High Jinks of the Gulf Stream.

New York, May 22.—Captain J. Lumesdame, of the Anchor Liner Astoria, from Glasgow, has found a reason for the cold weather. He says the Gulf Stream, which ordinarily has a range between 46 and 55 degrees north latitude, is away to the north, and he found for the Atlantic a high barometer with southerly wind, which is unusual.

"I don't say that the Gulf Stream is out of its margin," said the captain, "but it is to the northward of its normal course. This accounts for our winter weather home in Scotland, where we have been having snow every other day. V.e don't have the seasons we used to have."


IN TENNESSEE CRASH

Heavily Loaded Freight Cars Plunge Into Workmen's Train.

A. races at 9 a.m., ball game at Tecumseh Park at 10:30, between the Perrins and McClarys, and a game at the same hour at Queen's Park between the Ramblers and Somervilles. In the afternoon the Rockets and Stars cross bats at Tecumseh Park at 3:30. The city league schedule calls for two games on Priday afternoon, but it was decided to change the programme. In the east end league it was found impossible to pull off the scheduled afternoon contest between the Wortman & Ward vs. the Oriens on account of the military exercises at Queen's Park at that time.


