WILD CHEERS FOR LAURIER. The most prominent citizens were sponded. As representing Canada, Mr. Laurier was cheered to the echo, and the cheering was several times repeated before he could proceed. The visiting colonial premiers were tendered a banquet last night by the municipality of Glasgow. A large and distinguished company was present.

Mr. Laurier, replying to the toast, "Our Colonial Empire," said: "Proud as I am to be a citizen of the great republic on the banks of the St. Lawence, I value still more the privilege of being a citizen of the British Empire. Today we are colonials, but we aspire to be more, and to see removed whatever disparity exists between the people of the home country and the colonial subjects of her Majesty." It gives to urkey the mountain crests frontiers of Thessaly, but the Turks re not allowed to retain any of the villages of Thessaly.
