessly sacrificed have come to our notice in sufficient number to prove the ecessity for immediate reform.

London has adopted the kindergarten system. Under it a public school board may admit to the kindergarten classes children between the ages of 4 and 7. This regulation is permissive. It is open for the trustees of any municipality to fix the age for entering the kindergarten at the age fixed for entering ordinary school-that

But, in their wisdom, the London school rustees permit the age for entrance to remain at 4, and from that, in the present condition of school accemodation, comes all the trouble.

To-day there are in attendance at our indergartens, children who are under 5 years of age, while pupils who have been in the kindergartens, and are over 5-in some instances over 6-years of age, are sent home to their parents with a note from the teacher that they cannot be admitted, 'because there is no room."

Is not this a scandalous condition of affairs? Here we have been expending vast sums of money to provide school accommodation, in order that all children of legitimate school age may be educated, while our school trustees have been providing for the filling up of the junior classes with children too young to be out of the nursery !

We believe in the kindergarten. It is an admirable system of preliminary education. But it should be elastic enough to permit the attendance of every child between the ages of 5 and 7 before a single baby aged 4 to 5 should be taken care of.

It is prejudicial to the best interests of a pupil of proper school age that he should be prevented, by the crowding in of infant pupils, from steadily pursuing his studies, and the school regulations should be elastic enough to prevent any such debarring. If the trustees are inclined to hold to the view, which we refuse to indorse, that in the present condition of city school finances it is proper to have the kindergartens continued as nurseries for children under 5 years of age, it is only reasonable that whensoever a pupil over the age of f years presented himself for admission at a kindergarten he should be admitted. It would be no hardship, and preeminently in the best interests of the schools, if a place were at once made for every such pupil by sending home the most recently admitted child who has not reached

The school trustees should delay action o longer. The evil is not a new one. It has already resulted in injury and irritation to many households, and has retarded the education of children of school age in order that the babies might be taken care of. There can be no excuse for continuing the system a day longer.


